All Stars Stun Cleveland 30-27

Pro Champions Put on Pressure In Final Half

CHICAGO (UP)—Curly Lambeau's hand-picked collegiate football players can play professional style as well as the best of the veterans. It appeared today.

Lambeau's 1955 aggregation, selected to play the platoon system, were more adept in both offense and defense than the National Football League champion Cleveland Browns and turned on the pressure in the last half for a 30-27 victory in the 22nd annual battle Friday night.

There were nearly as many heroes as All Stars, but tiny Tad Weed, a 146-pound left-footed place kicker from Ohio State, L.G. Dupre, speedy halfback from Baylor, and Ralph Guglielmi, Notre Dame quarterback who played the full game for the collegians, stood out on offense.

On defense the flashiest were linebacker Tom Bettis of Purdue, tackle Rocky Grier of Penn State, and Jim Temp of Wisconsin, and halfback Frank Bernardi of Colorado.

Weed set a game record with three field goals, from the 28, 20 and 41 yard lines, while Guglielmi completed 10 of 19 passes for 129 yards and hit Henry Hair of Georgia with a five yard pitch for one touchdown.

Dupre ran for 74 yards on 12 carries and caught three passes for 49 yards, including one 19 yard toss which took the Stars to the pro's one yard line to set up a touchdown by Toledo's Mel Triplett.

The final All Star touchdown was by Frank Eldon of Southern Methodist on a two yard plunge after Ron Drawiecki of Marquette returned a kickoff 48 yards and Dupre turned in a 19 yard run to get in scoring position.

The Browns stayed in contention in the first half when George Ratterman plunged a yard for one touchdown, passed to Ray Rindro for 25 yards for another and Rindro ran 18 yards for a third. But the All Star defense held Cleveland, winners of a divisional or league championship every year since 1950, without a first down for more than 20 minutes of the last half.

Morrison Closes Gap
Then, trailing by 10 points, Ratterman sparked a passing surge downfield which ended when Fred Morrison plunged from the five for the final pro points.

The victory was the seventh for the collegians in the annual struggle, in which the pro's have won 13 and tied two. The last All Star win was in 1950, 17-7 over Philadelphia.

This year was the first the All Stars were coached by professional mentors, and the team played like pros. The 30 points was a new high for a college team in the event, surpassing the 28 scored against Washington's 16 in 1938 and the 28 scored against Green Bay's 45 in 1940.

The Bend team will be without the services of one of its most consistent point winners, Robin Chapman, who underwent an emergency appendectomy Thursday. She is now convalescing at St. Charles hospital.

CHICAGO (UP)—Bulging Bob Rosburg, 28-year-old father of three children, headed a contingent of youthful golfers and a graybeard into the third round of Tam O'Shanter's money-laden "World Championship" Golf Tournament today.

Rosburg refused to yield to the pressure attendant with this tournament Friday as he birdied seven of the first 11 holes on the way to a 67 which gave him a two-day total of 133.

The mark was good for a two-shot edge on Wally Ulrich, Rochester, Minn., also a well-oldested golfer and like Rosburg, one of the younger bright-lights on the golf circuit.

Ulrich shot the best round of the day, a six under par 66 which gave him a halfway mark of 135. Three strokes back of Ulrich was a man almost old enough to be his father, gray-haired Henry Ransom, who stayed in contention with a 70 for 138.

Cleveland Indians Stretch Winning Streak to 5 Games

The Cleveland Indians stretched their winning streak to five games today in the first "big move" calculated to break the log jam at the top of the American League standings.

The Indians swept to the flag last year on a combination of sound pitching and long-ball hitting—and that's exactly the formula they used in sweeping Friday's day-night doubleheader from the Kansas City Athletics, 17-1 and 6-5. The five-game streak is their sec-

ond longest of the campaign and the best any of the four contenders has put together in three weeks.

As a result, the Indians opened up a one-game first-place lead on the Chicago White Sox—not much of a margin but the longest any A.L. team has held since Chicago held the same lead on Aug. 3. The White Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers, 2-1, Friday night but dropped back a half game. Third-place New York and fourth-place Boston were rained out of scheduled games with Baltimore and Washington.

The Indians celebrated Bob Lemon's return to the starting rotation in the afternoon game with a thunderous 18-hit barrage that included a grand slam homer by Jim Hegan and two homers by Bobby Avila. Avila also singled and drove in a total of six runs in the Indians' second biggest offensive outburst of the campaign.

Jim Rivera, who had enjoyed a field day against Kansas City on Thursday, blasted a two-run homer in the fifth inning to give the White Sox the only runs they needed to

beat the Tigers. Virgil Trucks received credit for his 11th triumph, aided by Dixie Howell's shutout relief work in the last 1-3-3 innings. Bob Rush turned in a five-hitter as the Chicago Cubs wallbanged the Milwaukee Braves, 7-1, and the St. Louis Cardinals rallied for three runs in the ninth to beat the Cincinnati Redlegs, 8-7, in National League action. Heavy rains washed

out the four Eastern teams but the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers' lead was increased to 16½ games as a result of Milwaukee's loss and their "magic number" for pennant clinching was reduced to 25.

Gene Baker and Ransom Jackson drove in five runs between them as the Cubs snapped a three-game losing streak and handed the Braves their fourth loss in a row. Rush's record is now 9-8.
