

# 21 Central Oregon All-Stars Begin Practice

PRINEVILLE — All-Star football players from Madras, Redmond, Bend, Burns, John Day and Prineville assembled here early Sunday afternoon and immediately began making plans for the 3rd annual Elks benefit gridiron class at Ontario, Saturday, Aug. 25.

The first two games were between the Snake River Valley All-Stars and the Boise Valley All-Stars. This time it will be Central Oregon against the Snake River Valley.

Head coach Keith DeCourcy and assistant Tom Winbiger, found themselves long on enthusiasm, but short on players, when they counted noses following a

noon luncheon.

For one reason or another, 14 players who were picked for the game will not be able to make it. Some are now in the service, others have married, and a few just couldn't afford to give up their summer employment.

## Whole Team Missing

This more than one complete team won't be available.

Missing are ends Don Hosmer, 155, Burns; and Charlie Brazil, 185, John Day; tackles Spike Durfee, 155, Redmond; and Butch Hawthorne, 170, Bend; guards Fred Townsend, 170, John Day; and Bill Tiller, 165, Burns; center Butch Cruikshank, 185, Bend; quarterbacks Joe Peterson, 155, Redmond;

and Mickey Brunoe, 160, Madras; and halfbacks Don Watson, 150, Madras; Norm Pease, 160, Bend; Lon Peterson, 115, John Day; Scott Russell, 155, Burns; and Phil Olson, 135, Burns.

Three more players, end Ray Anderson of Bend, and guard Ted Henry and halfback Dale Shumway of Prineville are currently in Portland for the Shrine game, but will join the squad for the second week of drills and the game.

## Proceeds to Eye Clinic

All the proceeds from the benefit contest will go to the Oregon State Elks Eye clinic in Portland. Elks lodges in Prineville and Bend are co-operating in sponsoring the game at this end.

The game will be rotated yearly between Central Oregon and the Snake River Valley. The 1957 test is tentatively set for Prineville.

Players from Burns and John Day are staying at private homes in Prineville. Players from Madras, Redmond and Bend will commute to practice each day.

Following the luncheon and a short talk yesterday, the players took complete physical examinations and received their equipment. After making a brief appearance at the Crooked River Roundup, they returned to the field for picture taking.

Then most of the players adjourned to the swim pool to cool off.

Daily double practices are slated

for the first week. Morning drills will run from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Following lunch at the training table the players will practice again from 2:15 until 4 p.m.

Conditioning will be stressed in the early workouts. No scrimmage is planned until at least Thursday.

"It is always a pleasure to coach an All-Star team," DeCourcy said. "This is our first undertaking with the Central Oregon team and we hope to make it a successful one."

So far each coach is battling 13-15 in All-Star appearances. Winbiger helped coach as the Eastern Idaho All-Stars defeated the Western Idaho All-Stars, 19 to 12, in the 1951 classic. That game was a predecessor to this one.

DeCourcy was assistant in the Shrine game in Portland twice. In 1953 he helped Pete Susick guide the Up-State team to a 21-13 win. The following year he aided McIngram as the Up-Staters won again, 50 to 0.

But the Prineville pigskin boss admitted, "We are behind the 8 ball this year. All the Eastern Oregon and Idaho schools report their best graduating class in the past years. Their smallest starting line man will probably be Gene Bates at 196. But if I didn't figure we had a chance, I wouldn't be here."

The Snake River Valley All-Stars will draw from Nyssa, Vale, Ontario, Baker, Payette, Weiser, Adrian, and Fruitland. With two of the three quarter-

backs expected not showing up, that position immediately became a problem. To back up Burns' Dee Dickinson, the only proven QB in camp, Bend's bruising fullback, Shelby Blevins, was switched over and will get a try at signal calling. Scrimmaging will also present a minor problem with only 21 players on hand.

