

Portland Drops Another Pair To Sacramento

PORTLAND (UP)—The Sacramento Solons edged Portland for a 6-5 win in the nightcap to go with an earlier 10-6 victory to sweep a Pacific Coast League doubleheader from the Beavers before 1375 fans Monday night.

Bevo Catcher Ron Bottler dropped a pop fly five yards down the base path to allow Jim Westlake and Jim Greengrass to score on the error in the first inning. A little later, with two on, Lyle Olsen hit his third home run of the year.

Before Portland came to bat in the game, Sacramento had chalked up five runs on three hits, all unearned.

In the second inning, winning pitcher Roger Osenbaugh singled to left, was sacrificed to second, and scored on a double by Leo Richetti.

Bottler doubled down the line to left field in Portland's third, Ed Winceniak walked and Luis Marquez scored Bottler with a double to left. Earl Rapp scored Winceniak and Marquez with a single. Don Kaiser was the loser.

The double win—second in a row for the Solons—puts them four games ahead of the Beavers in the series here.

Heavy hitting by Cuno Barragan and Harry Bright assisted the Solon win in the opener.

Barragan's third homer of the season came off a pitch by John Carmichael in the second inning, with the bags empty. An inning later, he tripled and drove home two runs. Also in the Solons' big third—which sent Carmichael to the showers and brought in Darrell Martin—Bright tripled, and Jim Greengrass hit a double. It was five runs on five hits and an error for Sacramento in that frame.

For Portland, Ed Winceniak smacked a two-run homer in the fifth.

Other Monday night PCL scores included Vancouver 3, San Francisco 2, and Hollywood 14, Los Angeles 0.

Patty Berg Wins World Tourney

CHICAGO (UP)—Patty Berg, with \$6,000 first prize money, won the world tournament at Tam O'Shanter in her purse today had a total of \$15,768 in winnings for the year.

Miss Berg won the World Monday for the fourth time with an edge of two strokes over Fay Crocker, of Uruguay, in their playoff for the women's professional title.

The chunky titleholder's addition of the first prize money to her account put her nearly \$5,000 beyond Miss Crocker, whose \$2,000 in second-place money gave her a total of \$10,796.83 for 1957.

Miss Berg, a Chicagoan, was even or ahead throughout the tournament with the challenging Uruguayan.

Miss Berg's previous 1957 wins were the titleholders, the Western Open and the All-American at Tam O'Shanter. She was forced into the playoff when she and Miss Crocker wound up with 302 apiece at the end of 72 holes of regular play.

Seattle Wins Legion Title

ELLENSBURG (UP)—Seattle's American Legion Junior baseball team swept through the state tournament unbeaten here Monday by hanging up a second win over Aberdeen, 16-9.

Aberdeen entered the playoff after edging Selah-Naches, 8-7.

The Seattle club will take its state title to the regional playoffs Aug. 21-25 in Portland for a shot at the nationals.

Hard-hitting Joe Wesson punched a two-run double in the third inning to spark Seattle's nine-run rally. Winning pitcher was Ron Roy; loser was starter Harold Pearson. Aberdeen's Dan O'Clary was selected the tournament's outstanding player.

In the Selah-Naches tilt, winning pitcher Louie Audette limited the losers to seven hits and struck out 10.

Chalky' Wright Dead at Age 45

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Police today listed the death of Albert "Chalky" Wright, 45, former world featherweight boxing champion, as an accidental drowning in the bathroom of his mother's home. Officers said Wright, who suffered from a heart condition, apparently fell in the bathtub Monday. Efforts to revive him by a five department rescue squad failed.

Wright, a native of Durango, Mexico, launched his boxing career in 1937. He won the featherweight crown in an 11th-round knockout over Joey Archibald on Sept. 11, 1941 and lost the title to Willie Pep on Sept. 29, 1944.

