

UCLA Favored By 13 Points Over Iowa Team

Defending national champion UCLA, dangerous Miami of Florida, and unbeaten, united Boston College are favored to score victories in three big inter-sectional football games that start the college football weekend off in high gear.

UCLA, ranked fifth nationally, is favored by 13 points over Iowa, ranked No. 13, in a clash that is expected to draw another huge crowd to the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Miami of Florida, is favored by just six points as host to Texas Christian, a Southwest Conference powerhouse beaten only once in five games and then by three points. Miami had hopes of national honors this year but has been jolted out of the high ratings by a one-touchdown loss to Georgia Tech and a two-touchdown loss to Notre Dame. The Hurricanes know this is probably their last chance this year, and they're anxious not to fumble again.

Although inter-sectional games highlight tonight's gridiron program, conference battles will provide most of the spice Saturday. For example, first place will be at stake in the Big Ten, Big Seven, and Southwest Conferences, where teams previously unbeaten in league warfare collide. Wisconsin (22-0) and Ohio State (1-0), defending Big Ten champ, battle for a share of that circuit's title. Oklahoma (11-0) in league play, the nation's No. 3 team which is unbeaten in 48 straight league games and also is riding a 23-game winning streak that is the longest in the nation, faces probably its toughest Big Seven test of the year in Colorado (2-0) but is a 14-point favorite. And Texas A&M, surprise conqueror of Texas Christian, battles Baylor in the Southwest with the Aggies picked by six.

Like Oklahoma and UCLA, all other teams in the nation's "top ten" are favorites Saturday. Michigan, No. 1, is favored by 23 over Minnesota in the "Little Brown Jug" classic; Maryland, No. 2, is favored by 15 over the Syracuse team that upset Army last week; Navy, No. 4, is "only" a 2-point choice over hapless Pennsylvania; Michigan State, No. 5, is picked by 13 to follow up its victory over Notre Dame by beating Illinois; Duke, No. 7, is favored by eight over Pittsburgh; Auburn, No. 8, is favored over Furman by no great a margin that no points are quoted; Southern California, No. 9, is favored by 20 over California; and Notre Dame, No. 10, is the narrowest favorite among the "top ten" by only seven points over Purdue.

There will be four regionally televised games Saturday: Southern California - California in the West; Minnesota - Michigan in the Midwest; and Princeton - Cornell and Harvard - Dartmouth in the East. In the eastern games, Princeton and Cornell are rated even money and Harvard is favored by six points.

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Turner Facing Logart Tonight

NEW YORK (UP)—Middleweight Gil Turner, who would clearly love to get even with former welterweight champ Kid Gavilan, will try to do it by proxy tonight at Madison Square Garden when he fights Isaac Logart, the youngster they are calling "the new Gavilan."

Turner, 10th ranking contender in the middleweight division, is a 25 favorite over Logart in the TV radio 10-rounder that brings boxing back to the Garden after a six weeks absence.

Turner of Philadelphia was cruising along on a fine welterweight career back in 1952 when champion Gavilan, the "Cotton Keel," spoiled everything by knocking him out. So far at least, that knox has prevented Turner from scaling the fistic heights.

Logart, 22, hails from Gavilan's home town of Camaguey, Cuba. Moreover, he's adopted "The Keel's" flashy, burly style. He even wears high white ring shoes like Gavilan and he's announced he wants to bring the welter crown back to Cuba.

Turner, 25, is favored because of his experience and his persistent aggressiveness. Contracts for tonight's bout provide that neither man may weigh more than 155 pounds.

Renewal of Grid Rivalry Awaited

CORVALLIS (UP)—Oregon State and Washington State renew their old football rivalry here tomorrow with both clubs seeking "revenge" before a homecoming crowd.

Oregon State wants to make up for a 34-6 loss suffered last year at Pullman in a game that had been considered even. Washington State wants to get even for the 7-0 defeat it suffered here in 1953 when it was heavily favored.

Leading the Beaver attack will be tailback Joe Francis who has picked up 131 yards rushing and 316 yards passing to rank second in total offense in the PCC with 49 yards. He has completed 17 of 33 passes for a .515 percentage.

One of the top Cougar backs is Bob Iverson who ranks sixth in the league in passing, just ahead of Francis, with 18 for 37 for 248 yards.

Game time is 1:30 p.m.

Santee Beats Arch Rival, Fred Dwyer

NEW YORK (UP)—Wes Santee, razor-sharp while whipping arch-rival Fred Dwyer in his first indoor mile in seven months, said today cross-country running may help him regain the board record for the distance.

Santee climaxed the Olympic Sports Carnival at Madison Square Garden Thursday night by sprinting from behind in the last lap to beat Dwyer by 30 yards in the invitation mile. The time was a sparkling 4:05.2.

It was Santee's finest performance and fastest clocking in the Garden, where he won several times in slower times last winter. His best previous garden time was a 4:06.5 effort while he and Dwyer wrestled and tussled in Gunnar Nielsen's wake last Feb. 5. The Dane set a world indoor clocking of 4:03.6 in that race, bettering the 4:03.8 mark Santee had set in Boston the previous week.

Gives More Endurance
"I think cross-country racing is going to help me indoors," Santee said. "I believe it's going to give me more endurance and make me sharper. If everything works out, I don't see why I shouldn't get down to Nielsen's time."

Santee's performance Thursday night was even more remarkable because he and the other mileers had to jog about for nearly an hour before the scheduled start of the race while world skating champions Tenley Albright and Hayes Alan Jenkins did encores during the six-spot program.

Billy Tidwell of Emporia State was third and ex-Georgetown runner Joe Lapierre was fourth.

