She was native in Farm Bureau work since 1947, and held a number of offices in the organization. For the past several years, she served as county secretary and as representative of the Farm Bureau Insurance Co. Until her last illness, she was associated with her husband in operation of the Juniper Lawn Dairy.

Rev. D. L. Penhollow will officiate at the funeral. Burial will be in Deschutes Memorial Gardens north of Bend.

Orecan Company Brings in Well

PORTLAND (UP)—Oregon investors in Orecan, Oregon - Canadian Oil Company, were gleeful today over reports that the company's first well in the Williston basin of Saskatchewan had turned out to be a gusher.

Ronald B. Sorenson, vice president of the Orecan Company with offices here, said the well blew in Saturday, shooting 90 feet in the air.

Sorenson added that it is too early to tell about how big a producer the well will be and that there has been no test on quality of oil, which he said could vary from \$1 to \$3.75 per barrel.

"In any case, we don't plan to start paying any dividends yet," he said. Sorenson said plans were being made to drill two other wells immediately and if they look good 21 other wells would be developed. He denied reports of a \$1000 per month return on \$100 investments.

Lewis Dillman, Portland realtor, is president of Orecan. The company sold 100,000 shares of stock at \$1 per share in Oregon, mainly in Portland, Eugene and The Dalles.

Permit Issued For New Church

A \$12,000 building permit was issued by City Recorder Julie Johnson yesterday for the construction of a Jehovah Witness church at 502 E. Revere st.

Church members will undertake the contracting work themselves. The design is also to be done by members of the congregation.
