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# Jacks Edge Loggers 10 to 8

## Wenner's Homer Breaks Up Tilt In 10th Inning

Leftfielder Dick Wenner, who used to do his slugging for the Portland Beavers, rode out of the Municipal ball park in the tenth inning to give Coos Bay - North Bend Lumberjacks a 10-to-8 decision over the Bend Loggers Wednesday. The payoff three-run homer was Wenner's only hit.

As usual, the Loggers got off to a poor start, but this time instead of rolling over and playing dead they fought back from a 7-1 deficit to knot the score and force the contest into overtime before finally bowing.

Even after the Jacks took a three-run lead in their half of the tenth, Bend was not through. Gene Stott opened by crashing a long double that was just two feet shy of clearing the centerfield fence again. Dan Lovejoy brought him in with another double down the right line, and moved to third as Tom Bowen grounded out.

But then southpaw Ron Webb, Washington State's ace pitcher, steadied and bore down to strike out a pair of pinch hitters and end the first overtime battle of the season.

Charged With Loss  
Reliever Fred Paine, who came on in the seventh and hurled five balls until Wenner's deciding clout, was charged with the loss. After the first two CB-NB players got hitoff starter Jerry Hefty, Paine was rushed into the fray. He struck out the first two batters, gave Ray Stratton a political walk to fill the bases and then got Bob Hayes on an easy ground out.

Hefty was touched for four runs in the opening frame on a pair of errors, a double by Johnny Koza, and back-to-back barrier blasts by Roy Nicely and Jay Ragni. He gave up another two runs in the fifth on his error and a pair of singles, and was on the brink of disaster before he recovered to strike out both Jim Ruggles and Ivy Roth with the bases jammed.

The Jacks added another in the sixth to take a 7-1 lead before Bend finally struck back. Up to then the Loggers hadn't bothered Jerry Tully except for Lovejoy's second inning homer.

Gene Stott blasted his sixth round-tripper of the year over the center field fence with both Jantzes aboard to account for the three sixth inning runs.

Bases Filled  
When Webb took over in the seventh he filled the bases with seven passes to Twink Pederson, Tom Hunt and Phil Jantze before he finally gained his control. Curt Jantze rapped an easy grounder back to Webb, but the over-anxious pitcher threw wild to the plate. Stott scoping into a double play scoring Hunt and then Phil Jantze stole home to tie the score at 7-7.

Bend was guilty of four errors, but still came up with three double plays, with Pederson going far behind, second base to grasp a grounder and get one twin killing started.

The same two teams will clash again tonight at 8 p.m. Leftfielder Jim Duff has been named to start for Bend, while Jack boss Curt Lemmer has announced that he will open with Jack Henkle.

## Don Bisplinghoff Takes Early Lead In Amateur Meet

ROCKFORD, Ill. (UP)—A 20-year-old Florida linksman led the field into the final round of medal play in the 53rd Western Amateur golf tournament today.

Don Bisplinghoff of Orlando, Fla., boasted a comfortable four-stroke lead with a 71-68-67-206, seven under par for the sun-baked Rockford Country Club course.

Low seven scorers at the end of today's round will join with defending champion Bruce Cudd of Portland, Ore., in match play starting Friday.

Bisplinghoff, North-South Amateur titleist, birdied two holes on Wednesday's front nine and eagled the par five 465-yard 10th. He parred the other 15 for his four under 67.

Trailing Bisplinghoff at 210 were Robert Brue, the 20-year-old ex-caddy from Milwaukee, and Eddie Merrins, of Meridian, Miss.

The pressure mounted for those coveted seven spots with three tied at 211 and five others, three of them Walker Cup stars, knotted at 213.

Cudd had 216, 10 strokes off the pace although he automatically qualifies for match play. Tied with him was Paul Schwab of Dayton, Ohio.

## George Susce Jr. Hurls One-Hitter In Red Sox Win

The most rapid baseball fan in Kansas City could forgive Coach George (Good Kid) Susce today if he's bursting his buttons with pride.

The Boston Red Sox stretched the Athletics' latest losing streak to nine games with a 6-0 victory Wednesday night—and it was none other than the coach's 23-year-old

son, George Susce Jr., who was the chief villain. Susce Jr., a strong-armed right hander, yielded a leadoff single to Vic Power and then hurled no-hit ball for the remainder of the game.

The victory enabled the moustache Red Sox to move within a game of the third-place Cleveland Indians, who lost to the Washington Senators, 6-1, and again tightened the American League race.

The second-place Chicago White Sox advanced to within two games of first place with an 8-4 triumph over the New York Yankees.