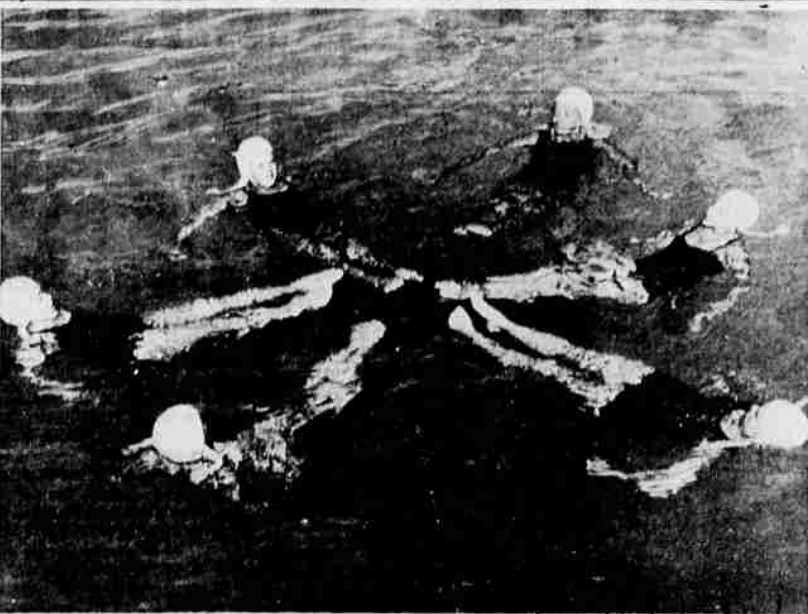
HAWKS SIGN STARS

No Davis Cup Ambitions Held By Dick Savitt

SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. (UP)—Tall and husky Dick Savitt, who trounced America's top two tennis players in marching to the Eastern Grass Courts championship today not to get his hopes up.

The 30-year-old Savitt defeated Vic Seixas of Philadelphia in the championship match Monday, 6-4, 6-4, 1-6, 8-6, after having whipped the U.S. No. 1 ranking player, Ham Richardson, in the semifinals.

"I'm not interested in Davis Cup play," said Savitt after the final match. "As a matter of fact, I may not even play in the nationals at Forest Hills. It will depend on whether my business permits it."

Savitt's game was not quite at its peak against Seixas, and he had trouble with his service, but his ground strokes and volleys at the net were too strong for 33-year-old Seixas, who has yet to win the Eastern championship in 10 years of trying, although he has taken the Wimbledon and Forest Hills titles.

Mary Ann Mitchell of San Leandro, Calif., won the women's singles with a 6-2, 6-2 conquest of Jeanne Arth of St. Paul, Minn., and Barbara Davidson of Milwaukee and Mrs. Pat Todd of La Jolla, Calif., won the women's doubles over Janet Hopps of Seattle and Diana Wootton of Santa Monica, Calif., 6-1, 6-1.

The men's doubles went to the Australian team of Roy Emerson and Bob Mark, with a 4-6, 8-6, 9-7, 4-6, 6-3 triumph over the English Davis Cup team of Mike Davis and Bob Wilson.

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Under Parker's tutelage the Lions won three straight Western Division titles, 1952-53-54 and won the National Football League title in 1952 and 1953. Parker Drops Bombshell, Quits As Detroit Boss

DETROIT (UP)—Buddy Parker said today he definitely quit as head coach of the Detroit Lions and he nominated assistant coach George Wilson to take his place when the Lions open the exhibition season here Wednesday night against the Cleveland Browns.

Parker shocked a group of more than 600 persons, including club President Edwin J. Anderson, many of the directors and all of the players, at the annual "Meet the Lions banquet" Monday night by announcing his resignation.

"When you get to the situation where you can't handle your football players it's time to get out and that's what I'm doing tonight," said Parker, one of the most successful coaches in pro ranks.

The effect couldn't have been greater than if an atomic bomb had been dropped. For a moment there was a dead silence then a milling, buzzing crowd.

Anderson hurriedly conferred with General Manager W. Nicholas Kerby and then went to the speaker's stand.

Will Not Reconsider

"I'm sure Buddy is just emotionally upset over two things that happened today," Anderson said. "With a good night's sleep to think it over and realize what he's said in public, he'll reconsider," he said as fans yelled "don't be a quitter, Buddy!"

But Parker says he has no intention of reconsidering.

"Detroit is just dead," the Texan drawled later. "I've been in pro football as a player and a coach since 1935 and I know what I can do with a team. So far in practice this year I haven't been able to do anything with them."

Parker said.

