State Control
Post Goes
To Molotov

LONDON (UP)—Former Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, an old-line Stalinist, was appointed suddenly tonight to the post of Soviet minister of state control, the Cabinet job responsible for enforcing government policy.

Molotov had been a first deputy premier without specific assignment since he resigned from the foreign ministry earlier this year in an apparent concession to the anti-Stalinists. Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev are leaders of this faction inside the Kremlin.

Molotov's new appointment followed authoritative reports of a new struggle in the Moscow hierarchy between the old-line Stalinists and the new faction led by Khrushchev.

Molotov's new post had been a practically unknown technical assignment until he was assigned to it today. The brief Radio Moscow announcement of the appointment gave no hint of its significance.

The official Soviet Encyclopedia identified the state control ministry as the government's "watchdog" over spending. Officially, it is comparable to the American general accounting office.

But authoritative Western observers said one of its main tasks is also the strengthening of political control over the armed forces.

Observers said Molotov's appointment might indicate a major break in the power struggle which Yugoslav President Tito said last week is going on in the Kremlin.

Molotov was the man who read Tito out of the Cominform in 1948. The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda attacked Tito Monday after a long period of gentle treatment following a Moscow-Belgrade reconciliation last year.

Death-Free, is
Holiday Hope

SALEM (UP)—Oregon traffic safety officials expressed hope today that Oregon will go death-free tomorrow despite anticipated heavy holiday travel.

The state went death-free last Thanksgiving even though 212 accidents occurred and 58 people were injured.

James R. Banks, executive secretary of the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission, said that "experience has shown the biggest Thanksgiving highway hazard is the driver who tries to crowd too many miles into a day's drive."

Latest count for Oregon shows 361 people have been killed so far this year in street and highway smash-ups.

Human Rights
Day Proclaimed

SALEM (UP)—Gov. Elmo Smith has designated Dec. 10 as human rights day in Oregon in observance of the 8th anniversary of adoption of the universal declaration of human rights by the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Dr. John R. Richards, chancellor of higher education in Oregon, is chairman of the United States national commission for UNESCO which sponsors human rights day on a world-wide basis.

"The universal declaration of human rights sets up goals toward which we should all work," Gov. Smith said. He suggested that schools, colleges, churches, civil groups and other organizations set up forums, discussions or other means of calling attention to the day.

Turkey Planned
For Inmates

SALEM (UP)—Inmates at virtually all state institutions will have turkey dinners for Thanksgiving, officials said here today.

Spokesmen said holiday dinners are planned for the more than 3500 patients, nurses, doctors and attendants at the Oregon State hospital and turkey also will be on the menu at Fairview Home, MacLaren school for boys, Hillcrest school for girls, and the penitentiary.

Many students at the Oregon state blind and deaf schools will return to their homes for the holiday.

Counts Indicate
Steady Increase
In Road Traffic

Highway traffic counts in Oregon showed steady increases on most major routes in the first 10 months of 1956 as compared to the same period in 1955.

State highway officials said this gain is reflected by gasoline use as well as by automatic traffic records.

The current report shows that on U.S. highway 97 in Central Oregon there was an increase of about 10 per cent in the 10-month vehicle volume north of Bend, and a slight decrease south of Bend.

There was also a gain in traffic on U.S. Highway 20 at a recording point east of Pilot Butte. The gain in October there was 10.8 per cent, and the 10 month gain was 11.6 per cent. The count on the maximum day in the October count there was 2,412.

Just south of Madras a counter revealed an October gain of 7.6 per cent and a 10 month gain of 10.1 per cent, with 7,081 checked on the maximum day.

An October drop of 14.5 per cent by a 10-month gain of 4.0 per cent was reported from the Ochoco highway three miles east of Prineville, where 4,588 cars were checked in a single day.

A drop of 13.9 was reported from a counting station on U.S. Highway 97 three miles south of Bend. The 10 month count there was off 1.1 over the 1955 count.

Speech Contest

Each year, more than one million students compete for local, state and national awards in the contest, according to Allen Howell, local chairman for the Junior Chamber.

In Statement
For '56 Pageant

Bend's 1956 Mirror Pond pageant, a \$10,788.65 show, not including volunteer labor, was presented at a loss of \$120.

This information appears in a statement of receipts and disbursements prepared for the Bend Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring organization.

Compared with the expenses of \$10,788.65, receipts amounted to \$10,667.72.

But despite the deficit incurred in presenting the 1956 pageant, the sponsoring group prepares for the 1957 fest with a reserve of \$3,367.80.

