Steelworkers State Walkout At Birmingham

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP) - Steelricers at the huge Tennesses and Iron Institute (TCI) Friday in Birmingham, Ala., "The Pittsburgh of the South."

The walkout occurred while labor groups in Birmingham talked about a general strike. There was no known dispute between the steel workers' union and the TCL

Workers at the steel plant, one five units of TCI, a division U.S. Steel, failed to show up work at midnight and some employes immediately threw up picket lines.

It could not be determined im-mediately whether the steel walkof was the beginning of a general strike in Birmingham where union leaders had been discussing such a move for a week. But R. E. Farr, district director of the steel workers' union, said he understood the 27,000 employes of all five TCI plants would be on strike by Satur
