Advisory Group Studies Program

SPECIAL TO THE BULLETIN — The new Deschutes county potato advisory council studied the certification program as handled at present at its first meeting Wednesday afternoon in the extension office.

These recommendations were made from their deliberations:

1. That a double check be made on seed lots at the OSC greenhouse in order to keep separate the lots from each individual grower.

2. That field inspection be made at the request of the council. Growers would like inspection made when they feel their fields are ready, and before possible frosts can intervene.

3. That present method of field sampling of greenhouse lots be continued.

4. That notification of greenhouse readings continue to be made in advance so growers may be present for the readings, if opportune.

5. That source of seed be listed for each grower when filed and greenhouse readings are published.

6. That Dr. William Raymer, plant pathologist from OSC, be present for the council's next meeting, set for Wednesday, January 16, at 7:30 p. m. in the extension office.

One member of the council reported he had already sold a medium size lot of foundation seed for \$3 per cwt., sacked at the cellar. From this information the council felt the present price for foundation seed would be \$3, and for certified \$2.50. This is only a guide, they emphasized.

John McLaughlin, Bend, is council chairman, and will serve seven years; Lloyd Friday, Terrebonne, five years; Charles Trachel of Cloverdale, four; Bruce Dyer, Bend, three; Lester Wick, Alfalfa, two and Willard Cyrus, Sisters, one. Terms were chosen by lot.

Teamster Probe To Be Requested By City Council

PORTLAND (UP) — The Portland city council voted unanimously yesterday to request a Senate investigating committee to come to Portland to check into activities of the Teamsters Union.

The approval was attached to a motion introduced by Commissioner Stanley W. Earl, who said afterward that he had not discussed the matter with other commissioners before the council meeting.

The request was directed to Sen. John L. McClellan, chairman of the Senate permanent subcommittee on investigations. Investigators for the McClellan committee have been studying Teamsters Union operations in West Coast cities for nearly a month.

Earl told his fellow commissioners: "The city of Portland in the last eight months has been subjected to a number of charges and countercharges concerning various persons within the Teamsters' organization and without." He added, "The people of Portland are entitled to a full and complete airing of any and all charges."

Church Begins 19th Year on Air

French Liner Ordered Back To Port Said

LONDON (UP) — France hurriedly reversed itself today and ordered a liner taking 160 Egyptian prisoners to Cyprus to return to Port Said immediately. Six Egyptian officers in Paris were ordered down to Egypt.

The French acted to prevent further snarls in prisoner exchange programs and to make sure that current agreements to clear the Suez Canal are carried out without hitch. The United Nations expected the canal clearance work to start Sunday.

Egypt called off an exchange of 50 British civilian Suez Canal workers when it learned France was planning to intern 160 Egyptians on Cyprus. Britain has planned to send back its Egyptian prisoners by train this morning.

The work of removing 4 wrecked ships and two bridges is to begin one day after the last Anglo-French invasion troops leave the Port Said area. Port Said dispatches set the final date at "probably" Saturday.

A hurried series of compromise agreements will permit "civilianized" British Royal Navy personnel to work on the clearance job in the Port Said area despite earlier Egyptian opposition. They will work as members of the U. N. canal clearance project.

There was still a possibility that Egyptian-Jewish differences over the Gaza Strip could hold up start of clearance work, but U. N. officials were known to be anxious to get the work started at once.

All indications were the situation in the Middle East had reached the stage of slight slimmer rather than the furious boil of a few weeks ago.

Log Contract Awarded by City

A contract for logging 98 trees in Shevlin park was awarded by the city commission this week to J. H. Borden and Ken Paul, loggers, who bid \$42 per thousand feet.

The work will be done under the supervision of the U. S. Forest Service, which marked the trees that are to be destroyed. The nearest bid to that of Borden and Paul was \$26.55 for green lumber and \$1 for dead trees.

Borden said he intended to haul the trees to Prineville for sale to a mill.

The commission instructed Recorder Julia S. Johnson to call the members at some favorable date to appraise two lots in Silver Lake boulevard which are owned by the city. An offer to purchase the lots has been made, said Mrs. Johnson. The lots are in the boulevard between Roosevelt and McKinley avenues.

Platform Rockers In High Grade Covers

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Additional Power Planned by BPA

PORTLAND (UP) — Bonneville Power Administration announced yesterday that it is making available 250,000 kilowatts of power through Jan. 1 for interruptible industrial power consumers in the Pacific Northwest.

The added power will replace about half of the interruptible loads now being served by non-federal steam and hydro generation and by provisional Hungry Horse power.

Administrator William A. Pearl said "general region-wide rains and mild temperatures of the past week have brought nearly all Pacific Northwest hydroelectric plants to maximum or near maximum generating capacity."

Pearl explained that Columbia River flows well above median and light power loads had added some 700,000 average kilowatts to current-federal resources.

The 13 industrial consumers in the Northwest — electro-process industries — have maintained full production since Dec. 8 through use of costlier non-federal steam and hydro resources totalling 250,000 kilowatts. Another 250,000 kilowatts were supplied under a provisional agreement calling for replacement of released storage.

James Murdock, 30, of Oakland, Calif., was sentenced today by Judge Alvin J. Gray to five days in jail on a self imposed charge of vagrancy. Murdock appeared at police headquarters with a request for food and shelter.

Richard J. Sullivan, 32, of 734 E. Ninth street, was charged with operating a car bearing an expired license plate.

GOLDEN ROOF — BOSTON (UP) — The dome of the 159-year-old Massachusetts State House is covered with a paper-thin overlay of 23-karat gold valued at \$5,000. The present gold covering is the seventh hammered onto the dome since 1874.

Harold Johnson Takes Own Life

Harold Johnson, 58, of 605 Delaware avenue, committed suicide yesterday in his residence by shooting himself, it was reported today by city police.

Johnson was found dead in his bed by Mrs. Mary A. Sala, who had been caring for him, and a woman companion, when they entered his residence at 3:28 p. m. They called police.

A bullet wound was in Johnson's right temple. A .22 caliber revolver was lying beside his body. Deputy Coroner J. A. Walker pronounced the death a suicide.

Johnson had been ill and out of work for years, said Walker. He had been cured for by Mrs. Sala, Walker explained, and she found the body when she made her usual visit to the house.

The body was taken to the Niswonger & Winslow Funeral home. It is being held pending word from Johnson's only known relative, Mrs. Anna Galante, of Solway, N. Y., a sister, who has been notified.