The 1956 show, however, cut into the 1955 reserve. Cash on hand on September 30, 1955, amounted to \$4,418.73. This bite into the reserve fund amounts to \$1,050.93.

However, \$390 of this sum, due from float sponsors and others, is listed as collectible, which would considerably reduce the "bite."

Major expense in presenting the 1956 pageant was in connection with construction of the boom, arch and grandstand. This cost aggregated \$3,351.27. Advertising and promotion ranked second in cost, amounting to \$1,594.25.

Cost of the barbecue was \$978.38. Pageant buttons, tickets and programs cost \$800.47. Queen court expenses aggregated \$743.85.

Other expenses included street decorations, fireworks, public address system, queen's ball, pet parade, watchmen, insurance and payroll taxes.

Ideal Weather
Seen for Holiday
Observance Here

Riding on the fringe of a North Pacific high pressure area, ideal November came to interior Oregon today as the region prepared to observe Thanksgiving day.

Even milder temperature is in prospect for tomorrow, but there will be some cloudiness, forecasts indicate.

In Bend, the Thanksgiving holiday will be observed this evening with a union church service in the auditorium of the new Bend senior high school. This event will start at 8 p.m.

Tomorrow will be observed in Bend as a general holiday, with all public and private offices, stores and other places closed.

The post office, city hall, court-house federal and state offices will join in the observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

In mid-Oregon towns, the occasion will be a day of many family reunions and proverbial Thanksgiving dinners. Special church services are planned for either this evening or tomorrow morning in most towns.

One of the big early afternoon attractions in Bend, as the Thanksgiving dinner takes final form, will be the television and radio broadcast of the OSC-Oregon football game, to start at 1:30.

Immediately following the Thanksgiving holiday in Bend, the city will launch into its 1956 Christmas season, with a civic parade arranged for Friday afternoon, at 2 p.m.

Sub-District
Plan Fails
In 6-3 Vote

Hopes for formation of a football sub-district in District 8-A-1 were dashed during the Tuesday evening meeting of district officials at Albany when member schools voted, six to three, to continue the present district.

Bend High school, Crook County High school, and Redmond Union High school representatives had proposed formation of a sub-district which would include Lebanon, Sweet Home, Bend, Redmond and Prineville. In the other division would have been Albany, North Salem, South Salem, and Corvallis.

Two of the three Central Oregon school principals indicated this morning that their schools would go along with the district, and the third said that he has not yet made a decision.

Stays in Competition

Bend Principal Russ Acheson, who represented the local school along with Tom Winbigger, football coach, and Stan Blair, athletic coordinator, said that Bend, although disappointed that the sub-district was not approved, would continue in district competition.

A similar opinion was voiced today by Bill Burgess, Crook County High school principal. He said that school board approval is necessary, but he believes that his school will discontinue the independent schedule started last year and enter round-robin district play.

J. L. Brown, Redmond principal, implied that his school might choose to play an independent schedule rather than join in district competition.

Several Commitments

Redmond, on an independent schedule during the year just ended, has contract commitments with several Oregon grid teams for 1957.

Before a decision is made on Redmond's football future, Brown indicated that conferences will be held between the school board and Joe Proulx, head football coach, and Don Campbell, assistant.

During the district meeting, which drew a crowd of some 50 persons, including representatives of all nine member schools and Eugene, a recommendation for the future was made.

The district recommended that the Oregon School Activities association consider formation of a football district just east of the Cascade mountains which could include The Dalles, Redmond, Bend, and Prineville, plus other schools as they approach the 500-student mark.

This action, however, would not be taken during the coming year, it was understood.

Pass Recommendation

The representatives also passed a recommendation that the Oregon A-1 football championship be discontinued. The resolution pointed out that there are now so many schools in A-1 competition that post-season competition is no longer feasible.

In the sport of basketball, the district recommended that the round ball season be reduced from 22 games to 18. The motion was carried with several schools abstaining.

The idea, Acheson explained, was that the football and basketball seasons now overlap, and that if the hoop season is shortened, there could be a period of time between the two seasons.

Outdoor Ice
Rink Taking
Final Shape

A big outdoor ice rink from which snow will be removed through use of special equipment is taking final shape at the Skyliners' playground, on Tumalo creek just west of Bend.

Dick Goodwin, a director of the Skyliners, told of progress in shaping the rink when he spoke before the Lions Club Tuesday noon, at the Pine Tavern. The rink floor has been covered with sawdust, and this has been soaked with water. Freezing weather has formed a fine base and surface sprinkling work is now under way.

