RESOLUTION NO. 356
INTENTION TO IMPROVE
 WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Bend deems it expedient to improve Awbrey Road from a point 41 feet south of the north line of Saginaw Avenue to the intersection of Awbrey Road with the City limits with pavement of oil mat surfacing 30 feet in width, curbs and such other work as will make a finished improvement, including a seal coat to be applied the season following completion of this improvement project, said local improvement to be known as Improvement District No. 308, and the City Engineer's estimate of the probable cost thereof is \$121,755.45.

AND WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Bend has determined that the within improvement is of such nature and character that the special benefits resulting therefrom extend beyond the boundaries of local improvement districts as described and defined in the Charter of the City of Bend, as amended, and that the same shall therefore be deemed and it is proposed to create an enlarged improvement district to pay the entire cost and expense of such improvement.

AND WHEREAS such enlarged district shall bear the entire cost and expense of the improvement and the properties located therein shall bear their share thereof in accordance with the following proportion, and apportionment, to-wit: said enlarged improvement district shall, for the purpose of ascertaining the amount to be assessed against each lot, tract, parcel of land, or other property within said district, be divided into subdivisions or zones paralleling the margin of the street, alley or public way to be improved, said subdivisions to be numbered respectively first, second, third, fourth, and fifth. The first subdivision shall include all the lands within the district lying between the street margins and lines drawn parallel therewith and thirty feet therefrom. The second subdivision shall include all lands, if any, within the district lying between lines drawn parallel with and thirty feet and sixty feet, respectively, from said street margins. The third subdivision shall include all lands, if any, within the district lying between lines drawn parallel with and sixty feet and ninety feet, respectively, from said street margins. The fourth subdivision shall include all lands, if any, within the district lying between lines drawn parallel with and ninety feet and one hundred and twenty feet, respectively, from said street margins. The fifth subdivision shall include all lands within the district lying between a line drawn parallel with and one hundred and twenty feet from said margin and the outer limit of said enlarged improvement district. The rate of assessment per square foot in each subdivision shall be fixed on the basis that the special benefits conferred on a square foot of land in subdivision first, second, third, fourth and fifth, respectively, are related to each other as are the numbers 45, 25, 20, 10 and 5, respectively, and shall be ascertained in the following manner: The products of the number of square feet in the subdivision first, second, third, fourth and fifth, respectively, and the numbers 45, 25, 20, 10 and 5, respectively, shall be ascertained, and their sum taken, which sum shall be divided into the total cost and expense of such improvement. The products of the resultant quotient and the numbers 45, 25, 20, 10 and 5, respectively, shall be the separate rates of assessment per square foot for subdivisions first, second, third, fourth and fifth, respectively.

Indian Graves Being Moved

THE DALLES (UP) — Removal of Indian remains on Grave Island behind The Dalles dam is expected to be completed today.

Army engineers awarded a contract for removal of the remains because the island will be flooded next spring by backwaters from The Dalles dam. The remains are being kept in a The Dalles mortuary until a tomb overlooking the dam project is completed on the Oregon shore of the Columbia river.

Grave island has not been used as an Indian burial site since 1894.

Churches Still Have Long Way to Go Putting Christ Back in Christmas

WASHINGTON (UP) — Churches have a long way to go in their efforts to "put Christ back into Christmas," the dean of Washington Cathedral said today.

Despite a marked increase in attendance at Christmas worship services in the last few years, The Very Rev. Francis Sayre said, there are still "a great many" Americans to whom the birthday of Christ is "merely an excuse for wassailing."

Reminding people of the true meaning of Christmas—through religious themes in greeting cards, store window displays and elsewhere—is a "commendable" movement, the Episcopal clergyman said. But it can have only a "limited" effect in rescuing Christmas from "paganization."

Millions Don't Believe
 The basic problem, he said, is that millions of people, including many nominal Christians, do not really believe the "glad tidings of great joy" which Christmas publishes to the world.

"Christmas represents the coming of Jesus Christ into the world," he said, "and observance of it consciously or unconsciously reflects the importance we attach to that event."

"For those who believe that 'God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself, Christmas will always bring a sense of profound awe and thanksgiving."

"But to the great many who do not accept Christ as the divine son of God and the redeeming savior of mankind, Christmas is and will continue to be merely an excuse for wassailing."

Services Broadcast
 Dean Sayre, a grandson of President Woodrow Wilson, has been a major contributor to the interdenominational effort to restore the religious meaning of Christmas.

Holiday services in his high-vaulted gothic cathedral on Mount St. Albans have been broadcast to the nation by television and radio for the past several years, and will be again this year. The cathedral's Christmas Eve service will be carried by CBS television and radio networks at 11 p.m. EST; the
