California Tops In Wine Making

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UP) — California again leads the nation in making wine, but more is drunk per person in Washington, D.C. than in any other area of the U.S. The California Wine Institute reports a recent survey shows this state moved 24,969,000 gallons of wine into consumption channels in 1954. New York state was second with 22,461,000 gallons and Pennsylvania third with 9,816,000 gallons.

The District of Columbia had a consumption rate of 2½ gallons per person. California was second with just under two gallons per capita.

Look Around At Passengers

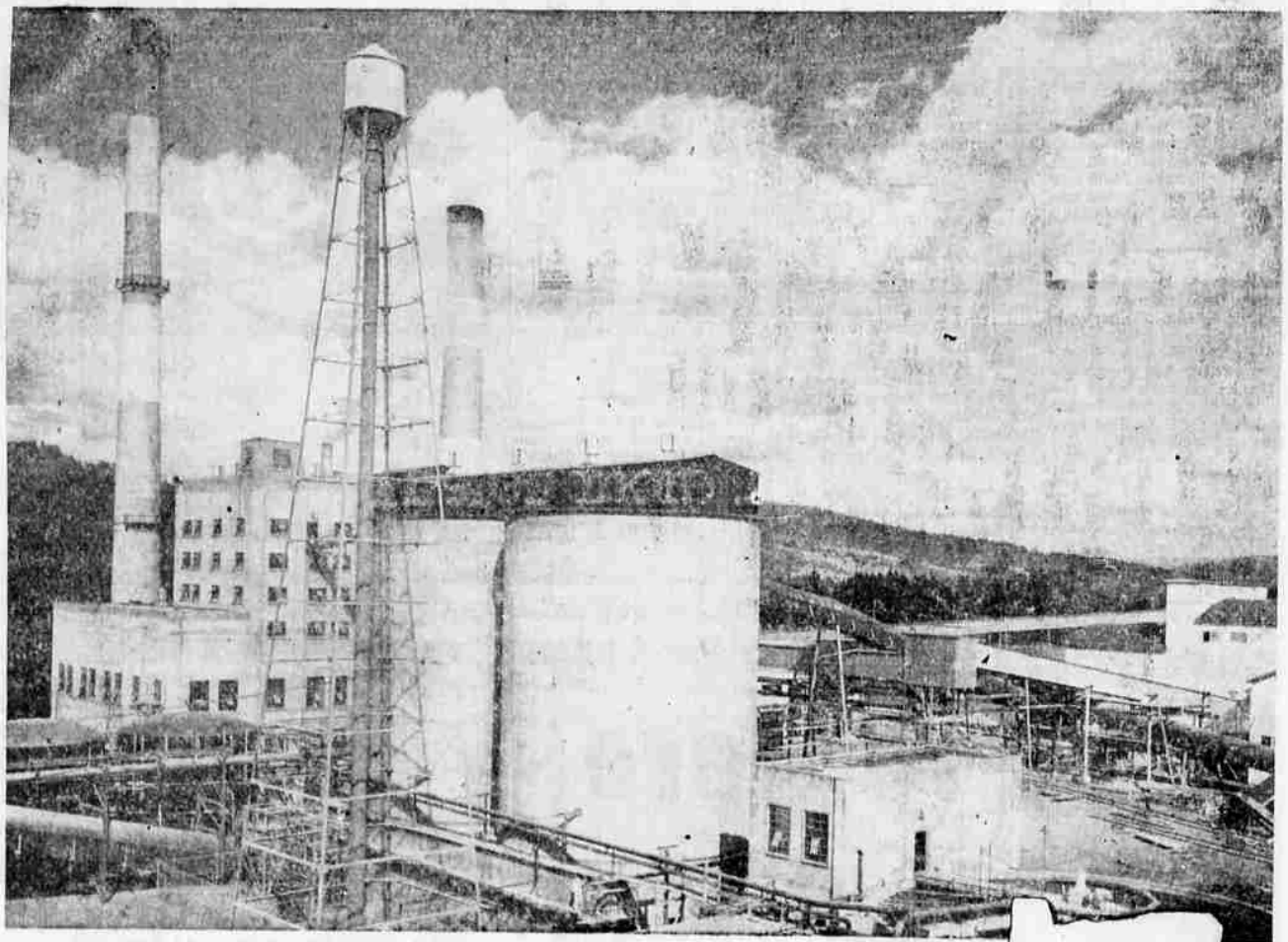
BUFFALO, N. Y. (UP) — Is the driver who's operating the bus you are boarding an expert at his job — or below par?