Crews have been working through entire nights in getting the rink in shape.

Goodwin reminded the Lions that the rink will be only one of the many facilities to be provided by the Skyliners at their playground this winter.

Facilities now being added will exceed even those in use when the playground was recognized in the entire northwest as an outstanding winter sports area, prior to World War II, Goodwin indicated.

The "big hill" is being put in condition for competitive jumping. Ski hills have been cleared of brush. A new tow has been constructed on the "bunny hill" for novice skiers.

Goodwin touched on special events lined up for the 1956-57 ski season. These will include a winter carnival in January.

Friday has been set aside as Skyliner Day in Bend, with a parade at 2 p.m. and a dance at the Pilot Butte Inn at 9 p.m. Admission will be Skyliner 1956-57 membership tickets.

Bridges' Union
Makes Decision
By 4 to 1 Vote

NEW YORK (UP)—The National Labor Relations Board moved today to obtain a court order against the striking International Longshoremen's Association, but an ILA official said the \$150 million strike of East and Gulf Coast ports would continue.

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—West Coast longshoremen empowered union leaders to call a strike and join East and Gulf Coast dock workers in a sympathy walkout that could shut down all the nation's ports, it was announced today.

Local headquarters of Harry Bridges' International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union reported that members from Puget Sound to San Diego voted by about a 4 to 1 margin to approve the strike proposal.

The vote left to Bridges and other ILWU officials the decision whether to join East and Gulf Coast workers in their six-day-old strike.

The ballot proposed that the union reaffirm in current negotiations with West Coast employer groups the "right" to "act with the East Coast."

Rebuff To Bridges
"That right includes refusal to work East Coast and Gulf ships, the right to shut down if scabs are used and the right to 'take strike action jointly with the East Coast and Gulf,'" it said.

Even so, it appeared striking East and Gulf Coast longshoremen did not welcome the assistance of Bridges' International men's union.

Capt. William V. Bradley, president of the I.L.A., said in New York, "We don't need Bridges' help or his sympathy." Bradley was reported to have sent Bridges an angry telegram telling him in so many words to mind his own business.

Bridges appeared unperturbed. He personally appeared before the San Francisco longshore local to urge the membership to vote in favor of the proposal. It was presumed the members would follow his recommendation.

Bridges' Message
Nevertheless, Bridges telegraphed Bradley a note indicating West Coast longshoremen may not strike after all. The wire said:

"We understand that Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, pointed out that West Coast strike support would bring about a Taft-Hartley injunction and, further, that based upon his contacts with top shipping industry people, your strike could be won, including national bargaining, within a short time.

"You should bear in mind that West Coast action regarding East Coast ships is the kind of basic and automatic trade union support our union is accustomed to give any union in a strike."

After making known the results of the vote, the ILWU was expected to ask the Pacific Maritime Association, representing West Coast shipowners, for a meeting to inform it officially of the union's stand.

No-Strike Contract
The ILWU has a "no-strike" contract with the PMA that runs until the middle of 1958. However, it has threatened to cancel the agreement if the employers do not agree with its readiness to support East and Gulf Coast dock workers.

Meanwhile, the ILWU decided to handle any and all ships until the negotiating committee decides otherwise.

The shipowners suspended wage negotiations earlier this week when the ILWU members refused to work 16 East Coast ships that put in to West Coast ports. On Monday, the longshoremen stared a coast-wide work stoppage that idled a total of 70 ships of all kinds.

Border Incident Enrages Lawmaker

Rep. Walter Sees Patriot Shot

VIENNA (UP)—Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) called for admission of 15,000 Hungarian refugees into the United States today a few hours after he had seen a Soviet soldier shoot down a Hungarian patriot trying to flee to Austria.

Walter, coauthor of the McCarran-Walter immigration act, visited the Hungarian border at sunrise to watch the flood of refugees struggle across the frontier.

He was so enraged at what he saw he appealed for 12,000 more refugees than the 5,000 invited by President Eisenhower.

Other members of the party accompanying Walter said they did not know if the man shot at was killed.

They said a shot was fired as a group of Hungarians walked along the towpath of the canal which forms the Austro-Hungarian border at that point. They said the man may have ducked down into the reeds.

They added that later they saw soldiers, either Russian or Hungarian, turn back a group of persons. They said it was too far away to identify the nationality of the soldiers.

Commenting on Walter's statement, one State Department official here said:
