Commission OKs Vacation Plan For City Workers

A plan for vacations for city employees was approved last night by the city commission.

After a year's employment, workers will be given one week or five working days vacation. After two years, two weeks. After 15 consecutive years, three weeks.

The same will apply to policemen. Firemen will be given three 24 hour shifts as vacation time after one year, or a little more than a week; after two years, five 24 hour shifts and after 15 years seven 24 hour shifts, the equivalent of three weeks.

Terminal leave will be given to employees not dismissed for cause. This is payment for vacations earned and not taken.

Exceptions were granted two or three employees who were promised two weeks vacation after working one year before they took the jobs.

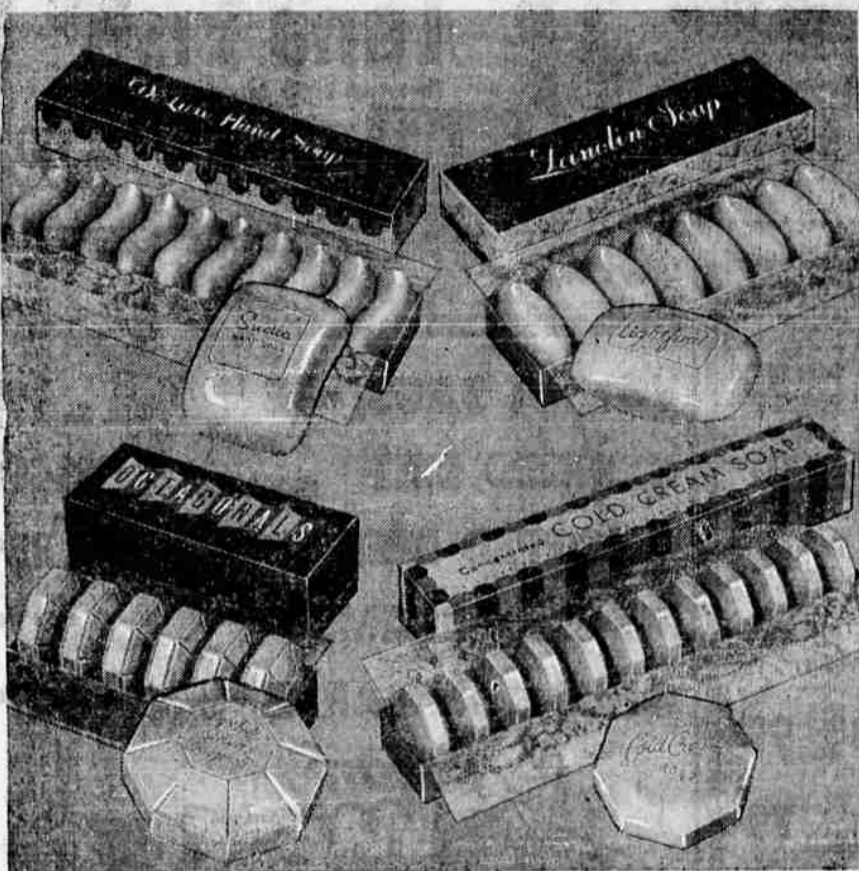
