

Raft Carries 2 Canadians To England

FALMOUTH, England (UP)—Two bearded men and a raft arrived here from Canada today, victoriously ending an 83-day battle with the stormy North Atlantic.

The third member and captain of the crew inconspicuously met his shipmates in a taxi.

The spliced-log raft L'egare II (the lost one) was towed triumphantly into Falmouth Harbor by the motor-driven Falmouth life boat. Aboard were Gaston Vanacker, 31, and Marc Modena, 29, both of Montreal.

Expedition leader Henri Beaudot also of Montreal, boarded a passing ship as the raft neared the English coast Monday and came ashore to make final arrangements for the L'egare II's arrival here.

Beaudot took a taxi to the custom house quay early today and arrived just as the low-slung log raft waddled into the harbor behind the life boat.

The sea was calm and the sun glittered across the water as hundreds of Britons lined the docks to cheer the arrival. It was the biggest welcome in Falmouth since 1952, when Capt. Kurt Carlson arrived here after his fight with the sea aboard the crippled flying Enterprise.

FBI, New York Police Dispute Over Identity

NEW YORK (UP)—The FBI and New York police disagree widely today over identity of a murdered hoodlum suspected of the acid-throwing attack which blinded labor columnist Victor Riesel.

The district attorney's office said it was "seriously considering" exhuming the body of Abraham Telvi, 21, whom the FBI claims was killed by mobsters because acid burns on his face made him too "hot."

Telvi was found slain on the lower East Side on July 28. A police autopsy, however, disclosed no acid burns on the body's face. The autopsy also indicated a discrepancy in the size of the body compared to descriptions of the acid-thrower given by witnesses to the attack on Riesel.

Police "broke" their own case Monday with the surrender of Hugh Francis Drescher, 23, wanted for questioning about a wave of gangland executions which followed the acid-throwing incident. Drescher was an acquaintance of the murdered Telvi.

He Really Was Down in Hog House Getting Cooled Off

WASHINGTON (UP)—A kid in the South went to visit a buddy in a neighboring farm and asked "Where's Johnny?"

Johnny's mommy said her lad was "down in the hog house cooling off."

It was no joke. A lot of hog houses are air conditioned these days. And so are a lot of cow barns, and even sidewalks, according to the Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute.

The University of Missouri made some notes not long back and found that air-conditioned cows give about two gallons more milk a day than their sisters suffering from the heat. A cartoon in one paper "quoted" one cow as saying to another: "What we need is bigger buckets," meaning "Where will we put all the extra milk?"

Dugouts Will Be Cooled

According to the air coolers, baseball players soon will have air-conditioned dugouts. That could cool off a few hot-headed managers, also.

In some places in the South, sidewalks are air-conditioned, but that sort of thing has not yet come to humid Washington. When July and August hit this town the cool-

est place to hit for is the White House — open five mornings a week for us hot tourists.

The Forrestal, the new aircraft carrier, has an air-conditioning unit "big enough for two big buildings." That statement would take a lot of prying, but suffice it to say that the vessel is well cooled.

Gold mines in South Africa couldn't operate down deep a mile or more without air cooling. Neither could the copper mines in Montana.

Air conditioning also has something to do with the fast development of the polio vaccine. Without cooling, some of the important tests might have been delayed.

Church Attendance Up
The rest of the country is looking with envy to New York where a whole fleet of taxi cabs are air conditioned.

A lot of churches are cooled, too. Air conditioned clergymen around the country say attendance is up as much as 44 per cent, and that collections are up considerably, too.

Even Abraham Lincoln's tomb in Springfield, Ill., is air-conditioned.
