Pontiacs Here; Display Readied

The new 1956 Pontiac models which went on display here at Ward Motor Co. today and in dealer showrooms across the nation on the same date, introduce a General Motors "first", a completely new "Hydra-Matic" transmission. Called Strato-Flight by engineers, the new transmission is designed to provide smoother, quieter shifting of gears.

The Pontiac Strato-Streak V-8 engine, introduced last year, is larger in 1956 with horsepower upped to 227 in the Star Chief and 205 in the 870 and 860 series. Fifteen new body styles, longer by 2.4 inches, include six "hardtop" Catalinas, three of them four-door and three two-door. These models are available in all three series, the Star Chief, 870 and 860.

There is a choice of 57 new colors in "Vogue" two-toning or solid colors. Interiors utilize new fabrics and leather in a wide range of colors.

The longer and lower look of Pontiac's new body style combine with a big-car riding comfort in the new series. Doug Ward of Ward Motors reports: "The rich colors of Pontiac Vogue two-tones are picked up in the luxurious interiors", he added.

Foremost among the mechanical improvements in the 1956 Pontiacs are the new Strato-Streak V-8 engines, bigger and sturdier than ever and upped in horsepower to 227 in the Star Chief series and 205 in the 870 and 860 series.

This upsurge in horsepower comes from the increased displacement, higher compression ratio and improved carburization, engineers report.

Visitors to the show rooms at the Ward Motor Co. Friday will find many other improvements in the new cars, front end styling of which is similar in all three series.
