More Parking Area Provided At New School

Parking areas at the Bend Senior high school have been more than doubled, Bert W. Hagen, president of the school district, informed the city commission Wednesday night.

Hagen attended the meeting of the commission at which steps were initiated for street and sidewalk paving along the school and in one street leading into it.

"I would like to see the improvements go ahead," Hagen said. "I agree that the sidewalk grade should be lowered close to that of the pavement."

Hagen prefaced his remarks by expressing appreciation for the attitude of the city commission in helping to solve the school's traffic problem.

When the parking area around the school was first used, the space was found inadequate. Hagen said immediate action was taken by the school authorities to increase it.

Both Hagen and Superintendent R. E. Jewell of city schools attended the commission meeting. They indicated the high school paving matter would be presented to the school board at a meeting to be held within a few days.

8 Young People In Car Accident

Eight Bend young people suffered injuries varying in seriousness, in a one-car accident Wednesday evening near Redmond. Richard Wayne Koth, 22, a volunteer on the Bend Fire Department, was operator of the vehicle.

Most seriously hurt were Mary Jane Brewster, 17, of 870 W. Twelfth street, and Arlene Jeanette Willard, 19, of 2464 1/2 Linster place, both of whom were still at Central Oregon District hospital Thursday. All eight of the accident victims were taken there by ambulance. The others were released after receiving first aid.

Miss Brewster suffered a fractured right leg, and Miss Willard has a fractured arm and scalp lacerations. Conditions of both are "satisfactory", according to the attending physician.

Allen Dean Breshears, 17, 532 Ogden, suffered a fractured nose, and Koth had facial lacerations. The others in the car, who were shaken and bruised, were Sally Anne McCarthy, 20, 2464 Linster place; Kenneth Dale Breshears, 19, 532 Ogden; Stuart Dillon Huett, 20, Route 3, and Fred H. Hudson, 20, 2157 E. Fourth street.

Koth was traveling west toward highway 97 on the paved road from the Redmond airport. He reported to state police that his brakes failed as he approached the highway, and his car went out of control and came to rest at the west side of it. The car was a 1950 model Oldsmobile coach.

The accident occurred at about 8:50 p.m.

Campaign Visit Made Here By Candidate Mark Hatfield

One of Oregon's busiest men was in Bend earlier this week.

He is Mark Hatfield of Salem, Republican nominee for the post of secretary of state. In his swing around the state it is his intention to visit every city and hamlet.

"Oregon is a mighty big state," he noted while here — and he spoke of Plush and Brothers, Adel and Bonanza with familiarity. After visiting Bend he crossed the Cascades.

Over dependence on mass media in communications and public relations counsel will spell defeat for some national and statewide candidates this fall," Hatfield predicted.

He said his own campaign is based on the importance of being available for the people, and to talk to them and answer questions. "While television and other media enable a candidate to get his name before the public to a greater extent than ever before in history, it does not do away with the need for questions and answers and face to face discussion," Hatfield declared, adding:

"What campaigners need to remember is that more money ought to go into gasoline that will take them out of the studio and into the highways and by-ways, farms and stores, labor temples and timber hills."

"No one ever asked a question of a television set and got an answer," he noted concluding: "People of Oregon should be skeptical of the candidate who hides behind a camera or the column of a newspaper and makes no effort to visit the cross-roads of his constituents."

Rev. Donald Lundy of First Baptist church officiated at the rites. Pallbearers were A. B. Sander, E. B. Carter, Ted L. Vogt, Jess C. Johnston, Robert E. Severson and John J. Winge.
