Border Prints Easy to Use In Decorating

Inexpensive border prints come to the rescue of the home sewer who wants to freshen up the guest room or liven up a child's room.

Border prints, which come in an astonishing range of patterns from cowboys to rosebuds, eliminate the need for hemming and give a finished look to the flounce of a bedspread as they do to apron or skirts.

One young homemaker spent 12 hours in time and about \$10 in cash to make a fresh, pretty bedspread, pillow cases, curtains and dressing-table skirt for her tiny daughter's room.

She has an automatic zig-zag attachment for her sewing machine, which she used to fancy up the skimpy flounced articles with rick-rack braid. A teacher at her local sewing center showed her how to make the best use of her attachments to save time. If you have new attachments, her advice is to take the time to learn to use them properly.

To make the pretty bedspread, measure around the bed and double the results to allow for a full flounce. Cutting lengthwise along the unbordered side, trim off strips to make the top of the spread. Piece together the panels, allowing six extra inches for tuck-in at the top.

Trim the selvages, pin raw edges and stitch strips together. Press seams open. Using a zig-zag attachment set for 12 stitches to the inch, stitch the rick-rack to reinforce the stitching lines. Mark the center of the panel and the center of the flounce. Use the ruler to gather the flounce one-fourth inch in from the edge. Line up the center markings and pin flounce to panel, right sides together. Baste, then stitch. If you border the joining seam with rick-rack, it is a good idea to use the zig-zag attachment again for extra secure seams.

Matching pillow cases made from the border print will probably need a hem. Allow about five extra inches around the pillow for ease and make case about eight inches longer than the pillow.

To make curtains, measure depth of windows from top of sash to sill. Cut from the top so border design matches the width of the window on the bed. Fold a two-inch hem at the top and press. Turn raw edges at sides to the right side and press. Again use the automatic zig-zagger to sew rick-rack over the hem turn. Stitch up and across top pressed line and down the other side.

On the folded top section, make a narrow hem at the sides, stitch top hem across curtain. Run another line of stitching about an inch above the hemline. This gives you easing and heading for the curtain. The dressing-table skirt is made the same way, except that an extra row of rick-rack is added to the top.

Bridges Trial Winding Up

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The fourth trial in longshore boss Harry Bridges' 16 year fight to escape deportation to his native Australia was expected to end today with final arguments by defense and prosecution attorneys.

Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman will take the three-week-old case under submission after final arguments are made by Chief Assistant U. S. Atty. Lynn Gillard and Defense Counsel Telford Taylor.

Although the decision could be read from the bench following the proceedings, it is expected that it will take Goodman at least three weeks to file an opinion and decision.

Bridges, president of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, is charged with fraudulently obtaining U.S. citizenship by lying about his Communist Party affiliations.

The 54-year-old labor leader was the final witness for the defense yesterday. He testified on the origin of the portion of the ILWU constitution which historically permitted membership regardless of race, creed or political affiliation.

The government declined to cross-examine Bridges before resting its case.

Unions Seek Pension Plan

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Representatives of the AFL Masters Mates & Pilots, CIO Marine Engineers and CIO American Radio Association asked for a pension plan during contract negotiations with the Pacific Maritime Association this week.

The three unions sought an 85-cent-a-day contribution by the ship owners for a pension plan equal to one recently negotiated in the East and Gulf Coasts.

Philip O'Rourke, vice president of the radiomen's union, denied that his members threatened to strike if their demands were not met by midnight tonight, contract expiration date.

He said it had been agreed to extend the contract covering his group pending outcome of the present negotiations.

Save Hands From Ravages Of Housework

Today's homemaker puts her hands through tougher paces than ever did the frontier woman.

Each new wonder product that's invented to take the stain out of socks, the dirt out of clothes, the moths out of woollens, the smell out of kitchens and the wax off floors goes to work on her hands.

Allergists and dermatologists have found that some women use so many soaps, cleansers and soapless detergents that they have finally sensitized themselves to even the baby's soap, and break out from washing baby off.

It's impossible to stop using these household products. They do the job well and few women can simply halt their household duties.

A product that may help women who suffer "homemaker's hands" has just been introduced.

This is a barrier cream. It is put on the skin, to protect rather than heal. And it acts just like a pair of gloves in keeping out soap and water. It may appeal to many women who find they can't grip dishes or laundry when they're wearing gloves.

It was first used in industries where the workers had to have their hands in irritating substances and was found quite successful.

There are two kinds of this cream. One is designed for wet work and requires a double application and setting; and the other is for dry work. Both are invisible and should not affect foods.
