Fortunately, the golden touch is more practical than it used to be. "Each fashion used to mean 'throw them out. Some, notably the metallic threads of the 30s or there about, developed an awful odor with wear. Now, fabric makers have conquered these difficulties and the gold look is odorless and best of all, much of it is washable.

Naturally, these fabrics that are marked washable don't go into the machine. They should be dipped in and out of suds, not rubbed, wrung or twisted. They should be hung to drip dry. When dry, they should be pressed with a cool iron, with a sheet of clean tissue paper in between as a pressing cloth.
