

To be exact one could hardly call KBND's "boiled down" version of the Survey an accurate yardstick of Central Oregon listenership in 1953; BECAUSE THE ENTIRE MADRAS PORTION OF THE POUR CITY SURVEY WAS OMITTED when the survey was reduced to a "population breakdown by a Bend CPA. Certainly the town of Madras, where KBND had but 17.2% of the audience, could not be considered OUTSIDE the "Central Oregon Trade Area" because every important publication including "Patterns of Income and Retail Trade in Oregon" defines Deschutes, Crook AND Jefferson county as the Central Oregon Trade Area, and Madras has always been represented on the Central Oregon C. of C. In fact KBND's average share of audience for Redmond and Prineville combined was only 27.9% so out of all four cities, KBND ACTUALLY only had a majority in Bend. Yet by applying Bend's population, which is nearly twice the total of Redmond and Prineville together, to KBND's Bend majority and by the OMISSION of their 17.2% rating in Madras, KBND was able to come up with a "55% of the audience figure" which you were told represented listing preference not only in Bend but in Redmond and Prineville, Naturally in their summary no mention was made of the following statement by Edon C.
