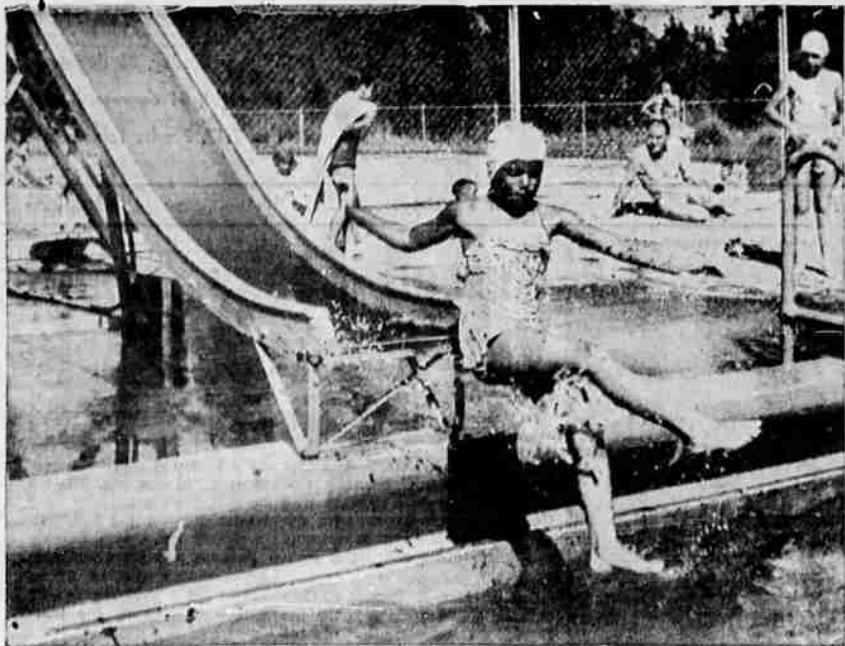
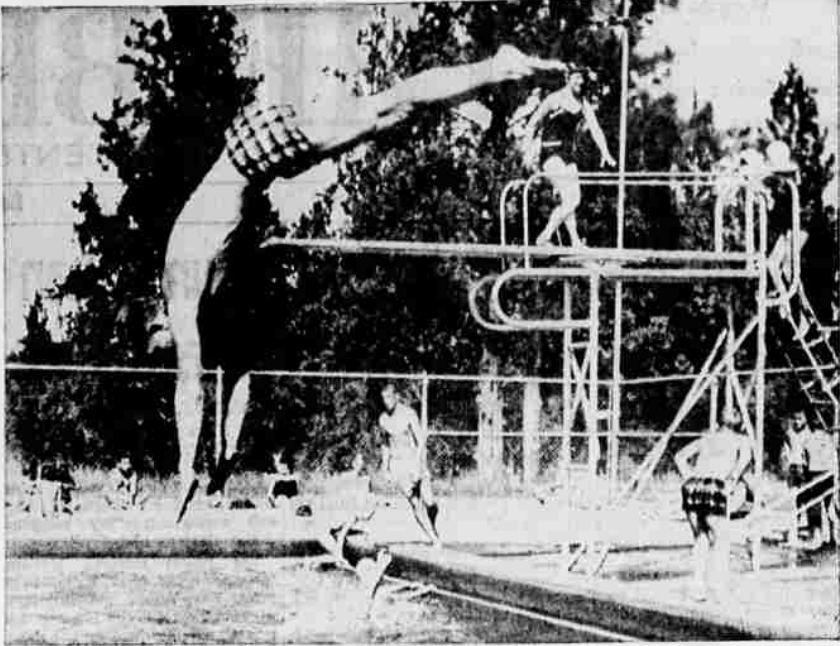

Cardinals Two Games Ahead After Victory

Sam Jones loves to chew on toothpicks and maybe that ain't etiquette, but the St. Louis Cardinals aren't fussy as long as he can help them sink their teeth into some World Series melon this fall.

Jones munched on a toothpick all Friday night while pitching a two-hitter against the New York Giants in a 5-1 victory that kept the Cards two games ahead in the National League pennant race.

For a time Friday night, it appeared the hard-throwing St. Louis right hander might be en route to the second no-hit game of his big league career. He pitched one such game for the Cubs against the Pirates, May 12, 1955, and he was working on another one Friday night until Whitey Lockman singled off his glove with two out in the sixth inning.

The only other hit he yielded was Willie Mays' 14th homer in the ninth but by that time, home runs by Stan Musial, Alvin Dark and Don Blasingame had insured Jones' third victory in a row and seventh of the campaign.

Redlegs Lose Again

Milwaukee remained two games behind St. Louis with a 5-4 victory over Pittsburgh, while Chicago defeated Philadelphia, 5-2, and the Dodgers handed the Redlegs their seventh loss in a row, 3-1.

Derby Winner Iron Liege To Race in Classic

CHICAGO (UP)—Kentucky Derby winner Iron Liege, under the nation's leading jockey, Willie Harkack, runs in the Arlington classic today against the top 2-year-old money winner of 1955, Greek Game, and six other horses with \$106,350 ready for the victors.

