

Salem Shows Power In Scoring Victory

It was very apparent to the fans that flocked to the Municipal baseball diamond Tuesday night why the Salem Senators won the first-half Northwest league championship.

The Capital city was represented by a young hustling club that combined tight defensive play with sharp heads-up ball and a murderous hitting attack to subdue the Bend Loggers, 13 to 2.

And the classy Salem team did not waste any time in settling accounts either.

Mel Krause opened the game with a double. Jack Dunn laced a single. Floyd Robinson walked, and Bill Shields and Jack Steinagel rapped solid singles to get Salem off to a flying start with four quick runs off starter Jim Duff.

Rasmussen opened the eighth with his blast over the left centerfield barrier, and Stott led off the final frame with his round tripper to right center. Amateur Meet Plans Announced

NEW YORK (UP)—The U.S. Golf Association announced Tuesday 31 qualifying sections, six fewer than last year, have been set up for the National Amateur championship to be played at Richmond, Va., Sept. 12-17.

The qualifying will take place Aug. 30 except at Seattle, Wash., where the qualifying round will be played Aug. 29.

A qualifying round has been added at Montgomery, Ala.; Round played last year at Lincoln Neb.; Albuquerque, N.M.; Albany, N.Y.; Portland, Ore.; Lubbock, Tex.; Milwaukee, Wis.; and Salt Lake City, Utah, have been eliminated. The number of sections has been reduced in an effort to consolidate the smaller ones.

A field of 200, composed of qualifiers and entrants exempt from sectional qualifying, will contest the championship proper at the James River course of the Country Club of Virginia. The championship will be at match play.

Entries are open to male amateur golfers with handicaps not exceeding four strokes. For the first time, handicaps must be computed according to the USGA handicap system for men. Residents of the U.S. must be members of USGA member clubs. Entries must be in the USGA office of 40 East 38th Street, New York 16, N.Y., by 5 p.m., Aug. 12.

Andrews Advances in Publinx Tournament

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP) — Defending champion Gene Andrews, 42, and Bud Bradley, who is 24 years younger, teed off today in the feature survival match in the third round of the 30th annual National Public Links golf tournament.

Bradley, winner of the 1935 USGA National junior championship at age 17, had as good a chance as any to derail the Pacific Palisades, Calif., insurance agent in his attempt to become the second shooter ever to defend his crown successfully. But Andrews has been chalking some of the best golf over the tricky, tree-lined course.

Andrews was one over par for the 13 holes it took to dispose of Charles Along, Honolulu, in a 6-and-5 rout Tuesday. At the turn Andrews was four up and one over par at 37. The next two holes cinched it.

Andrews scooted in a 25-foot putt for a birdie deuce on No. 10 while Along bogied. He parred the 11th and Along took a double bogie six. They halved the next two and the match ended on No. 13.

Several have come close, but none of the original field of 200 has equaled par 70 on this 6,536-yard layout. Don Schrubulis, Kewanee, Ill., made it during Saturday's team tourney—"kickoff" to the main event.

Neither has anyone won the crown two years running since Carl Kauffman, Pittsburgh, won in 1927-28-29.

Other "near-par" matches Tuesday included the 3-and-1 victory of Robert Lichtenwalter, Erie, Pa., over Jouett Brown, Louisville, Ky. Lichtenwalter missed par by two strokes for the 17 holes. Both were one over par at the turn, but Brown stumbled on No. 17 with a bogey five while Lichtenwalter hit a four.

Bradley, of Los Angeles, advanced with a 4-and-3 victory over David Leon, Tucson, Ariz. Bradley was three over par at 39 for the front nine.

George Roddy's one-up victory in 19 holes over Jack Cummings, Alameda, Calif., provided some of the best shooting. Roddy, Negro high school teacher from Indianapolis, was even with Cummings at 73 at the end of 18.

Gus Moreland, Peoria, Ill.,

bought a new putter before his match with Dick Hopwood, Phoenix, Ariz. Moreland, a two-time Walker Cupper, came up with putts of 60, 20 and 12 feet on the front nine, but he shot a seven-over-par 79 in eliminating Hopwood, one up.

Roy Cullenbine, Detroit, the ex-St. Louis Browns ball player, advanced with a one-up victory over James Sutton, Atlanta, Ga. Cullenbine shot a 78. Schrubulis solo-lined Michael Deverant, Glenside, Pa., 4 and 3.

The longest match—22 holes—was a one-up victory for Borson Anderson, Ind., over Arthur Cassidy, Peoria. Cassidy had a 73 at the end of 18; Borson a 75.

Lichtenwalter tied off today against Leo Everett, Denver, Colo. in the first of two 18-hole rounds. Roddy met Joe Korns, Pontiac, Mich.; Moreland faced George Weisbar, Spokane, Wash.; Cullenbine tied off against Robert Kay, Toledo, Ohio; and Schrubulis against Billy Joe Lauer, Spokane.

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
