

# Hunting & Fishing

 Except for special hunts, today is the last day of deer season in Oregon. But even the hunters who failed to bag a buck or doe aren't too unhappy because tomorrow, Oct. 22, waterfowl and upland bird season opens throughout Oregon, one-half hour before sunrise.

In Central Oregon, the game commission predicts pheasant hunting should be fair to good in Wasco, Sherman and Jefferson counties. Quail hunting will be fair in Wasco county, good in Sherman county and excellent in Jefferson county. Waterfowl hunting will be poor in Central Oregon the commission says, because the big flocks of ducks and geese have not arrived.

Summer lake sounds good though with bird population in the area estimated at 125,000 geese, mostly snags, 20,000 ducks, and 1,200 to 1,500 honkers. Prospects for hunting are fair to good if the weather remains clear and good to excellent if it's stormy. More water is in the area than normally, adds the report.

The Klamath marshes will be good for ducks.  
 Pheasant hunting in the Summer lake area should be very good the first weekend.

Hunters are urged by the game commission to be on the lookout for chukar partridge and not to shoot them for Hungarian partridge. They are similar in color but larger. There is no open season on chukars, nor is one expected for a few years. The game commission office in Bend has a mounted chukar if you'd like to see what one looks like.

Hunting times are changed this year. Shooting time for both up-

land birds and waterfowl this year is one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, instead of noon as in previous years.

In Eastern Oregon the season will be open for pheasants, quail, and Hungarian partridge extending through November 13. In western Oregon, the season will be open for pheasants, valley and bobwhite quail extending through November 13 except in Clatsop and Marion counties where the season or quail will remain closed.

Bag limits on pheasants will be 1 cock per day, 12 in possession, in eastern Oregon, the bag limit on quail and partridge will be 10 per day in the aggregate, 20 possession. West of the Cascades the bag limit on quail will be 5 per day in the aggregate, 10 in possession.

The waterfowl season will extend from October 22 through January 9 for all species of ducks and geese except brant where the season will be from December 1 through February 10. The jack-snipe season will extend from November 27 through December 11.

Daily bag limits for ducks remain at 9, 15 in possession, providing such daily bag or possession limit contains not less than 3 wildfowl or pintails. One wood duck and one hooded merganser will be allowed in the daily bag limit.

Bag limit for geese is 6 daily or in possession, providing not more than 3 are of the dark species, in Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Linn, and Lane counties no more than 2 Canada geese may be allowed in the bag limit.

Other bag limits are 3 brant daily or in possession, 8 jack-snipe daily or in possession, and 25 coot daily or in possession.  
 Hunters are urged to consult the Oregon game synopsis for complete information pertaining to the upland bird regulations and the Oregon migratory waterfowl regulations. Copies of these regulations can be obtained at the game commission's Bend office and at all license agencies.

## Russ Acheson Offers Plan To Cut Length of Playoffs

Russ Acheson, Bend's energetic principal, hasn't given up in his attempt to reduce the lengthy district 8-A-1 basketball tournament.

Earlier this month at the district meeting in Albany, the motion for a single-elimination tournament introduced by Acheson failed, 4-3. However it was felt that there was not much of a margin of preference, and Acheson has come up with another idea.

In a letter sent to the principals, coaches, and athletic directors of all the district schools last week, he suggested stopping the tourney as soon as the third place team has been determined.

**4 Teams Qualify**  
 The top four teams in the district standings enter the district tourney. The two top teams automatically qualify for the state tournament, while the third place club meets the district 5 third place club.

The tournament is set for the South Salem gym, and it makes little difference to the valley schools whether it is single or double-elimination since they all are so close. But it works a real hardship on Bend.

Under Acheson's new proposal, the double-elimination tourney could be shortened from nine days to three.

There is an OSAA ruling that states that no basketball team can play more than four games in a seven day period, thus drawing out the tourney to nine days under the present plan.

Acheson illustrated his point by drawing a bracket. He had Bend losing its first game, and then coming back to win the remaining three games.

**10 Day Stay Too Long**  
 "This would mean that Bend would take up residence in Salem from February 28 to March 8, return to Bend for four days, and the depart for Eugene to participate in the state tournament," he pointed out. "This appears a little rugged for both ball players and Bend spectators and we doubt that it would strengthen the position of athletic championships in our district or in the state."