"He refused to single out any players and said he knew 'nothing' of the 'two things' that Anderson talked about."

"I'm not through with football—I'm just through in Detroit. There won't be any meeting with me (Anderson said he would call a meeting today; as far as I'm concerned)," Parker said.

Leaves Good Record

"George Wilson probably will take over as coach," Parker said without hesitation when asked who would get the job. Wilson had been with Detroit as ends and offensive backfield coach since 1949. He played with the tough Chicago Bears of the early 1940s and went to Northwestern.

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Mantle, Williams in Tight Duel for AL's Batting Title

Ted Williams' personal duel with Mickey Mantle and a five-man battle for the National League batting championship take over the spotlight today when the major league pennant races resume.

The races themselves were shoved somewhat into the background with both the New York Yankees and Milwaukee Braves riding the crest of 5½-game leads over their closest pursuers. Both have reached a point where the team they have most to fear is themselves.

The various contenders for the batting titles, however, seem to have just begun tonight.

The American League struggle is the more spectacular because Williams, the Boston Red Sox' 39-year-old perfectionist, and Mantle, the Yankees' 25-year-old nature boy, seem destined to fight it out in the rarified atmosphere of 400. When they face each other in Boston tonight, Williams will start with an eight-point edge—387 to 379—and it could be that the eventual winner will have to hit 400.

Williams has been hitting at an amazing .500 clip since the July 11 All-Star Game and there are no signs that he will taper off sharply in the remaining 44 games of the season. He is gunning for his fifth batting title with an average that he has topped only once in a full season—in 1941 when he hit .409.

Mantle, meanwhile, has been staging a spectacular drive of his own with a .565 average for his last 14 games. He is gunning for the unprecedented feat of winning two triple crowns in succession and with 123 walks is a good bet to wipe out Babe Ruth's season mark of 170.

Defending champion Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves is the current National League leader at .338 with 36-year-old Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals next at .332, shortstop Dick Groat of the Pittsburgh Pirates third at .330 and Willie Mays of the New York Giants and Frank Robinson of the Cincinnati Reds tied for fourth at .329.

Groat, Mays and Robinson have been the "hot" hitters of the league for the last three weeks (ranging from Groat's .365 to Robinson's .420 over that span) and Groat and Mays have the advantage of not having to worry about a pennant race, Aaron and Robinson will be facing each other in Cincinnati tonight. Musial plays an afternoon game in Chicago. Groat and the Pirates are at Philadelphia and Mays and the Giants entertain the Brooklyn Dodgers at the Polo Grounds.

The league's leading Milwaukee Braves, the St. Louis Cardinals, the Philadelphia Phillies and the New York Giants show increases in the National League but only the Kansas City Athletics and Boston Red Sox are hitting more homers than last year in the AL.

The Braves and Cincinnati Reds legs top the majors with 136 home runs each. That figure represents an increase of eight homers for the Braves compared to their first 110 games in 1956 while it means a loss of 22 for the Reds, who hit 158 in their first 110 games last year.

The most amazing increase in the majors has been accomplished by the Athletics, who have increased their home run production by 55 per cent. In 108 games last season the Athletics hit only 79 homers—45 fewer than they hit in their first 108 games this year!

The world champion New York Yankees—long synonymous with the home run—have dropped off a surprising 24.2 per cent in home production. They had hit 119 in 110 games last year but show only 113 this year for the same number of games. At that, the Athletics are the only team which has hit more.

Zulueta Scores Comeback Win

NEW YORK (UP)—Orlando Zulueta, heartened by his first comeback victory, said today, "Now I'm ready to fight seriously for another shot at the lightweight title."

Cuban Orlando and manager Hymie Wailman were satisfied with the speed and ease of movement he displayed while winning a unanimous decision over unranked Frankie Ippolito of New York in their television 10-rounder at St. Nicholas Arena Monday night.

It was third-ranked Zulueta's first start since champion Joey Brown stopped him in the 15th round of their title fight at Denver, June 19. He weighed 137 pounds Monday night to Ippolito's 140.

Orlando's next opponent will be Mexican Al Nevarez at Juarez, Mexico, probably Sept. 17. After that he will fight at the Denver Coliseum, Oct. 1, against an opponent to be selected soon.
