

# Coast Football Teams Awaiting Initial Clashes

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The lid flaps off the 1956 college football season on the Pacific Coast this weekend with a flock of inter-sectionals and only one game that has bearing on the eventual Rose Bowl representative.

The lone contest on the road to Pasadena pits Stanford's favored Indians against rebuilding Washington State in a night game at Spokane. Stanford figures in the Rose Bowl picture and Washington State is also an eligible, though highly unlikely, candidate.

There is one other Pacific Coast Conference game—that between Washington and Idaho in Seattle. But Washington can't go to the bowl because of rule infractions and Idaho can't because the team does not play enough conference games.

## Home Games

Only two other PCC teams have home field appointments for the first Saturday of the new season. California entertains Baylor from the wild and woolly Southwest Conference while UCLA plays host to Utah in Los Angeles tonight.

The rest of the schedule is a road trip one for the PCC teams. Southern California also tests a Southwest Conference foe by journeying to Texas to play the Longhorns.

The University of Oregon goes to Colorado to take on the Buffaloes of the Big Seven and the other Oregon PCC team—Oregon State—likewise invades the midlands. The Beavers battle Missouri at Columbia, Mo.

Two highly regarded independents in California—San Jose State and College of the Pacific—both get into action on their home fields Saturday night.

San Jose Faces Drake  
San Jose State hosts Drake University and COP puts its high scoring sophomore Dick Bass on exhibition against Colorado A & M.

Fresno State, another independent, travels to Utah to do battle with Brigham Young University. Arizona, which opened its season victoriously last week, plays host to Wyoming.

Other games include: San Francisco State at Cal Poly; Wichita at Arizona State (Tempe); Santa Barbara at Whittier; Alameda Navy at Chico State; Nevada at Idaho State; Pepperdine at Arcadia State (Flagstaff); Willamette at Whitworth; Puget Sound at Pacific Lutheran; Lewis & Clark at Western Washington; Eastern Oregon at College of Idaho; Central Washington at Whitman and Portland State at Linfield.

# Only One of Old Guard Survives In Golf Tourney

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP)—The old guard had only one representative in the semi-finals of the National Women's Amateur golf tourney today with two Washington teenagers and a 22-year-old Canadian star holding the other spots.

The veteran still left in the chase which 165 players began Monday was Mrs. Ann Casey Johnstone, a Mason City, Iowa housewife who in the past was a strong competitor in Western tourneys, but rarely a factor in the national event.

But to standouts still surviving were the younger challengers, 17-year-old Joanne Gunderson, the National Junior champion from Seattle, Wash.; 19-year-old Ann Quist, Western Amateur champion, and former Junior champion from Everett, Wash.; and Marjorie Stewart, a Fontell, Ont., player who in 1953 won the British Amateur title and who this year captured the Canadian Open and the American collegiate crowns.

# Bears Leave For Albany Test Tonight

Thirty-three football players, plus managers and coaches left Bend at 1 this afternoon for the 100 mile trip to Albany where the Bears will attempt to upset the strapping Albany Bulldogs this evening.

The game is the second District 8-A-1 tilt of the season for the Bears, and they will be pointing for a win over the team doped as the best in the district.

Coach Tom Winbiger's boys are expecting plenty of trouble from Albany, currently rated third in the state.

Their hosts feature a strong running game, a big, strong line, and fast, shifty backs. Albany also has Pat Emmons, a rooting-touting 190 lb. senior fullback, believed to be one of the best around this year.

Bend currently has won one non-conference game, from Madras, 19-6, and dropped a District contest, 14-13, to Sweet Home. A win tonight would give the Bears 500 per cent.

"This looks like a season for us," said today, "and we hope to get our share in our favor. If we don't win tonight, it won't be because we weren't working at it," he stated.

Bend is the underdog in many ways than one. The local school has a student population of some 550 while the hosts have over 1000 students.

# Dodgers Lead by Full Game After Braves Lose, 2 to 1

Youth may be served someday, but it will have to stand aside tonight while the Brooklyn Dodgers and Milwaukee Braves put their hot pennant race in the hands of "old folks" pitchers Sal Maglie, 39, and Warren Spahn, 32.

Now that the Dodgers are leading by one full game as a result of Milwaukee's pressure-packed, 2-1, 10-inning loss to Pittsburgh Thursday both clubs know the flag could be riding on each pitch.

The plain fact was that this defeat has put the Braves in a tough spot, even though Manager Fred Haney rightly insisted that his club have only "a bad cough" and isn't dead yet by a long shot. If the Braves win now, it will have to be uphill—the hard way.

That's because the Dodgers' lead is all in the vital "lost" column. Each team has won 88, but Brooklyn has lost only 57 to Milwaukee's 59.

The Challenge For Braves  
The Dodgers have nine left, the Braves seven, and this "if" table shows what the Braves must do from here out in order to tie for the pennant:

If all adds up to — the Braves must win 'em all, or pretty near all, unless Brooklyn suffers a major collapse.

