

Bob Keegan Welcomed Into Pitchers' Top Fraternity

There was a short pause in the pennant races today to welcome Bob Keegan into the no-hit, no-run fraternity and to let the Yankees ponder why they ever allowed him to get away to the White Sox.

Keegan, a 36-year-old right-hander, was cut loose by the Yankees five years ago, written off as a chronic sore-arm case who would never make his mark in the majors. But he did it Tuesday night when he pitched the first no-hitter since then was Don Larsen's perfect game against the Dodgers in the World Series last Oct. 8.

The victory was Keegan's eighth of the season and it was made possible by a five-run third inning, during which Larry Doby hit a two-run homer, Ed Fitzgerald's eighth inning homer for the Sena-

tors broke up a 4-4 tie in the opener.

Ralph Terry, another pitcher the Yankees let get away, came back to haunt them Tuesday night when he beat them, 1-0, for Kansas City. The A's collected only two hits off Bob Turley but those hits resulted in the only run of the game when Woody Held doubled in the fifth inning and scored on Tim Thompson's single.

The loss was Turley's first against the Athletics, whom he had defeated 11 times previously during his career. It was also Kansas City's second victory over the Yanks this season in 15 meetings.

Cleveland beat Boston, 5-4, and Detroit licked Baltimore, 5-1, in the other American League games.

Braves Beat Pirates
In the National League, first-place Milwaukee rallied for two runs in the ninth to defeat Pittsburgh, 3-1; the Cardinals took two games from the Giants, 4-3 and 3-2; Brooklyn swept a pair from Cincinnati, winning the opener, 11-5, and the 12-inning nightcap, 6-5, while the Cubs beat the Phillies, 5-2, in the nightcap after dropping the first game, 2-1, in 10 innings.

Early Wynn preserved Cleveland's victory when he halted a three-run rally in the ninth inning by the Red Sox. Gene Woodling's eighth inning homer proved to be the deciding run. Ted Williams went hitless in two official trips to the plate, his batting average dropping to .389.

Jim Manning of the Tigers struck out 10 batters and limited the Orioles to seven hits in notching his 15th victory. Ray Boone gave Banning all the margin he needed with a two-run homer in the first inning and the Tigers added three more runs in the third off loser Skinny Brown.

Spahn Wins 15th
Southpaw Warren Spahn of the Braves held the Pirates to seven hits in gaining his 15th triumph. With the score tied 1-1, the Braves pushed over a pair of runs in the ninth on Red Schoendienst's single, Eddie Mathews' triple and another single by Hank Aaron.

Stan Musial slammed out five hits, including a homer in each game, to help the Cards to their two victories over the Giants. Sam Jones scattered 10 hits in the opener while 18-year-old Van McDaniel gave up eight hits in the nightcap, including a homer by Daryl Spencer. Ken Boyer and Eddie Kasko homered for St. Louis in the opener.

Duke Snider's 33rd homer of the season and second of the night in the 12th inning decided the nightcap for Brooklyn after the Dodgers had capitalized on a fine relief job by Ed Roebuck to top the Redlegs in the first game.

Win Streak Ends
Roebuck hurled three-hit relief ball for 5-2-3 innings and slammed his first major league homer to gain his fifth victory in the first game. Reliever Don Drysdale was the winner in the finale.

Stan Lopata's 10th inning homer snipped the Cubs' six-game winning streak as Curt Simmons and Dick Farrell of the Phils combined to pitch a three-hitter in the first game. Robin Roberts suffered his 17th setback in the nightcap when he was tagged for back-to-back homers by Ernie Banks and Jerry Kindall in a three-run fourth inning. Reliever Don Elston was the winning pitcher.

Billy Talbert Riding High In Competition

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. (UP)—U.S. Davis Cup Captain Billy Talbert might be tempted to play himself in the challenge round if he continues his current success in the third round today of the 77th annual national doubles championship.

And well he might if he maintains the same prowess and stamina he displayed Tuesday with Gil Shea in sweeping a couple of his Davis Cup charges out of the second round at the Longwood Cricket Club.

Talbert and Shea, the 28-year-old Californian who is ninth-ranked nationally, staged a terrific show of doubles tennis as they ousted Sam Giammalva and Barry Mack Kay, seventh-seeded, 9-7, 7-5, 4-6, 4-6, 9-7.

Today they play Straight Clark of Philadelphia and David Harum of Miami, Fla., in a featured match while the seven surviving seeded teams were facing more so-so competition.

Everything looked serene in the women's division but Aitha Gibson and Darlene Hand seem safe from the type of upset that rocked the ladies' side Tuesday.

After the Wimbledon champs won their first match here, the calmness was shattered when Mrs. Midge Buck, 48, of Manchester, Mass., and Mrs. Kay McKean, 43, of Hamilton, Mass., toppled third-seeded Shirley Bloomer and Sheila Armstrong of England, 6-4, 7-5.

'Slow Motion' Windup Helps In Year's First No-Hitter

CHICAGO (UP)—Bob Keegan of the Chicago White Sox said today that a new "slow motion" windup helped him hurl the season's first no-hitter.

The 36-year-old right-hander, once considered washed up because of arm trouble, tried out his new delivery Tuesday night for

the first time as he blanked the Washington Senators, 6-0, walking two batters and striking out only one.

In demonstrating his new windup, Keegan said it is similar to a golfer taking a slower backswing.

"In other words, instead of pulling my arm back in a hurry in the preliminary motion, I do it slowly," he said. Keegan said this gives him more control and helps to keep him from tiring.

Keegan said he was "confident" that his new style was working by the fourth inning.

"I could tell then that the Senators didn't have any hits in them," he said.

Keegan said that when he faced Pete Runnels, lead-off batter in the eighth, he was "sure" of a no-hitter.

"My new windup took the batters by surprise. I'm sure the Senators weren't prepared for it," he said.

Keegan said he served up mostly fast balls "as always" and gave a lot of credit to catcher Sherm Lofar for calling the shots.

Gals' Amateur Golf Meet Turns To Stamina Test

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UP)—The U.S. Women's Amateur golf championship turned into a test of stamina today as a field of 32 went out to play a double round in humid 90-plus weather.

The twin 18-hole matches, which will pare the field to eight, and the heat, seemed to favor the youngsters left in the field—such as 16-year-old Judy Elier, the National Junior champion; Judy Anderson of Sacramento, a pert 18-year-old; Anne Quast of Seattle, Wash., 19, and her teammate, Anne Gunderson, 18, and pretty blonde Anne Richardson of Columbus, Ohio, all of 21.

But the weight of years doesn't hang heavy on defending champion Marlene Stewart Streit of Fonthill, Ont., who is only 22, or on the 1954 champion, Barbara Romack Porter, 24, or on Pat Lesser of Seattle, another ex-champion, who is the same age.

All can go 36 holes without losing their touch—although they haven't had to play even 18 holes thus far since they've been winning, for the most part, as early as the 12th or 13th green.

Class as well as youth told Tuesday in second round matches at Del Paso Country Club as the big names in the 57th annual tournament came through almost without exception by overwhelming margins.

Mrs. Streit, still worried about her putting but otherwise playing a flawless game, scored an 8 and 7 victory over Jan Tarble of Los Angeles. The champion stood five over par for two matches—not up to the standards of Miss Quast, three under, or Miss Gunderson, three under, or Miss Richardson, also square with old man par.
