Brodie, Wilson Garner Honors In PCC Figures

LOS ANGELES (UP) — The passing of Stanford's John Brodie and the kicking of UCLA's Kirk Wilson have been the class of Pacific Coast Conference football figures from the PCC commissioner's office showed today.

Brodie has led the nation in passing and total offense while Wilson has held national honors as a punter. Both players far outdistanced their rivals in the PCC.

Brodie has completed 130 passes for 1,541 yards and rates first in total offense with 1,546 yards. Wilson set a new PCC record last Saturday by averaging 58 yards a kick on four punts. He leads the conference with a 48.8 yard average on 24 punts.

Annets Still Leads
Southern California's Jon Annets although completing his five-game stint three weeks ago, still leads the PCC in rushing with 625 yards to 593 for teammate C. R. Roberts. Annets hasn't played since the Stanford game.

Stanford's Lou Valli tops conference scoring with 54 points. Bill Steiger of Washington State has caught the most passes, 32, while Ernie Zampese of Southern California leads in pass interceptions with five.

Leroy Phelps of Oregon has returned punts for the most yardage, 204, and teammate Jack Morris has the most yards on kickoff returns, 273.

Brodie sparked Stanford to the passing lead in the team statistics. But Southern California holds a narrow edge in rushing and total offense.

Indian Passing
Stanford has averaged 216.9 yards a game passing to 204 for Washington State. The Trojans averaged 258.4 yards rushing and boast a leading 345 yards a game mark in total offense.

The Indians rank second in total offense with 341.8 to edge Washington State with 341.1. Washington follows SC in rushing with 257.6. UCLA passed the Trojans in team punting with a 40.5 average to 38.7 for SC.

Oregon recorded the best defensive record for the ninth straight week, having allowed 235.3 yards a game to 249.7 for UCLA. The Ducks also lead in pass defense with 73.8 yards to 82.4 for California.

Giants Face Tough Bears On Sunday

Coach Jim Lee Howell of the New York Giants has a choice of nightmares this week.

He can dream about the Chicago Bears, who visit New York Sunday with the National Football League's top attack, or about his list of injured players.

The Bears, tied with Detroit for the Western lead and rated the circuit's best club by Howell and other observers, give Howell plenty to worry about. He also has a number of injured players and a vivid memory of 1954, his first season as head coach of the Giants.

New York currently leads the Eastern Division with a 6-2 record. The Giants were top with exactly the same record at this stage of the 1954 season. But Frank Gifford and Kyle Rote, New York's top offensive halfbacks, both were injured on the first play of the 10th game and sidelined Charley Conerly, the club's No. 1 quarterback, for the rest of the season.

Wounded by those losses, the Giants blew the title by dropping three of their last four 1954 games. Howell is keeping his fingers crossed now but the signs are ominous.

The Bears are picked to win because they have averaged 36 points a game while compiling a 7-1 record.

You Be the Quarterback

Harvard has a left halfback, who is a great triple-threat, although only 160 pounds and 5 ft. 8. With Yale leading, 20-14, the traditional game is in the fourth quarter. The Crimson back has out on a tremendous one-man show, accounting for all his team's 14 points by his running and kicking.

Now with Yale trying to stop the Harvard with a seven-man line, the Harvard offense has stalled, and the left half has thrown two perfect passes to his left and right ends and both have been dropped.

It is now fourth down and 10 on the Yale 22-yard line. You, the "Crimson" quarterback, are a capable passer but not as effective as the left half. If the ball is thrown between the sidelines, rate these plays 1, 2, 3 and 4:

1. Deep pass with left half throwing.

2. Pass to the left half with you throwing.

3. Screen pass with left half throwing (fake a deep pass, throw shallow to the side with linemen blocking for receiver).

4. Run or pass option with left half deciding after play starts. (Answer elsewhere on Sports Page)

Newcombe Most Valuable Player in N. L.

NEW YORK (UP) — Lumbering Don Newcombe, the bulky Brooklyn pitcher who supposedly isn't able to win the "big ones," won the biggest honor the National League has to offer today when he was named the Most Valuable Player for 1956.

The 30-year-old Dodger right-hander gathered a total of 223 points to beat out teammate Sal Maglie, who finished a surprising strong second with 183 points.

For Newcombe, who won 27 games the past season but was knocked out twice by the Yankees in the World Series, his first MVP award capped an unusual year during which "choke-up" charges were hurled at him despite his impressive victory total.

And for the 39-year-old Maglie, who was considered "all through" when Cleveland let him go to the Dodgers in May, his strong second-place showing climaxed a banner season during which he pitched a no-hitter against the Phillies and proved a motivating force in Brooklyn's climb to the pennant.