On the brighter side for Braves fans: Pirate Manager Bobby Bragan promises to win three of seven games against Brooklyn. If he makes good, the Dodgers could wind up with four or five losses when they'll face Robin Roberts and Curt Simmons of the Phils in the only other two games.

Maglie carries two streaks into tonight's game: six straight wins this year and six straight vs the Pirates, the team against whom he has the best personal record of his career (21-4). He will be opposed by right hander Ronnie Kline, who is 0-3 against Brooklyn this year.

Spahn The Stopper  
Spahn halted the Braves' three-game losing streak last Monday by beating the Giants and again he's called on to put the Braves back on the winning trail. He'll face young Don Kaiser, 1-1 vs the Braves this year.

The Pirates won Thursday's game twice for Bob Friend, who went the route with a four-hitter for his 16th victory. Jack Sheppard's seventh-inning homer gave him a 1-0 lead. Milwaukee tied the score with two out in the ninth when Chuck Tanner scored from third as Pirate first baseman Dale Long muffed Dick Groat's bunt on Hank Aaron's grounder and then threw wildly for another error.

Friend choked off a Braves' two-out, one-out threat in the top of the 10th and Pittsburgh got its winning run in the last half when Bill Mazeroski singled with one out, took second on Friend's sacrifice, and scored on Bob Clement's single to center—a low liner Bill Bruton reached but couldn't hold.

Ray Crone, who pitched the 10th in relief of Bob Hall, suffered the defeat.

# College Elevens To Open Season Over Week End

UCLA, one of the schools punished by the Pacific Coast Conference for over-enthusiasm in procuring players, meets Utah tonight as the first full week end of college football gets underway across the nation.

The UClans, hurt as much by graduation as the punishment meted out by the PCC, still are regarded as formidable and they get a chance to prove it tonight against a Utah squad which is expected to improve slightly on its 4-1 record in the Skyline Conference in 1955.

Nine other games are on tap for tonight. None of them, however, involve major teams.

The big teams—Pittsburgh, Notre Dame, Maryland, Georgia Tech and Southern California—swing into action Saturday and all are favored to come out on top.

Irish Meet SMU  
In perhaps the top game of the day, Terry Brennan's Fighting Irish bump into Southern Methodist at Dallas, Tex. ND is favored by 13 points despite the loss of eight regulars from last year's crew.

The Pitt Panthers, touted by many "experts" as the top team in the most ambitious schedule in the country favored by two touchdowns over West Virginia at Morgantown, Pitt's crumpling split-T power is expected to be too much for West Virginia to handle this early in the season.

Tommy Mint makes his debut at the Maryland helm as the Terrapins, the nation's third-ranked team last year, play host to Syracuse. Maryland is picked by 13 points despite the loss of star quarterback Frank Tamburello to the Army.

The first of the NCAA's weekly nationally-televized programs links Georgia Tech playing Kentucky at Lexington on Saturday with the Ramblin' Wrecks the choice by 10 points. Only three players are missing from the Tech team which racked up a 7-0 victory over Pittsburgh in the 1956 Sugar Bowl game. NBC begins televising this USC vs Texas.

In Saturday's other feature attraction, Southern California, another of the punished PCC clubs, opens up against Texas at night in Austin. Halfback Jon Arnett, one of the Trojans' stars limbed to five games this season, will be in the lineup with USC favored by seven points.

Oklahoma, the 1955 national champion, and all of the powerful Big Ten schools are idle, but most of the Southwest teams will be busy. Texas A&M, expected to be the top team in the Southwest, meets Villanova. Rice is favored over Alabama and Arkansas is picked by 14 points over Sammy Baugh's Hardin-Simmons crew.

In other leading games Texas Christian is in Kansas and is favored by 19 points, Oregon and Colorado are rated even, Missouri is picked over Oregon State, Baylor is the choice over California, Florida and Mississippi State are even, Vanderbilt should get by Georgia, William & Mary gets the nod over Wake Forest, and Duke is a solid 18-point favorite over South Carolina.

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# Oregon Favored, Beavers on Short End in Openers

PORTLAND (UP)—Oregon and Oregon State football teams open their 1956 seasons tomorrow against Big Seven opposition away from home.

Coach Len Casanova's Duck-flew east for a game with Colorado while Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers met Missouri; also on the opponent's field.

Oldsmakers have made Oregon a slight favorite and Oregon State a slight underdog. But many point to the high altitude in Colorado as a possible handicap to Oregon. And other points to Missouri's poor record last season as a possible advantage to Oregon State.

Oregon's speedy backfield is carrying most of the hopes of Webfoot fans this year. Back are Jack Morris, Jimmy Shanley and Jack Brown with cool Tom Crabtree to guide them at quarterback.

Oregon State's big name is John Witte, the all-American tackle possibility. But the Beavers also have their share of backfield talent in Sam Wesley and Joe Francis along with a promising soph in Paul Lowe.
