### Work Party Held At Cutter Farm

Neighbors of Dr. and Mrs. Robert L. Cutter made a surprise visit to the Cutter home Friday, night, and replaced a portion of the hay crop that was lost in a lightning fire a week ago.

The group assembled first at Young school, and a caravan of several trucks, loaded with hay, made the short trip from there to the Cutter farm in solid formation. Men and boys in the party made up a crew and unloaded the hay. Women took coffee and snacks, and refreshments were served in the loft of the barn. "I went down twice, then I remembered thinking 'this is it,' and started under for the third time." It was then that Allen came to the rescue. Halbrook had considerable water in his lungs.

The Bend fishermen, clinging to their overturned boat, yelled for help and campers came to their rescue.

Young and Halbrook lost most of their fishing gear and other articles, including Halbrook's glasses.

Officers said that Richard apparently was the driver of the car. His brother was thrown from the car after the collision.

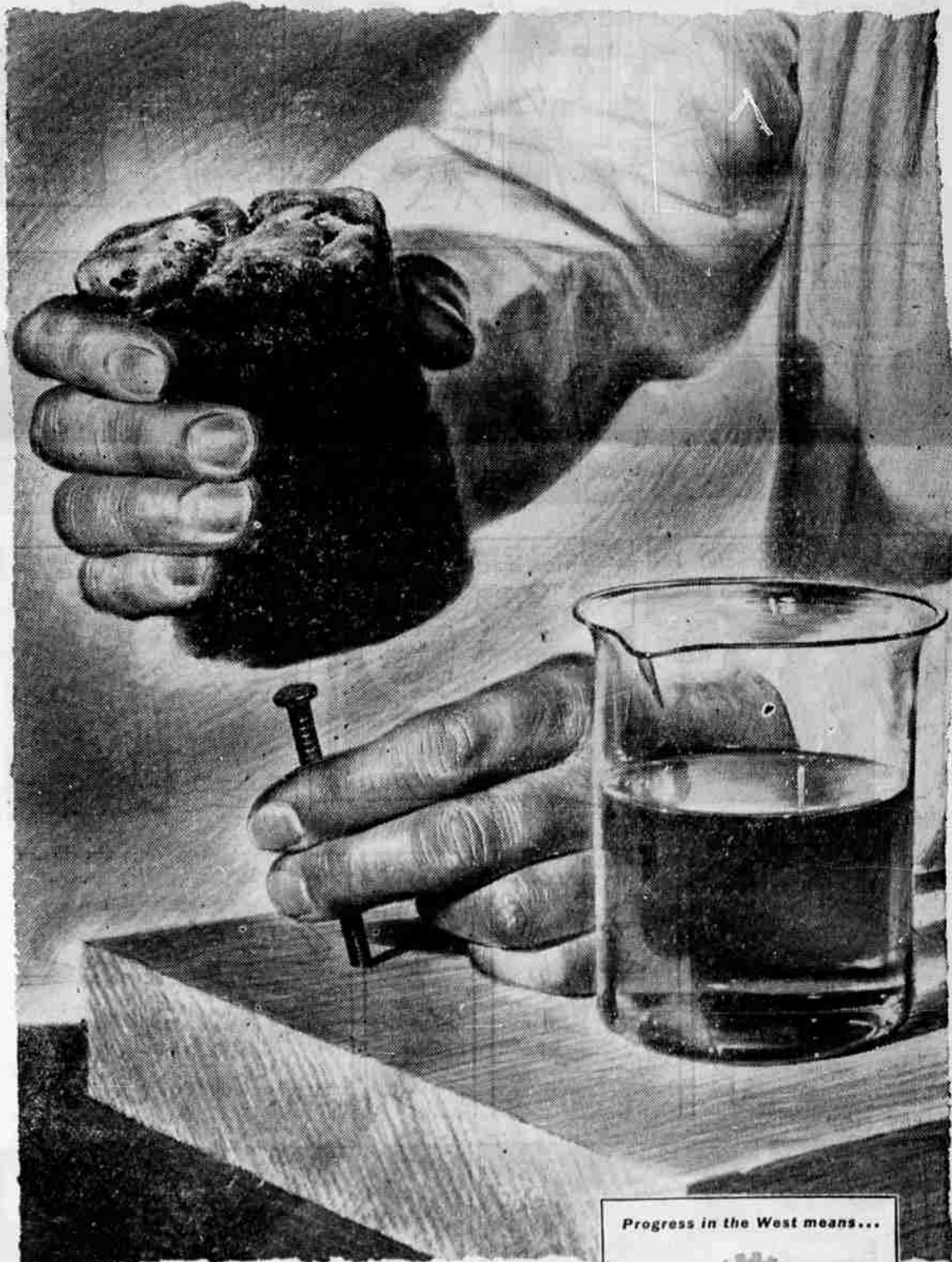
Impact of the crash knocked the logs from the rear of the logging truck. The car spun off the truck and into a roadside bank.

## Standard's new radiation-resistant lubricants are helping put atomic power to work

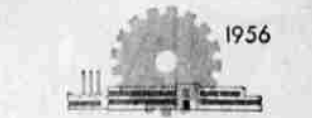


During exposure to atomic radiation, some petroleum oils are turned into solids, hard enough to drive a nail, useless as a lubricant
