He Changed His Mind

Albert Youngest Pro Coach

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Frankie Albert, who used the prerogative of a left-hander to change his mind about his future, today embarked on his new career as head coach of the San Francisco Forty Niners professional football team.

Albert, who had often said he

was not interested in a coaching job, was given the position as field boss of the Forty Niners yesterday.

"I've always been unpredictable — just a left-hander," said the former All-American quarterback from Stanford who also put in an outstanding career as T-formation QB for the team he will now head.

Albert succeeds Norman (Red) Strader at the Forty Niner helm and becomes the youngest head coach in the professional ranks. The original college T-formation quarterback with Clark Shaughnessy's Stanford teams is 35 — a year older than Paul Brown was in 1946 when he took over control of the Cleveland Browns.

Co-owner of the Forty Niners Tony Morabito, made the announcement of Albert's appointment at a news conference yesterday and hailed Frankie as an "inspirational leader" who has been connected with the Forty Niners since their beginning days.

Albert, who threw many a left-handed pass and punted many a football with his left foot while directing the club, becomes the third San Francisco coach in as many years.

For nine seasons Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw coached the team only to be fired last winter by Morabito. Strader, hired as Shaw's replacement and the second coach since the team was organized, lasted only one season.

Morabito fired Strader last month after a dismal 3-9 season that started out with the team picked for first or second in the Western Division.

Morabito refused to disclose terms of the contract given Albert, but admitted the quarterback had little coaching experience.

"He has done more for the Forty Niners than any other one man," Morabito said. He called Albert "Mr. T Formation" and an "inspirational leader" and said the Forty Niners had watched Albert for 11 years.

"We like what we have seen," Morabito added.

Parade of Stars
Golf Tournament
Gets Under Way

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UP) — The annual Pebble Beach Parade of Stars, sometimes called the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur Championship, gets underway here today with some 250 big names competing for the sake of charity and \$15,000 in personal rewards.

Favored to take event is the team of Ben Hogan, out of retirement temporarily for this event only, and the tourney's namesake and sponsor, the "Groaner" himself, Der Bingle.

Hogan, with a borrowed putter, has been playing some of his best golf in years in the warmup rounds — blistering the abnormally tough Cypress Point layout, adjacent to Pebble Beach, with a seven under par 65 Wednesday.

This was by far and away the best warmup round turned in by the galaxy of sports and movie-land stars invited by Bing to play in his clambake for which he picks up the entire tab.

It is the Texas bantam's first competitive golf since he announced he was turning "Sunday golfer" following his loss to Jack Flock in the U. S. Open championship playoff in San Francisco last June. Since then he has been strictly a "businessman golfer."

Others from the golfing world on deck for today's early morning tee-off were Byron Nelson, another old warhorse who annually comes off the retired list for the Crosby; Lloyd Mangrum, who captured the \$35,000 Los Angeles Open Monday; Dr. Cary Middlecott, Walter Burkemo and just about all the winter touring golfers.

Among the other sports names were football coaches Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma and Red Sanders of UCLA, baseballers Ralph Kiner, Bob Lemon and Jerry Priddy and ex-tennis star Ted Schroeder, while Flickerland contributed such as Guy Madison, Buddy Rogers, Jack Carson, Gordon MacRae, Hoagy Carmichael and on and on.

Stan Musial Again Agrees
To \$80,000 Card Contract

 Slugging Stan Musial of the Cardinals has signed his sixth straight contract for \$80,000, and as ruts go, that's a mighty fine one to fall into.

At the same time, Musial's roommate and sidekick, Al (Red) Schoendienst, signed a \$40,000 pact for the third straight year, and that can't exactly be called a bad habit, either.

"I'm very happy with my contract," said Musial, who will take home approximately \$30,000 after

taxes, while Schoendienst, who stands to net about \$20,000, also expressed satisfaction.

Neither had a particularly good season last year, Musial skidding from a 1954 batting mark of .330 to .319, and Schoendienst falling from .315 to .268.

Others Come To Terms
 While Musial and Schoendienst were the "big ones" to agree to terms Thursday, several players on other clubs also signed contracts.

Gus Zernial, who batted .254 but slammed 30 home runs last season, became the eighth member of the Kansas City Athletics to sign. No terms were announced. Southpaw Joe Nuxhall, a 17-game winner, signed with the Cincinnati Redlegs as did rookie infielder Bob Durnbaugh.

The Milwaukee Braves announced the signing of pitchers Charlie Gorin, Don Edelman and Carlton Wiley and outfielder Al Spangler.

Former major league infielder Lou Klein was named manager of the Des Moines club in the Western League, a Chicago Cub farm. Klein piloted Lafayette, La., of the Evangeline League last year.

Jersey City Rally
 At Jersey City, N.J., Irving Rudd, Brooklyn business manager for the games to be played in New Jersey announced plans have been worked out for a rally there Feb. 1 in honor of the Dodger players.

The Dodgers also announced they will set up special training facilities for some younger players at Vero Beach, Fla., Feb. 22.

And in Chicago, Hall of Famer Rogers Hornsby decided he will retain his job teaching baseball in the city's recreation department. Previously, it was announced he would scout the Chicago sector for the Cleveland Indians.

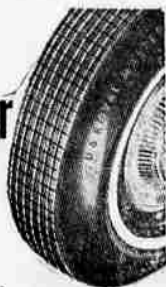
MAYFLOWER'S FLAGS
