

Nationals Triumph, 6-5

Home Run by Musial Breaks Up Game in Twelfth Inning

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UP) — Thanks to one sweet swing by Stan (The Man) Musial, who wasn't even invited to the party, the National League stood at last today within sight of its long-cherished goal — rule of the All-Star game.

The dramatic 6-5 triumph produced by Musial's mighty wallop in the 12th inning of the "dream game" at County Stadium Tuesday now has cut the American League's lead in this annual series to just 13 games to nine.

That's a far cry from just six years ago when the Americans led by 12-4 and a National League comeback seemed a mighty dismal hope indeed.

Now Musial's dramatic blast in the right field stands on a "too high" pitch by Frank Sullivan of the Boston Red Sox, has extended the National League surge to five victories in the last six games and given "senior" circuit officials hope they will even the series in the years just ahead.

But come what may in the future, the 1955 All-Star classic goes into the history books as "Stan's Game."

Passed up by the fans, who voted Ted Kluszewski of Cincinnati into the role of starting first baseman for the National League instead of Stan, the St. Louis Cardinal star was rushed into the game as a substitute outfielder and wound up by smashing three big All-Star records.

The Stars, third in the standings but last in team fielding, made six errors in the second game of a double header with San Francisco and lost, 12-5, after winning the opener, 3-1. Five of those six errors were committed in the second inning when the Seals scored 10 runs — all unearned.

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Andrews Meets Ezzard Charles In Ring Tonight

CHICAGO (UP) — Boxer Paul Andrews battles ex-heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles in the Chicago Stadium tonight with recognition as a heavyweight prospect his major possible prize.

Charles, who lost the crown to Jersey Joe Walcott and then lost three times in attempts to regain it against Walcott and the current title holder, Rocky Marciano, was a 9-5 choice to win the 10 round television spectacle.

But Andrews foresaw a different result, and he anticipated that his victory would earn him an Aug. 5 bout against Hurricane Tommy Jackson in Syracuse, N.Y., a scrap already assigned to Charles.

"I hope a win would put me in the top ten heavyweights," Andrews said, "but I don't know that means much now. They're shifting so much."

"This has got to be my most important fight, because Charles will be the most highly rated fighter I've ever met. He's very smart, and he's not so bad a boxer as some people think. He's got an elusive style and he's not easy to hit."

"But I've seen him fight, and I think I can beat him. Right now it's foolish for me to think about fighting Marciano, because I'm a year away, but beating Charles will be a move that way."

Andrews figured he would weigh "a solid 186 or 187" while Charles anticipated he would go about 192 or 193.

Charles rated Andrews as an other foe on his pattern of "elimination" aimed at another title chance with Marciano.

"I figure I can eliminate four or five of the possible challengers for Marciano by next spring," he said, "and maybe Rocky will eliminate one or two himself. So maybe by next spring there won't be anybody else that will be logical for him to fight."

Both Charles and his co-manager, Tom Tannas, believed that in another chance at Marciano, Charles would win. They specified that in both previous bouts, Charles was leading on points until he ran into a flurry of punches which started him on the road to defeat.

"All I'd need would be a few breaks to beat him," Charles said.

Perfect Summer Weather Felt In Most of U.S.

Perfect summer weather smiled on most of the nation today. But in Europe a stifling heat wave has taken more than 150 lives.

European officials said most of the deaths were caused by drownings, heat prostration and lightning.

They said temperatures were in the 70s and 80s, hot for Europe.

In this country, the only sign of unsatisfactory weather was a few light showers over the Carolinas and in the Missouri River Valley. The heaviest rainfall during the evening was 1.77 inches at Augusta, Ga.

Yesterday, clear weather provided a sunny backdrop for two big events in the Midwest, the Major League All-Star game at Milwaukee and a parade of 25,000 Shriners down Chicago's Michigan Ave.

In New York, there was no sign of the recent humid hot spell yesterday. The high temperature was 81 and the humidity was never higher than 53 per cent.

A few days ago, when moving into a house at 924 East Second Street, they found a round and mysterious object hanging on a nail in the closet on the back porch. The sign said "Do Not Touch."

The Chalfonts summoned Sheriff Jesse Woolridge who recognized the object as an anti-tank mine. Seeing that it was armed, he phoned Camp Hanford, Washington. Two experts traveled to Prineville to check on the item which was about 12 inches in diameter and four inches thick with what appeared to be a wheel on top.

The experts who came to Prineville were Captain I. R. Kelzenberger and Sergeant Jack Davis. They deactivated the live mine and took the souvenir back to Camp Hanford with them.
