

# Dodgers Hang Up 9th Straight Win of Season

Those jack rabbit Brooklyn Dodgers may be clear out of sight before you can say Jack Robinson.

Winners of nine straight games already, the Dodgers can establish a new modern major league record for fast getaways by defeating the Phillies today for their 10th victory in a row since the bell rang.

The Dodgers tied the record of nine in a row held jointly by the New York Giants, St. Louis Browns and themselves when they came from behind to overtake the Phillies, 3-2, Wednesday night. They looked so good in winning that even their ultra-conservative skipper, Walt Alston, couldn't contain himself.

"This is the first time since I've taken over the club that it has ever played this well in the three important departments — hitting, pitching and fielding," Alston declared.

## Ample Reason to Glow

The usually solemn Brooklyn boss had ample reason to glow inasmuch as the world champion Giants are now six games behind the Dodgers and the second place Milwaukee Braves are two-and-a-half games to the rear.

Brooklyn beat the Phillies the hard way after falling behind, 2-0, to them Wednesday night. Steve Ridzik held the Dodgers hitless until Sandy Amoros doubled with two out in the sixth. Then he walked two men in the seventh hit Jackie Robinson with a pitch, and walked Duke Snider to force in a run. Lynn Lovenguth replaced Ridzik and was greeted by Gil Hodges' two-run single. All told, Brooklyn made only three hits, but they were enough for Billy Loes to register his second win of the year even though Clem Labine relieved him in the eighth.

## Cubs Fading

Bobby Thomson was the big man in Milwaukee's 9-5 victory over the fading Chicago Cubs. Thomson drove in five runs with a grand-slam homer and a single with the bases full. Lew Burdette was the winner but rookie Humberto Robinson came on from the bullpen in the ninth to strike out Hank Sauer with the bases loaded to save Burdette's second triumph.

Left-hander Luis Arroyo of the Cardinals made an auspicious major league debut, holding the Redlegs to five hits in the seven and two-third innings he worked and getting credit for a 3-0 victory. Herb Toford, another rookie hurler, held the losers in check over the last one-and-one-third innings. Joe Frazier hit a two-run homer off loser Art Fowler in the fourth inning.

The poor Pirates apparently were on the road to their first victory of the season with a 3-0 lead over the Giants but rain postponed the game after Felipe Montemayor bashed a three-run homer off Ruben Gomez. Dick Littlefield had worked three scoreless frames for the Bucs and contributed a single, too.

## Baltimore Wins First

Baltimore registered its first victory of the American League season after six successive setbacks by beating New York, 6-3, as Erv Palica and Ray Moore collaborated on a six-hit pitching job. Two ex-Yankees, catcher Hal Smith and shortstop Willie Miranda, figured prominently in the Orioles' triumph. Smith connected for a two-run homer in the fifth and Miranda spangled afield, making three spectacular stops and figuring in two key double plays. Bob Grim suffered his second loss. Palica was the winner.

Willard Nixon of the Red Sox pitched a neat five-hitter to beat the Senators, 1-0, and move Boston a game and a half in front in the American League. Boston got to Chuck Stobbs for its only run in the fourth on a pair of scratch hits and rookie Norm Zauchin's single.

The Chicago-Detroit game was rained out while Cleveland and Kansas City were not scheduled.

## Carter Loses To Zulueta In Surprise

WASHINGTON (UP)—Surprise winner Orlando Zulueta, whose jab-and-run tactics paid off in a split non-title decision over Jimmy Carter, today demanded a "promised" second bout with Carter, this time with the lightweight championship on the line.

"I'll give him a title shot — if he can come up with the money," answered Carter's manager.

Zulueta, fast-stepping Cuban who had lost three straight fights and entered the ring at Uline Arena a 3-1 underdog for Wednesday night's nationally televised 10-rounder, upset the erratic champion by making double use of a brilliant left jab — to stop Carter's.

"Carter's manager promised us a title shot if Zulueta won this fight," said Hyman Wailman, manager of the Cuban. "Now we definitely want a crack at the title."

But Carter's manager, Willie Ketchum, said matching the two men again for the title won't be as simple as all that — first Zulueta has to get someone to guarantee Carter the money he wants.

"And it won't be in Washington," said the angry Ketchum, still boiling over the officials' voting that he called "a give-away decision."

"How can you win with decisions like that?" demanded Ketchum. "My boy led all the way. He won easy. Zulueta ran all night. Zulueta never hurt him. Jimmy never got marked."

There was no denying that Carter was the aggressor through most of the bout, but the champ found himself unable to dominate the nifty-boxing underdog.

Referee Harry Volkman voted for Zulueta, 96 points to 93, and Judge Joe Bunsu agreed by a 97-94 count. But Judge Benny Alperstein thought Carter was the winner, 97-93. The United Press scorecard had it a draw, 95-95.

One thing was definite — Carter's hopes of a shot at the welterweight title soon are ended.

"This throws the welterweight title shot out the window," Ketchum admitted. "If you can't beat a lightweight, there's no sense shooting for the next division."

Both fighters were slightly over the lightweight limit for this scrap, Zulueta scaling 137½ pounds and Carter 137.

# Seattle Blanks Sacramento 3-0; Oakland Wins

Excellent pitching by Jehosie Heard and Al (Two-gun) Gettel featured the only two games played in another rain-abbreviated Pacific Coast League slate Wednesday night.

Heard yielded only two hits in southpawing Seattle to a 3-0 win over Sacramento's league-leaders. And Gettel finally registered his first win after dropping three in a row as Oakland flattened Los Angeles, 6-2, on six-hit pitching.

But in Portland and San Francisco the box-office took another beating from the rain. The Beavers were stymied for the second straight day in their efforts to launch the home season with a day-night doubleheader against San Diego. The Seals-Hollywood game also was rained out for the second night in a row.

## Rain-soaked Beavers

Ten games have been washed out since Sunday and Portland was to have played in six of them. The Beavers will try again today to play the inaugural split doubleheader but the weatherman wasn't too hopeful, either in the Rose City or in San Francisco.

Heard (1-1) was in complete control in Seattle as he forced the Oaks to hit into five double plays and sent the 513 spectators home after an hour and 35 minutes of play. He faced only 25 official batters.

Leo Thomas nicked the little portside for a single in the fifth and Ritchie Myers singled infield in the eighth. Both were wiped out by double-plays.

Heard struck out two and walked three, as did his opponent, Bud Daley, who suffered his first loss after three wins. The Rainiers did all their scoring in the second when they collected four of their seven hits. Monty Bascall and Gene Verble singled and Rocco Krsnich and Carmen Mauro smacked two-batters.

## Stout Support

A chilled Los Angeles crowd of 1028 saw the Oaks give Gettel stout support by rapping George Piktuzis (1-1), Bill Tremel and Bob Zick for 13 hits.

Three of those were by George Metkovich who appeared to be making another bid for the consecutive hitting record after being stopped by Joe Hatten at nine straight the night before.

Gettel struck out five and walked four. One of the six hits off him was a towering homer in the fourth by Steve Bilko with the bases empty.

Second baseman Billy Conzolo, \$75,000 bonus rookie optioned by the Red Sox to the Oaks, hit two singles, scored two runs and drove in another after being shut out 10 in his first game with Oakland Tuesday night.