The group seemed in agreement that the purpose of the district tournament is to select the strongest teams to represent our district at the state tournament. If selection of teams for the state tourney is the true purpose of the district tournament, may we suggest that as soon as the third-place team has been determined that the district tournament be concluded. This plan would mean a maximum length of three days."

**Move Tourney Ahead?**  
 "May we also suggest that if no tie occurs for fourth place that the tournament date be moved up to Feb. 24. By adopting the shortened tournament plan and moving the date to Feb. 24 in case no tie occurs, the games could be played on two weekends and have time for the No. 3 team to play the No. 4 team from district 5."

The letter was signed by Russ Acheson, Stan Blair, athletic coordinator, and Glen Kinney, basketball coach.

The committee for this district is comprised of Carl Achenbrenner, chairman from South Salem, Lawrence Page, Lebanon, and Acheson. Oddly enough, these were the three schools that favored a single-elimination meet, but the committee doesn't make the final decision, it is always united action.

 Salem — Defense is getting plenty of attention in the Willamette Bearcat football camp this week as Coach Ted Ogdahl and assistant Jerry Long prime the WU crew for their important Saturday night Northwest Conference encounter with Dr. Paul Stagg's Pacific Badgers at McCulloch Stadium.

While the 'Cat offense drew praise in last week's losing venture against College of Idaho, defense—particularly aerial defense—left things to be desired. Holes in pass defense cost the Willamette two touchdowns against the Coyotes, who won the game 29-13.

Main load of the Willamette attack against Pacific will be carried by the passing arms of Benny Holt and Jerry McCallister and the scampering of Windy Squireira, Bobby Zoelch and George Koani. Holt is scheduled to start the tilt but may see only limited action because of a stubborn arm injury. McCallister, now the squad's No. 1 quarterback, turned in a sparkling job with 11 completions in 17 tries after relieving the ailing Holt.

Dean Benson, veteran end and ace pass receiver, continues to be a question mark because of a foot injury. Also on the injury list are Blankman Gerry Kangas and tackle Vern Coats. Kangas has an ailing knee that may limit his play Saturday night, while Coates is suffering from a stiff neck.

While the Marshfield-Eugene game highlights weekend prep activity, there are plenty of other "crucials" on tap.

Jefferson of Portland, trying for another city title, clashes with Roosevelt in the Rose City's top game. Gresham, ranked second in the coaches' poll, meets North Salem in a non-counting game. Milwaukie travels to South Salem, while Central Catholic is idle.

Pendleton is favored over Hermon in the big one east of the mountains. La Grande travels to The Dalles and Baker is at Mac-Hi.

Ontario, a power in A-2 ranks, is favored over Meadida, Idaho, while defending state champ Vale is idle. St. Helens can nail down the subdistrict 1-A-2 crown with a win over Rainier. Prineville, again trying for A-2 honors, is at Lakeview, while Junction City, an unbeaten A-2 club, is at Creswell.

Unbeaten Hillsboro is heavily favored over wireless Tigard, while McMinnville, another top TVY league club, is at Forest Grove. Oregon City and West Linn clash in their annual battle while Beaverton is at Newberg.

Down south, Grants Pass, making a late-season comeback, travels to Roseburg while Medford entertains Eureka, Calif. Klamath Falls also plays an out-of-state team, Reno, while Ashland meets Crater High.

Corvallis, loser only to Gresham, starts in earnest after district 8 honors by meeting Sweet Home. Albany hosts Springfield and Lebanon is at Bend in other 8-A games.

## Webfoots Leave For Arizona

**EUGENE (UP)**—A 37-man University of Oregon football squad left here today for Tucson and tomorrow night's battle with the University of Arizona, the sixth team in a row to outweigh Coach Len Casanova's Webfoots.

The Arizona team, which holds among its victories a 47-14 triumph over Idaho, averages 212 in the line to 199 for Oregon. The backfields average 180 pounds each.

Oregon will face one of the nation's top backs in Art Luppino, who has been among the rushing leaders for two seasons.

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