The entire balloting, in which 24 members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America took part, was more or less a monopoly for the Dodgers. Five of them finished among the top 10, with second baseman Junior Gilliam winding up fifth, shortstop Pee Wee Reese eighth and centerfielder Duke Snider 10th.

Milwaukee outfielder Hank Aaron, the league's leading hitter with a .328 average, gained third place behind Newcombe and Maglie with 146 points, teammate Warren Spahn, who won 20 games, was fourth with 126 points and Gilliam had 103 points in fifth place.

They were followed by shortstop Roy McMillan of the Redlegs, in sixth place with 96 points; rookie Cincinnati outfielder Frank Robinson with 79 points; Reese with 71 points; Stan Musial of the Cardinals with 62 and Snider with 55.

BROWN SIGNS

PITTSBURGH (UP) — Joe L. Brown, who replaced Branch Rickey as general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates last year, has been signed again for the job, club President John L. Galbreath announced today.

Neither the length of Brown's contract nor the terms of his salary were disclosed. The 38-year-old son of movie comedian Joe E. Brown succeeded Rickey as general manager Nov. 1, 1955.

Chestnut Picked To Beat Bain

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (UP) — Like Chestnut, fourth-ranking featherweight from New York, rates as a 10 to 8 favorite to sidetrack the title hopes of youthful Irish Tommy Bain tonight in their nationally televised 10-round at Hollywood Legion Stadium.

Chestnut, however, may have his hands full controlling the ambitious 21-year-old Bain, holder of the California featherweight crown.

The New Yorker sports a 22-6-3 record but the hard-punching Bain boasts 31 wins, 17 of them by knockouts. He has lost four and was held to three draws.

Delicate Cornea Transplant Restores Eye to Full Sight

CHICAGO (UP) — Ernest Ek-went when he told how the miracle of modern surgery reclaimed him from a life of semi-blindness and let him see his wife's face clearly for the first time.

Ek, 50, Wauwatosa, Wis., had been semiblind since the age of 2.

He told his story at a news conference at Weley Memorial Hospital, where last June a delicate corneal transplant operation restored full sight to his one remaining eye.

Before the operation, he could perceive only light and dim shadows. He could count his fingers only if he held his hand six inches from his eye.

"It was like looking through wax paper," he said.

"But now, everything is beautiful. Eggs frying in a pan are really beautiful if you've never seen them before."

For most of his life the corner of his right eye had been scarred, inflamed and painful, his medical history showed. At the age of 6, his left eye was removed.

As an adult he worked at the

workshop for the blind in Milwaukee for a time. Nine years ago he got a job at a shoe factory. The company trained him to run a hydraulic last-pulling machine.

"I did it mostly by touch," he said. "It's a lot easier now that I can see."

A prematurely white-haired grandfather, Ek now is learning to write. His wife, Hildegard, to whom he has been married 22 years, is teaching him.

"Most things are beautiful," he said. "My wife's face. I had never really seen it. And she has helped me through the years, never letting me feel I was a burden."

Un-American Hearings Set

WASHINGTON (UP) — The House Committee on Un-American Activities said today it will investigate Communist "political subversion" in a series of hearings in Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle.

The committee said it is particularly interested in Communist political propaganda coming from Communist countries in the Far East and being broadcast by "Communist agents" on the West Coast.

A committee aide said hearings are tentatively scheduled for Los Angeles for Dec. 6, 7 and 8, San Francisco Dec. 10 and 11 and Seattle Dec. 13 and 14.

Roper Named Fund Chairman

NEW YORK (UP) — Pollster Elmo Roper has been elected chairman of the Board of Directors of the Fund For The Republic, it was announced today.

Roper succeeds Paul G. Hoff, who will continue as a director of the fund but has relinquished his chairmanship of the board.

The fund, established by a grant from the Ford Foundation, also announced the election of three new board members. They are Alicia Patterson, editor and publisher of the Long Island news paper Newsday; Bruce Catton, Bethesda, Md., Pulitzer prize winning historian, and Harry S. Ashmore, executive editor of the Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock, Ark.

The new board members replace three whose terms have expired. Chester Bowles, former U. S. Ambassador to India; John Lord O'Brian, attorney, and James D. Zellerbach, president of Crown Zellerbach Corp.

Roper, a public opinion analyst, said in a statement issued upon his election as board chairman that the fund "is trying to strengthen the climate in which freedom is possible."

He said the fund, which has been under heavy fire by some conservative circles, "financed research on the nature and history of Communism in the United States, and on the measures taken to combat Communism in the United States, such as the federal loyalty-security program, and blacklisting in the entertainment industries."
