Short Course in Flower Arranging Highlights Meeting of Garden Club

The Mirror Pond Garden club had a compact course in flower arranging, Tuesday afternoon. The meeting was held following a dessert at the Bendonian Hall at the home of Mrs. Francis Stokesberry.

Mrs. Albert Schatz prefaced her judging of the various arrangements contributed by the members with a short talk on the fundamentals. It was pointed out that one should have at hand a pair of small pruners, needle point frogs of different shapes, plastic for anchoring frogs, containers of plain, neutral colors, twisters and Scotch tape for binding small stems together.

First decide, said Mrs. Schatz, where the arrangement is to be placed, then choose container and flowers suitable for the purpose. Sweet peas, lily-of-the-valley or roses are lovely in crystal or silver, while ceramics take almost any type of flower. An old brown bean jug is perfect for poppies.

Keep Flowers Fresh
Keep your flowers in deep water while arranging, the speaker said. Hard stems should be smashed and porous stems, such as those of poppies, should be immersed in hot water for a couple of minutes, or the ends should be burned. Flowers should never be crowded and stems should never cross.

An arrangement should tell a story. There are basic rules which must be followed. The four basic requirements are design, balance, scale and harmony.

Design is the form or shape of the composition, the thought or plan on which it is built. Balance is of two types — symmetrical and asymmetrical. In composing a flower arrangement, symmetrical balance is attained by making both "sides" of the arrangement practically the same. In asymmetrical arrangement the two sides are distinctly different, but they have equal weight and hence balance each other.

Harmony, the fourth principle, gives the sensation of being pleased.