But the drama of the night was unfolded in Kansas City. Susce Jr. had compiled a 4-3 mark for the Red Sox but Manager Mike Herzog never before had pitched him against the Athletics. Around the league, fans and players wondered how the young pitcher would react when he finally was called upon to pitch against his father's team.

Dad Watches From Bullpen  
A 13-game winner for Louisville last season, Susce Jr. turned in his first big league debut while his father watched the progress of the game from the bullpen. The 27-

year-old coach, who groomed his son to be a ballplayer, played for five major league teams but caught a total of 146 games in eight seasons.

It was the first time Susce Sr. had seen his son pitch in a major-league game, but he was so busy in the bullpen 412 feet from the plate that he only saw him briefly. The young pitcher's mother, brother, and sister were in the stands, however, and got a much better look.

Senators Beat Indians  
The Senators scored four unearned runs off Early Wynn in the third inning and won their fifth straight game. Fleteo Yost's home run and Joe Valachi's triple were the big hits of the game for the Senators, who have a 7-4 season edge over Cleveland.

The Indians whipped them 7-1 in 22 meetings on route to the pennant last season.

The White Sox routed Bob Turley in the first inning and built up an 8-0 lead over the Yankees in three frames. Dick Donovan, who is fairly certain to be the first rookie to win 20 games for the White Sox in 51 years, was knocked out when the Yankees scored five runs in the seventh inning but got credit for the win to make his record 15-2.

Hal Smith drove in four runs and Dave Pipe two to lead the Baltimore Orioles to a 6-3 win over the Detroit Tigers in the other A.L. game.

Newcomer Wins 16th  
In the National League, Don Newcombe won his 16th game behind a five-inning barrage that included two each by Duke Snider and Don Zimmer as the Brooklyn Dodgers whipped the Chicago Cubs, 10-1. The Cubs snapped a nine-game losing streak in the nightcap with a 3-3 verdict. With 13 homers in 92 games, Snider is three games ahead of Babe Ruth's record 1927 pace.

The Philadelphia Phillies set a modern club record of nine straight triumphs with 5-0 and 1-1 wins over the Cincinnati Redlegs.

## Werle Hurls Portland Nine To 4-0 Shutout Over L.A.

Pace-setting Seattle and runner-up San Diego square off tonight in the opener of the first real "crucial" series of the Pacific Coast League season.

Freddie Hutchinson's Rainiers return home one game out in front of the Padres as a result of winning eight of their 11 games in Sacramento and Oakland. San Diego's erstwhile leaders, meanwhile, won only four of their last 11.

Both teams will use their winningest pitchers in the opener of the five game series tonight. Seattle will start Elmer Singleton (13-8) against San Diego's Eddie Fourni (11-6).

The Rainiers wound up with a 4-1 series victory over the Oaks last night when Joe Ginsberg bawled in the seventh inning for a 5-4 win. San Diego was idle and thus dropped a full game behind Seattle.

All Homers  
Winner Howie Judson (8-5) allowed only four Oakland hits in the first six innings but all were

homers. Jim Marshall clubbed two to raise his season total to 23 and Johnny Jorgensen and George Metkovich also took advantage of the shorthanded field fence in Emeryville to hit four-baggers.

In other games, Red Mumper survived an 11-hit pasting to hurl Hollywood to a 4-1 win over Sacramento and Portland blanked Los Angeles 4-0 behind Bill Werle's six-hit pitching.

In Sacramento, Munger (13-6) was helped out of hot water by four Hollywood double-plays. Johnny Briggs (10-10) also gave up 11 hits in absorbing the loss.

The Stars scored single runs in the fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth innings. Curt Roberts paced the winners at the plate with three singles. Carlos Bernier scored the final Hollywood run after stealing second and third bases.

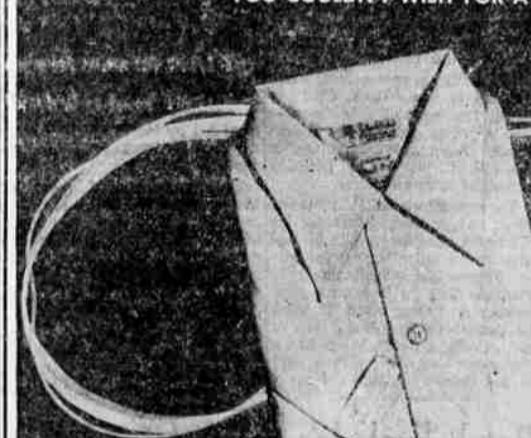
avenged Defeat

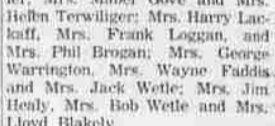