## Burdette Again Stops Cincinnati Redlegs As Milwaukee Braves Maintain Slight Lead

A pitcher for every occasion—that's Fred Burdette's formula for keeping the Milwaukee Braves on top in the torrid National League pennant race.

Bob Buhl is the key man with six straight victories over the Brooklyn Dodgers and Lew Burdette's No. 1 boy when it comes to handling the sizzling Cincinnati Redlegs. Burdette did it for the third time without a loss Sunday when he beat the Redlegs, 8-2, and enabled the Braves to hold their 1-2 game, first-place lead.

Burdette, raising his record to 14-7, pitched a five-hitter as the Braves raised their season's edge over the Redlegs to 8-4. They've beaten the Redlegs eight of their last 10 meetings during which they've allowed Cincinnati sluggers a total of 28 runs—or just 2.8 per game.

The Braves' bucked Burdette with an eight-hit attack that included two-run singles by Bill Belfon and Bobby Thomson. The assault knocked 16-game winner Brooks Lawrence in 5-23 innings and handed him his fifth loss in his last seven decisions.

The second-place Dodgers kept pace with the Braves when they outscored four homers in routing Robin Roberts and beating the

Philadelphia Phillies, 7-3. Carl Furillo hit two round-trippers and Randy Jackson and Pee-wee Reese one each as Roger Craig received credit for his 11th win. The loss was Roberts' 12th compared to 14 victories.

Jim King knocked in three runs with a homer and a bases-filled single to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 6-2 decision over the St. Louis Cardinals and the teams then battled to a scoreless deadlock in the second game of their double-header. Stan Musial doubled in the sixth inning of the opener to tie Mel Ott's National League mark of 1,071 extra base hits but it wasn't enough to deprive Bob Rush of his 11th victory. Herman Wehmeier and Jim Davis both matched shutout pitching until the nightcap was halted by darkness after nine innings.

Bill Virdon's two-run, fourth-inning triple gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 3-2 victory over the New

York Giants and the Bucs then pounded out 17 hits to complete a sweep of the doubleheader with an 11-3 decision. Fred Waters received credit for his second victory and contributed a three-run triple to the Pirates' biggest attack of the campaign. Vern Law picked up his fifth triumph in the opener.

Mickey Mantle slammed his first homer to go 13 games ahead of Babe Ruth's record pace as the New York Yankees beat the Baltimore Orioles, 6-2 and 4-2, to increase their American League lead to 8 1/2 games. Mantle, who knocked in three runs in the opener, scored the decisive run of the nightcap on a single by Bill Skowron. Don Larsen and Bob Turley were the winning pitchers.

The second-place Cleveland Indians beat the Kansas City Athletics, 6-3, when Rocky Colavito smashed a three-run homer in the eighth inning. Herb Score struck

The Washington Senators made it nine wins in 13 games with the third-place Boston Red Sox when they beat them, 8-2, with the aid of Jim Lemon's 20th homer. Bud Byerly picked up his first American League win as the Senators rapped four Red Sox pitchers for 14 hits.

Billy Hoelt fanned six and pitched an eight-hitter to give the Detroit Tigers a 5-2 triumph over the Chicago White Sox. Frank Bolling's three-run homer was the difference as Billy Pierce suffered his fifth loss against 17 wins.

After three innings of scoreless ball, Albany broke the ice with two in the fourth. Salem bounced right back with one of its own.

But in the sixth Albany sewed it up with a seven-run barrage. Larry Mahaffey got lifeman error, and Fred Vetter and Mike Emmons singled. After Dick Maher's sacrifice, Salem bobbled Bayne's ball.

Then Fred Morton singled, Joe Prohaska was safe on another error, and Dean Reed and Mahaffey both singled.

Salem managed to pick up one run in an inning over the last four frames, but it wasn't enough.

Morton led the winners with 3-for-5, including a double and triple. He batted in four runs. Both Mahaffey and Bayne had two hits apiece, including a two-bagger by Bayne.
