## UCLA Seeks to Break Away from Strict PCC

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP) — Threats of a bolt date back to last summer when the conference gridiron scandals broke and UCLA was among four member schools penalized for infractions. In the Bruins' case, it included being expelled from the Rose Bowl until July of 1959.

The latest drive for UCLA to clear out started last month after the PCC refused to allow penalized seniors to play half their games this autumn as was the case with last fall's four-year men. The Bruins also barely escaped being expelled from the conference, staying in by a vote of 5-4. Nigg proposed the secession which will be studied today.

In the meantime, California also is reported to want out, not because of strict athletic code, but because the austere Bears feel it is not rigid enough.

Chancellor Clark Kerr of the mother campus recently said that Cal might leave the PCC since the conference had not taken any "constructive" action toward clearing up the reasons for past difficulties.

Kerr favors greater responsibility on the institutions, which would have to furnish athletes job records upon request, among other things.

Nigg's resolution was scheduled to be discussed by the regents' Educational Policy Committee Thursday before it was submitted to the full board today. The session was cloaked in secrecy and Sproul unavailable for comment.

## Cardinals Take First Place Spot With 7 to 4 Triumph

Murry Dickson and Stan Musial, the only members of the last St. Louis Cardinal pennant winner still with the team, have turned back the clock 11 years to play a vital part in a 150 drive that's carried the current Redbirds into a half-game lead in the National League scramble.

Dickson turned in his fourth victory of the month as the Cardinals beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-4, Thursday night while Musial stretched his hitting streak to 20 games. The Cardinals have roared along at a 155 pace this month with Musial batting at a .400 clip and driving in 19 runs in the 20 games.

The Cardinals had the aid of the New York Giants, who knocked the Milwaukee Braves out of first place with a 4-3 decision in 12 innings. The Cincinnati Redlegs vaulted from fifth to third place when they whipped the Brooklyn Dodgers, 6-1, and the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Chicago Cubs, 7-2, in the other N.L. games.

**Yanks Extend Streak**  
The New York Yankees ran their longest winning streak of the campaign to seven games with a 3-1 win over the Detroit Tigers and moved to within 1 1/2 games of the American League lead when the Baltimore Orioles beat the first-place Chicago White Sox, 4-1. The Boston Red Sox downed the Cleveland Indians, 9-7, and the Washington Senators defeated the Kansas City Athletics, 9-4, in other A.L. activity. The Yankees and White Sox open a four-game battle for the lead at Yankee Stadium tonight.

The 41-year-old Dickson limited the Pirates to two runs and seven hits before retiring with a stiff arm after eight innings. Musial, who doubled in the first inning to keep his streak intact, drove in one run with a sacrifice fly in the sixth. Dickson beat the Dodgers in the pennant-clinching playoff game while Musial hit a mere .365 back in 1946 when the Cardinals last won a pennant.

The Giants beat the Braves when Gil Harris tripped in the 12th and scored on Johnny Antonelli's sacrifice fly. It was only the fourth victory of the season for Antonelli but marked the third straight time he beat his ex-teammates. Ed Mathews and Bill Bruton homered for the Braves.

Wally Pate blasted a grand-slam homer in the fourth inning and Brooks Lawrence pitched an eight-hitter to lead the Redlegs to their second straight win over the Dodgers. Gus Bell also homered for Cincinnati while Duke Snider

hit No. 12 for Brooklyn. Harvey Haddix pitched a seven-hitter and collected three singles as the Phillies held fourth place with their victory over the Cubs. Ernie Banks hit his 13th homer for the Cubs. Don Kaiser suffered his fifth loss.

**Mantle Boosts Average**  
Bob Turley pitched a six-hitter and struck out eight for the Yankees. The loss went to Frank Lary, who beat the Yankees five times last year. Mickey Mantle went 1-for-2 and lifted his league-leading batting average to .378.

Brooklyn castoff Billy Loes won his seventh game for Baltimore with a seven-hitter that handed the White Sox their eighth defeat in 14 games. Bob Boyd delivered key singles as the Orioles scored two runs in both the first and second innings to chase rookie Bill Fischer.

Billy Klaus and Jackie Jensen had three hits each to pace a 14-hit Red Sox attack that carried Dave Slisler to his fifth victory. Rocky Colavito homered and Vic Wertz hit three doubles for the Indians. The loss went to Early Wynn and squared his record at 8-8.

Pinch-hitter Art Schull's two-run double and Pete Runnels' two-run single were the big blows of a five-run seventh-inning rally that enabled the Senators to snap a four-game losing streak. Pedro Ramos gained his fifth win while Mickey McDermott suffered his third defeat.

## Profit Figures Given for Teams

WASHINGTON (UP)—The 16 major league baseball teams produced \$2,867,803 in net profits for their owners in the past five years.

An analysis of the financial statements of the clubs showed today that the American League took the lion's share of the profits—\$2,683,192. The eight National League teams showed a profit for the five-year period of only \$184,611.

Some of the teams, like the Brooklyn Dodgers, the New York Yankees, the Washington Senators and the Chicago White Sox, have turned in profits in every one of the five years from 1952 through 1956.

Others, like the Philadelphia Phillies and the Pittsburgh Pirates, have lost money in every one of the five years.

The financial statements were made public Thursday by a House judiciary subcommittee that has been investigating anti-trust features of organized baseball, football, basketball and hockey.

It was the first time that financial reports of the major league teams have been disclosed. The figures were given to the subcommittee by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick.

## 11 Olympic Champions Set Competition in AAU Meet

DAYTON, Ohio (UP)—Some 450 of the nation's top track and field athletes will toe the line tonight in the 67th National AAU championships.

The most impressive display of talent in the history of the event, has the cast including 11 Olympic champions and all but three winners of last week's NCAA championships plus dozen of more foreign stars.

Meet officials expect American and world records to fall in wholesale lots if the weather stays good.

Featured at the Dayton High School Stadium track will be 21 events, with competition beginning at 7:30 tonight in eight of them, while the rest will be run off Saturday.

Olympic champions on deck are Charley Jenkins, Villanova, 400-meter dash; Tom Courtney, Army, 800-meter run; Parry O'Brien, Los Angeles AC, shotput; Al Oerter, Kansas, discus throw; Harold Connolly, Boston AA, hammer throw; Lee C'houm, North Carolina College, high hurdles; Charley Dumais, LAAC, high jump; Glenn Davis, Ohio State.

Arnold Palmer, No. 2 money-winner on the circuit, was tied with Johnny Post and Canadian Al Balding and Stan Leonard for second with 67.

It was like-old home week for Rosburg and Palmer who have marked up some of their greatest successes in Michigan. Rosburg last year won the Motor City Open at Detroit, and Palmer grabbed the 1954 Amateur title. Palmer birdied three of his last four holes Thursday.
