Plans Underway for Change In Constitution of France

By CHARLES M. MCAN N, United Press Staff Correspondent French political leaders seem to have decided at last that the casualty rate of their prime ministers is too high.

There have been 21 French governments since the end of World War II. Premiers have fallen at the rate of one every six months.

As the result, French prestige has declined steadily. The situation has become so serious that France is in danger of losing its position as a world power.

So the politicians seem to have really under their minds that they must revise the constitution of the Fourth Republic.

What they want to do is to work out a system that will strengthen French government and, at the same time, safeguard the country against the emergency of a dictator.

The National Assembly, the lower house of the French Parliament, approved by a vote of 404 to 210 Tuesday night a motion to revise the constitution which was adopted Oct. 14, 1946.

The Amendments Proposed amendments, which have been worked out after two years of study, are designed to give French premiers more authority and to lessen the threat that they may be overthrown on a vote of confidence.

There is sure to be a long and fierce fight in the National Assembly and the upper house, the Council of the Republic, before enough to get his chair warm.

Red-Led French Printers Strike

PARIS (UP)—A Communist-led printers strike left Paris and several other French cities without newspapers today.

The 24-hour news blackout was called by the Red-bosomed General Confederation of Labor (CGT) in protest against a National Assembly decision to discuss a bill making it no longer compulsory for printers to register with the union.

The city's major morning newspapers were unable to publish. The European edition of the New York Herald Tribune was among the newspapers affected. The strike was to last through tonight and was expected to prevent publication of evening papers.

Bridge Repairs Reported Made

The bridge over the Deschutes river above Benham falls is again available for limited use through the cooperation of Bryna Productions and Brooks-Scanlon, Inc., it was announced today.

Brooks-Scanlon provided lumber needed in the renovation job and the Hollywood people, now making a western movie at a replica of a frontier fort near Benham falls, provided the labor.

Weakened through weathering and years of use, the span was extensively used in earlier years when logging operations were under way in the area, and in more recent years has provided for fishermen easy access to both banks of the stream just above Benham falls.

Earlier this season, Deschutes county sportsmen improved the access road to the bridge from the north side.

In the present work, new planking was placed on the span, and new rails were erected.

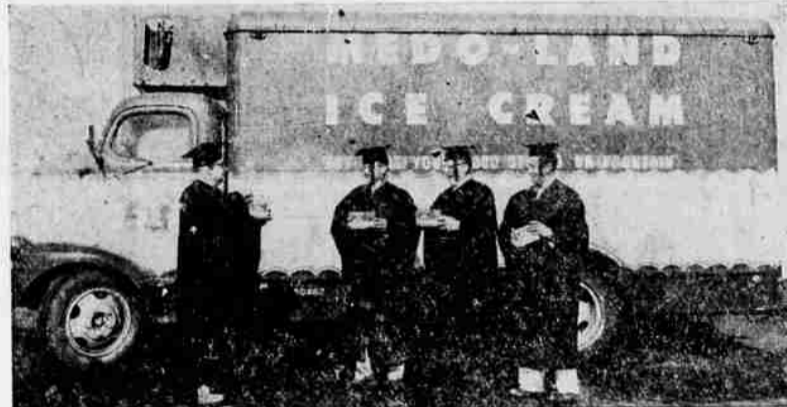
