Moore 4 to 1 Underdog Against Rocky Tonight

NEW YORK (UP)—The "boner" postponement that sends Rocky Marciano and Archie Moore into the ring tonight for their heavy-weight championship fight left the odds unchanged at 4-1 but may boost the gate toward \$500,000.

With the weather lid lifted by a forecast of "cool and fair," officials of the International Boxing Club figured today's rush of ticket buyers might swell the crowd at Yankee Stadium to 70,000. Fresh

sales were in the ratio of nearly 5-1 to refunds. Despite challenger Moore's nervousness during Tuesday's physical examination and the general belief that the 24-hour delay would bother him more than the "ice-cold champion," the betting price remained static. Unbeaten Marciano and the 35-year-old light heavyweight champion were slated for another physical exam today, but they need not undergo the ordeal of another weigh-in.

Their respective trainers pointed out that the weights Tuesday—Rocky 185 1/2 and Archie 185—were about what was expected.

Many boxing men figured promoter Jim Norris had "pulled a prize boner" Tuesday when he deferred the fight 24 hours because of a bad-weather threat that never materialized. He announced the washout at 10 a.m., but less than an hour later the skies were clearing and Hurricane Ione veered out to sea. It was the first time an important title bout had been postponed before the weigh-in.

Norris denied any boner. He explained: "I would do it again. We had no choice. Forecasts from all weather bureaus—government, Navy and flying fields—were hopelessly gloomy. And we were being bombarded by railroads and air companies for instructions whether to start their special flight trains and planes for New York."

Before the box-offices reopened this morning, Norris said the ticket sale was slightly more than \$700,000. He expected a rush today and until fight-time tonight at the stadium for medium-priced \$20 and \$30 tickets. In addition, 8,000 general admission \$5 seats will go on sale at the stadium at 7 p.m.

Tonight's starting time was set back 15 minutes to 10:45 p.m. to avoid conflict with the regularly scheduled Wednesday night home TV scrap between middleweights Bobby Dykes and Georgia Johnson at Miami Beach.

OSC Hoping To Surprise Foe Saturday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis — Oregon State's black-garbed football warriors, who impressed everyone but themselves in last Saturday's 33-0 victory over Brigham Young, will attempt to surprise a favored Stanford university squad Saturday night in Portland's Multnomah stadium.

Kickoff time for the 25th renewal of the Stanford-OSC series is set for 8 p.m., and ticket manager Jim Barratt of Oregon State has predicted a crowd of "at least 20,000" for Portland's first college game of the year.

A great deal of interest centered about the Orangemen in their first outing, especially since they sported both a new coaching staff and an offensive formation brand new to Beaver grid fortunes. The 8,000 fans who sat on in Parker stadium as the Beavers rolled over BYU were not disappointed.

OSC romped to five touchdowns that counted, and these more that were nullified by 13 penalties charged to the over-eager band. Only one injury resulted from the onslaught, but one that might prove crucial to Oregon State. Tailback Joe Francis, the hula-tipped Hawaiian sophomore, sprained an ankle early in the contest, and during the practice week has been almost out of action. Head coach Tommy Prothro said that he hoped to have Francis in the starting lineup Saturday night, but was making plans in the event the triple-threat was unable to play.

Transfer Bernard Bruce, who ran and passed for 90 yards against the Cougars, will move into the top spot, with fullback Ernie Zwahlen being groomed for possible tailback duty. Also, Roy Westfall, who didn't even suit up for the opener, may be back in harness. Westfall was No. 2 quarterback for last year's T-formations Beavers, and can handle all three departments, run, pass and kick.

Same Lineup Planned
Prothro said that he contemplated few changes if any in the lineup that started against BYU. That lineup had Dan Naranche and Norm Thiel at ends; Howard Buetgenbach and John Witte at tackles; Bob Riggert and Vern Elison at guards; and Larry Stevens at center. Ron Siegrist is slated to open at quarterback; Francis or Bruce and Sam Wesley at halfbacks; and Tom Berry at full-

back. In the National League, Willie Mays hit his 49th and 50th homers as the New York Giants walloped the Pittsburgh Pirates, 11-1 and 14-8. Mays, who leads Ted Kluszewski by five homers in their race, has tied a mark by hitting seven homers in six games and needs one more round-tripper to equal Johnny Mize's club record established in 1947.

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Blevins Leading Score Maker

Shelby Blevins, Bend's pile-driving fullback, picked up another pair of touchdowns against Sweet Home to maintain his two touchdowns-a-game average and grab the Central Oregon scoring lead. Blevins has 24 points.

Dale Shumway, Prineville's shifty scatback hurried in a great game against Redmond, but was held to one point as two of his touchdowns were nullified by penalties. Norm Pease, Bend, moved

into third place on a two TD performance against the Huskies. Ten players are tied with six points apiece, including Bill St. John, Bruin extra-point specialist.

Rapid Rich Youngs, Culver one-man scoring machine, tackled another point on to his six-man lead as he racked up 20 points to keep up his average of four touchdowns per game. He has 33 points. Sisters Leonard Langley took over undisputed second place with 4 TDs for 13 points.

Red Hot Yanks Stretch Gap Over Second Place Indians

The Cleveland Indians had just one edge on Archie Moore today as both awaited the inevitable—the New York Yankees can't beat Rocky Marciano to the knockout punch.

All the relentless Yankees can do tonight is clinch a tie for the American League title. They'll do that if they beat the Washington Senators a third straight time and the Indians lose to the Chicago White Sox. But they can't deliver the kyo blow until at least Friday.

The Indians made certain of that Tuesday night when they snapped a four-game losing streak with a "back-to-the-wall" 3-2 triumph over the White Sox. The victory did little more than prolong the agony, however, as the Yankees beat the Senators, 6-3 and 9-7, in a day-night doubleheader and went 2 1/2 games ahead of the tribe.

As a result any combination of Yankee victories and Cleveland losses totaling three will clinch Casey Stengel's sixth flag in seven

years. The Yankees have five games left while the Indians have four.

Wynn Pitches Victory
Early Wynn yielded 10 hits and stranded 11 White Sox batters and pitched his way out of a ninth-inning threat to win his 17th game of the year.

Bobby Avila, the AL's 1954 batting champion, struck out the big blow for the Indians—a two-run triple in the eighth inning that snapped a 1-1 deadlock.

The Yankees' nighttime victory—mathematically knocked the White Sox out of the race.
