

Football Moves Into Spotlight Here This Week

Football moves into the local spotlight this week. Physical examinations will be given Thursday, Aug. 25, at the high school gym for all prospective varsity and junior varsity grid-ers. Exams will start at 7 p.m. Uniforms and equipment will be issued at Bruin stadium dressing room Friday and Saturday, Aug. 26-27, from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. At least one of the coaches will be at the field house each afternoon from 1 to 3 for shoes.

New head coach Tom Winbiger announced that the first football practice will be held Monday, Aug. 29. He plans "daily double" practice sessions the first week, with workouts at both 9 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Winbiger, along with his two new aides Floyd Holt, end coach, and Don McCauley, line coach, is anxious to get started. He indicated that he may shift several players to different positions in order to field the best possible eleven.

Golfers Record Creditable Mark

N. and Owen Pinner of Bend turned in very creditable performances, firing a 78-73-150 to place eighth in the annual father-and-son golf tournament Sunday at the Lake Oswego Golf and country club, just seven strokes off the winning pace. Underdog Melis Defeats Nocero

NEW YORK (UP) — Paolo Melis of Montreal, former welterweight champion of Italy, was matched today for a 10-round TV fight with seventh-ranked Chico Vejar at St. Nicholas Arena on Oct. 17 as a reward for Monday night's victory over middleweight Rinao Nocero.

Melis, an 11-5 underdog, won a unanimous 15-round decision over Nocero of Brooklyn in their TV bout at St. Nick's Tugby Nocero lost two rounds on low-blow fouls and was warned four other times for rough-house tactics.

Matchmaker Tex Sullivan said today, "We have closed for Melis and Vejar on Oct. 17. But, of course, if anything happens to Vejar on Sept. 14 in his fight with Tony DeMarco in Boston, we'll have to get another opponent for Melis."

That other opponent would be the winner of next Monday night's fight at St. Nick's between welterweights Gene Poirier of Niagara Falls, N.Y., and Chris Christensen of Denmark, Sullivan said.

Carole Jo Wins Charlotte Match

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UP) — Two 17-year-olds from the north woods turned the National Women's Amateur golf tournament today into a teen-age neighborhood tangle for the second round.

Anne Quast of Marysville, Wash. and Carole Jo Kabler of Roseburg, Ore., drew the attention from the older heads expected to finally fight it out toward the title round four days hence.

Miss Quast pulled the biggest of several upsets on the first day of the tournament, trouncing Mrs. Grace Dennis Smith, a Curtis Cupper from Coral Gable, Fla., 3 and 1.

Not even the luck of the blind draw figured that one, which put the apple-checked Washington miss up against Miss Kabler, the blonde who won the National Junior miss golf title only last week.

Carole Jo defeated Naomi Venable of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., 6 and 5 without doing any damage to the par 71 Myers Park Country Club course. But after a start in keeping with her company Miss Kabler played holes from 7 through 13, where she closed the date, in one under par.

Miss Quast by contrast had a pressure battle for most of her match with Mrs. Smith but she had a more wide-eyed stamina than her opponent in the 90-degree heat of the mid-afternoon. Both had double bogeys on the front nine as they turned even, with Miss Quast having a two-stroke better medal score.

At the 14th, Miss Quast went ahead to stay when Mrs. Smith's tee offering went into the rough. A three-put 16th for Mrs. Smith and Anne's birdie on 17 finished it.

EUGENE — Corvallis Elks continued to hold the wharomy signs over Bend VFW, bouncing the Central Oregon champs from the 1955 State softball tournament with a 7-1 victory Monday night in the opening game of a tripleheader. The Elks topped Bend, 2-1, Saturday in eight innings.

The Elks took advantage of wildness on the part of starter Mary Lines and pushed across two runs in the opening frame on five free passes and a single by George Sprick before Tom Ray could be rushed in to strike out Dick Sprick with the bases loaded.

Bend appeared to be back in the game in its half of the first when Jones walked and John Newell drove a double down the left field line, but the umpire ruled it foul.

Giants Favored Against Rams

PORTLAND (UP) — The New York football Giants were a solid one-touchdown favorite today to ship the Los Angeles Rams in Portland's Multnomah Stadium Sunday night.

The New York team assumed the role of favorite after besting the San Francisco 49ers in Seattle last Saturday. The Giants won by a 28-17 score.

Quarterbacks Charlie Conerly and Don Heinrich and fullback Bobby Epps were expected to provide the offensive punch for the Giants, more than offsetting the throwing arm of the Rams' Norm Van Brocklin.

Corvallis added an earned insurance run in the sixth on a walk, passed ball, and Newell's error.

Sprick struck out at least one Bend batter each inning to run his total to 11 for the evening. He whiffed the final five men to face him.

Mill City nudged Sheridan, 3 to 2, in another loser's bracket game.

Eugene was alone in the unbeaten ranks following a 3-to-0 win over Oregon City. Ron Willoughby struck out nine and only gave up two hits in twirling the win.

Corvallis and Mill City meet tonight, and the game's winner will meet Oregon City in a second game tonight for a berth in the finals Wednesday opposite Eugene.