Harkack, severely injured last Wednesday when he was thrown by his mount, decided only Friday night that he would run. His decision was made after a test ride on a stable pony.

"I feel a little sore," he said, "but no real pain. I'm sure I can ride so I'll be up on Iron Liege."

Iron Liege, piloted to victory by Harkack in the Derby and the Jersey Stakes and to second place in the Preakness, will be coupled with stablemate Barbizon and was the early 8-5 favorite.

But Greek Game, owned by Fred W. Hooper, was a local favorite and although listed at 3-1 in the early line, could go off as the choice of the crowd and certainly no worse than second choice.

Harkack's decision meant that Dave Erb, who rode Iron Liege in eight races this year before Harkack took over, would be on Barbizon, Jockey Eric Guerin will ride Greek Game.

Smith, Pigou Fight Tonight In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (UP) — "Charlie (Tomstone) Smith, California welterweight champion, goes after his 18th straight victory tonight when he battles Marcel Pigou, of Paris, in the 10-round main event at Hollywood Legion Stadium.

Smith has been tabbed a 2-1 favorite to spoil the Frenchman's debut in this country.

Pigou, a 23-year-old middleweight, is undefeated in 19 professional starts and only two draws mar his record. He has turned back such capable French middleweights as Mickey Laurent, Jimmy Lygett and Louis Mouras.

The 24-year-old Smith, seventh ranked welterweight, boasts an impressive 23-3 record that includes 11 knockouts. In bouts this year, he has stopped Barry Allison and gained decisions over Don Jordan, Joe Miceli and Tiger Al Williams.

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Anti Fight Ukase Of NL President Creates Puzzle

BROOKLYN, N.Y. (UP) — Puzzled by National League President Warren Giles' edict making them responsible for any future fights involving their players, managers Birdie Tebbetts of Cincinnati and Walt Alston of Brooklyn declared today they may be helpless to comply with his order.

Giles sent special bulletins to Tebbetts, Alston and the six other National League managers warning them they would be held responsible for any repetition of Thursday night's brawl between Brooklyn and Cincinnati players.

"It's no good to make us responsible," Tebbetts said, "unless they put in a rule that any players not involved in the fight, who come out on the field, be thrown out of the game."

Alston said he didn't see how any manager could control his players once a free-for-all breaks out.

"What am I supposed to do if someone pokes one of my players?" he asked. "Am I supposed to tell my player not to retaliate because I'm to be held responsible?"

All was peace and harmony between the Dodgers and Redlegs Friday night in their game at Jersey City, N.J.

The only casualty from Thursday's fight was Redleg third baseman Don Hoak, who was missing from the lineup because of two swollen fingers on his right hand.

Hoak, who was flattened Thursday night by Charley Neal, had originally vowed to "get" the Dodger infielder but "cooled off" after Giles levied \$100 fines on both along with Raul Sanchez of the Redlegs and Junior Gilliam of the Dodgers. The NL president also warned Hoak against carrying out his threatened reprisal against Neal.

Australian Sets Women's Record In 800-Meters

HONOLULU, T.H. (UP) — Australia's Lorraine Crapp set a new record for the women's 800-meter swimming title with ten minutes 24.3 seconds at an international swimming meet here Friday night.

Nancy Ramsey, of Seattle, Washington, set a new record for the women's 100-meter butterfly with one minute 10.1 seconds.

Under the new rules of the International Swimming Federation, all world records must be set in a 100-meter salt water pool.

The record of Miss Crapp in the 800-meter freestyle bettered her own 1956 recognized world record of ten minutes 30.9 seconds.

The record of Miss Ramsey in the 100-meter butterfly bettered the recognized world record of A. Voorbij, of the Netherlands, of one minute 11.9 seconds.

PORTLAND (UP) — The Portland Beavers notched a 6-5 win over the San Diego Padres Friday night — the Beavers' first Pacific Coast League victory in 14 games — before 2275 fans in Multnomah stadium.

San Diego took an early lead with Bob Lennon scoring on Bill Harrell's infield out, and Catcher

Earl Averill singling Preston Ward home in the second inning. In the fifth, Rudy Regalado smashed his seventh homer of the season, putting the Pads ahead 1-0.

Beaver Manager Bill Posedel had been thumped from the game in the third inning by Umpire Earl Lennon after a rhabarb developed over a ball pitched to Frank Carswell by Mudcat Grant.

In the bottom of the fifth, Portland grabbed five runs. Carswell singled in Luis Marquez, Earl Rapp sent Ed Mickelson home with a single to right field, and Gene Lary took the pitching chore from Grant. Ed Winceniak's single off Gary scored Carswell, and two plays later Casey Wise singled deep into center to score Rapp and Winceniak.

The Padres were good for two runs in the seventh, but the Beavers held off a tie.

Tonight's probable pitchers are John Gray (3-1), San Diego, and Bob Alexander (5-10), for Portland.

ROSEBURG — Bend's American Legion baseball contest with Roseburg was called last night in the bottom of the fourth when a Roseburg batter hit a foul ball hitting a power line over the field which put about half of the lights out of order.

Bend scored three runs on four hits and committed no errors. Roseburg had one run on two hits and made one bobble.
