

# Bend Swim Team Tops Eugene at Municipal Pool

## Several Records Shattered As Mid-Oregon Squad Wins

No less than six Municipal pool records were smashed Wednesday night as the Bend swim team got its 1956 season off to a rousing start with a 155 to 112 win over the Eugene Country club.

It was a fitting debut for the locals, now coached by Dave Huff. Last year Huff directed this Eugene Country club team to the Lane county championship.

Joan Hawes accounted for two new standards.

She broke Beverly Hall's three-year old mark of 26.6 in the girls 14 and under free style, covering the distance in a sparkling 25.3. In the 80 yard, she turned in a 1:01.3, compared the old record of 1:03.1, also formerly held by Hall.

Cecil Kribs toured the 40 yards in 22.7 in the boys 14 and under free style to eclipse the old time of 25 flat. He also clipped three full seconds off the former mark in the 80-yard, but still finished second to Eugene's Barky Slocum. Slocum was caught at 51.3. Kribs at 51.6. Both previous records were set by Rod Wells in 1951.

Larry Lermo was in fine form as he covered the 80 yard free style for men 17 and over in 46.8. Ray Westgard had set the old mark of 47.5 in 1953.

Nine-year old Nancy Tillman of Eugene pined nearly seven seconds off the former record in the girls 10-and-under 40 yard free style with her time of 31.4. Genevieve Peters set the mark at 38 flat in 1951.

## Big Jim North In Golf Spotlight

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Well, sir, the color was drained out of the National Public Links Golf Tournament Thursday.

But while he lasted, Big Jim North, a history teacher from the little town of North Bend, Wash., stood out like Marilyn Monroe in a beef-trust chorus line.

Jumbo Jim was knocked out by a cocky, wise-cracking 18-year-old youth from Franklin Park, Ill., name of Emil Esposito. North was just twice his tormentor's age.

Anyone could see on the golf course that the youngster had the sounder game and had to prevail in the end.

But they have been saying that about North's game ever since he showed up here.

He is the type of player who inspires confidence among the loudest dubs along the sidelines. A dozen times along the sidelines the dubs could be heard to say:

"There's one guy I could beat."

**Long Drives**

Off the tee, North could poke out those 300-yard drives. He wasn't too sure just what direction the ball was going. But the crowd that tagged along at his heels were agog at the length of some of his pokes—even into the wilderness.

And his foes came to the conclusion that he must be the greatest scrambler of all times.

North beat Craig Olson, another school teacher from Long Beach, Calif., in the second round—and when the match was over, Olson walked away stunned. He couldn't figure out how he possibly could have lost the match.

The 13th hole was an example of why: Olson hit a drive 240 down the middle; North's second shot skidded off to the right of the fairway into the deep rough. Olson hit a perfect shot to the middle of the green, but the ball bounced over the back edge.

**Nice Recovery**

North slugged the ball out of the tall grass to the edge of the green, and Olson pitched to within five feet of the pin. North then sank his 20-foot putt for a par—and Olson was so shaken that he missed his little putt.

This happened in every match so often that the foes were talking to themselves. The bespectacled 365-pounder, would hitch up his belt and just walk up to the ball and whack it—no matter where he was.

But luck and the law of averages ran out against cigar-smoking Big Jim when he missed a three and one-half foot putt on the 18th hole that would have given him the match.

"It was my first tournament," he said as he packed his gear to head for home. "I enjoyed every minute of it. I'll be back next year."

And the fans and sportswriters say "Amen" to that.