In the other track events, Pvt. Lang Stanley of the Army ran a half mile in 1:34.8 to defeat Lt. Lon Spurrier of the Air Force by two yards; and Dick Majooco of New York defeated Lt. Jim Lea of the Air Force by two yards with a 50.7 clocking in the quarter-mile. Tennessee State, with Mae Fagus running the anchor leg, won the four-lap women's relay in 1:19.5.

The carnival, which attracted 10,300 fans, opened a nation-wide drive to raise one million dollars to send 500 of the country's top amateur athletes to the 1956 winter and summer Olympic games.

Ensign Wins Wrestling
In the fencing action, Harold Goldsmith of New York defeated Albert Axelrod of New York in the foil match and George Worth of New York defeated Richard Dyer of Philadelphia in a saber contest. Ensign Pete Blair of the Navy defeated Bill Oberly of Penn State in the free-style wrestling and Jim Peckham of Boston defeated Henry Hansen of New York in Greco-Roman wrestling.

Besides Miss Albright of Newton Center, Mass., and Jenkins of Colorado Springs, Colo., the Heiss trio—Carol, 15, Nancy, 15, and Bruce, 12—also did some fancy figure skating. Dave Jenkins was the other ice performer.

Paul Anderson, the world's strongest man, featured the weight lifting by hoisting 380 pounds and pumping it up and down over his head. Tommy Kono of Sacramento, Calif., and Pete George of Akron, Ohio, who joined Anderson of Tacoma, Ga., in winning titles after world championships last week in Germany, also demonstrated their lifting prowess.

Coach Keith DeCourcy's Crook County Cowboys can run their latest victory streak to six games and cinch their fourth straight district 8-A-2 grid championship with a win over Lakeview tonight. The Cowboys backed into at least a tie for the title last week when unbeaten Lakeview fell to Redmond, 32 to 13.

Cowboy stock went up considerably with a surprise 26-to-12 victory over sixth-ranked Cottage Grove last week, and the "Pole" will be heavy favorites to hand the host Hufkers their second straight setback.

After dropping their opener to Albany, 19-22, the Cowboys picked up steam and rolled over Redmond, 13-6, The Dalles, 20-13, Madras, 49-18, Burns, 33-0, and Cottage Grove on successive Fridays.

With his high-powered offense finally clicking, DeCourcy's main worry is defense. The Cowboys are not exactly pushovers on defense, with Leroy Jones, Ted Henry, Wayne DeMaris, Charley Hugh banks, and Dick Woods, but have failed to live up to DeCourcy's high expectations so far.

Offense is in the capable hands of Bill Parrish, sparkling sophomore quarterback. When Parrish isn't passing, he can usually call on Dale Shumway and Dick Duffin for large chunks of ground yardage.

By a unanimous vote last night, the softball association voted to construct a brand new softball field in the area adjacent to the new senior high school. The field will be laid out just southeast of the gymnasium.

The association will submit their decision to the school board for final approval.

Hank Greenberg Offers Plan to Save Floundering S. F. Seals

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Hank Greenberg, who saved many a ball game with his home runs, today offered to rescue the floundering San Francisco Seals and only formal approval by the PCL stood between the famous slugger and one of baseball's worst headaches.

After 72 hours of palaver, which saw one press conference postponed for a full day, Greenberg announced Thursday that he had offered to buy the debt-ridden Pacific Coast League club on a "clean deal or no deal" basis.

By that, the general manager of the Cleveland Indians said he would put \$150,000 in the bank for operating capital and hope to pay off the Seals' \$200,000 in back bills with the profits accrued from having a winning ball club. He pointed out that he would have access to the Cleveland farm system.

Greenberg—insisting, however, that this was a personal venture on his part and not a move by the Cleveland organization—said that if the deal went through he would hope to bring "major league baseball out here eventually."

League President Claire V. Goodwin said he would start to poll the eight club owners (directors) today by phone. Six are needed to approve a new owner but Goodwin said he would like to get an 8-0 vote for him.

Dark-haired Greenberg, who has made the switch from first base to high finance with amazing ease, characterized the Seals' financial plight as "unique."

"They lost \$900,000 in the past seven years, and now owe about \$200,000," Greenberg said. "My proposition is to put \$150,000 in the bank, take over the club then hope to make a profit so we can pay off the debts on a proportionate basis in the form of debentures, which are notes."

Greenberg said he preferred this to being obligated to pay everybody at once.

In the meantime, Joseph Cairnes—executive vice president of the Milwaukee Braves—left today with the words that his club still would be interested if Greenberg's bid fell through.

Greenberg indicated there would be a general house-cleaning if he came in control but declined to say if Manager Tommy Heath would be retained.

"I'll surprise you," is the way he put it.

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SGN WITH ALL-STAR
NEW YORK (UP)—Ed Fleming, Niagara's all-time scoring leader and Dick Garmaker, who averaged 21.2 points for Minnesota last season, have signed to play with the College All-Stars against the New York Knickerbockers in an exhibition basketball game in Madison Square Garden, Oct. 30.

The new softball diamond will be a three-way proposition, with the softball association, the school board, and the city working in conjunction.

Plans are being made to have the field ready for the 1956 season. After discussing four sites, the softball association felt that this area was by far the best. Spectators will be able to use the parking facilities at the high school, while visiting teams will be able to use the showers and dressing rooms.

The field will serve high school physical education classes during the school year. The Bend high baseball team will also use the field as a practice field, but will continue to play all their games on Municipal field.

After school is out, the field will be turned over exclusively to the softball association. A temporary fence will then be put up around the outfield.

Plans call for dugouts, a press box, and a concession stand under the bleachers.

Softball officials agreed that it is a wonderful opportunity, but "We will have our work cut out for us and we are going to have to pitch in and help." Several fund raising campaigns are planned to help defray expenses.

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
