## Church Official From Liberia To Speak Here

The Episcopal bishop of the missionary district of Liberia, west Africa, will be in Bend this week. He is the Rt. Rev. Bravid W. Harris, D.D., and he will be speaker at services at Trinity Episcopal church in Bend Thursday night, at 7:30, with all interested invited to attend. Following the service there will be an informal meeting in the parish hall, with women of the church to serve cake, pie and coffee.

Bishop Harris was for 20 years rector of Grace church, Norfolk, Va., and from 1937 to 1944 was also archdeacon for Negro work in the diocese of Southern Virginia. It was in 1943 that Bishop Harris became secretary for Negro work in the division of home mission of the church's national council, a position he held until his election and consecration to the episcopate in 1945.

Bishop Harris was one of three missionary bishops selected to address the Anglican Congress, which met in Minneapolis, Minn. in 1954.

"Bishop Harris has been described as one of the great men of the church," Rev. Claire T. Crenshaw, rector of the local Episcopal church, said.
