Plans are Made For Youth Week

REDMOND — "Consider Your Call" is the proposal made to young people of 38 Protestant affiliations as they unite from January 27 to February 3 in observance of National Youth Week.

It will be the 14th annual Youth Week. Since the United Christian Youth movement was formed 14 years ago it has been "growing steadily as an instrument for decisive united action and a means for young people to express their oneness in Christ." It functions now as the youth department of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States of America.

Miss Dorothy Richmond, Director of Christian Education at Community church here, reports the above and outlines plans for local observance.

Christian young people in Redmond and surrounding area will gather at Westminster hall for a rally Sunday, January 27, from 4 to 6 p.m. Sponsors are the Redmond Ministerial Association, with both leaders and young people contributing to the program.

Included are a radio play, a film, worship service, panel discussions, and refreshments.

The radio script, "Day of Decision" with cast of 10, concerns a father's ultimatum to his son to decide by evening whether he will attend college and what his life work will be. The boy does make a decision, but bet, the son and the family learn something about ultimatums. Parts in the play will be read by members of senior high fellowship of the host church.

Free Methodist young people will lend the worship.

The film "Missionary to Walker's Garage" is arranged by the Ministerial Association. The panel will consider "What is My Call, or As a Christian What Shall I do With My Life?"

Women of the participating churches are providing refreshments.

At 7 p.m. Wednesday, January 30, the radio play will be broadcast over KJUN. It is to be given also on KBND at a time to be announced. James McAllister is assisting young people in making the tape recording of this broadcast.

Young people of individual churches here are also arranging or have already presented special services in observance of Youth Week.
