## Hard-Driving Bruins Post 12-7 Victory Over Huskies

SWEET HOME — Bend's razzle-dazzle kids, combining fine defensive work with a line-busting offense, slammed out a 12-7 victory over the Sweet Home Huskies, Friday evening, to make their first District 8-A-1 tilt of the season a winning one.

Last week, the Bruins of Coach Tom Winbigler racked Madras, 33-6. The Sweet Home win gives the locals a 2-0 record to date. Friday, the Deschutes county aggregation plays host to a top-ranked Albany eleven under lights of Bruin Field.

The win avenges for the Bears their 1956 defeat by the Huskies. Final score in that one was 14-13. It is also the first league victory for Bend since 1955. Although the mid-Oregonians came through with a pair of ties, they failed to win one conference game in 1956.

### Slow Start

Bend failed to click in the early phase of the contest and the game was scoreless at the close of the first quarter. Winbigler's squad made its initial first down of the contest late in the first period but couldn't mount a drive.

Well into the second quarter, Bend, for the first time of the evening, crossed the mid-stripe and landed in Sweet Home territory. The push failed and it wasn't until the ball had changed hands again and the close of the first half was near that the eventual winners managed to score.

### First Tally

The ice-breaking tally came when left halfback Tom Wade, taking a punt, drove from his own 45 to score. Joanis' extra point try failed and Bend led, 6-0 at the half.

Half-time statistics showed the Deschutes county team well on top. Bend led in first downs, 5 to 0, and had completed one of two passes attempted while Sweet Home had one of four. The Bears had also been penalized 20 yards while there were no yards of penalty against the hosts.

In the third stanza, the other Bruin touchdown was made when half-charging Jeff Ward, right half, climaxed a downfield push by driving over off right tackle to score from two yards out.

Again the kick attempt by Joanis was no good and it was Bend 12, Sweet Home 0.

The third period ended before either aggregation could mount a sizeable drive.

Starting the final period on their own 19, the Huskies, employing a combination of deep pitchouts and passes, worked the ball to the

Bend 29, but an unnecessary roughness charge moved it back to the Bend 43, and the home squad was forced to give up possession.

### Pass Intercepted

Bend took over and, in a few plays, had it on the SH 44. A pass from quarterback Gary Gettmann, intended for end Sid Bauer, was pulled out of the air by Bob Banke, right half, who raced downfield. He was stopped on the Bend two by back Guy Paxton.

Banke, the next try, was stopped at the line of scrimmage. Doug Seiber, quarterback who ram-rodded the attack for his 11, picked up one, then kept the ball on an option play and scooted around end to score.

For the extra point, Seiber passed to Ken Kyriass, fullback. The score was Bend 12, Sweet Home 7, and many Central Oregon fans were remembering 1956 when the Huskies broke a 13-0 halftime deficit to win the contest, 14-13.

Approximately 3½ minutes remained in the tilt after Sweet Home's score was made. The Bruins, after receiving the kick, moved upfield. With the ball on his own 45, Tom Wade took a reverse and raced to the foes' 12, but an illegal use of the hands charge on the invaders brought it back to the Bend 44.

### Trying Hard

Bend, trying hard for an insurance TD, was charged with several penalties in a brief period, including backfield in motion and another illegal use of hands count.

After the drive sputtered out, Joanis kicked, and it went out of bounds on the SH 29-yard-line.

The second play, a pass was intercepted by Jeff Ward who went to the 15. Mel Kroker earned two and Wade gained two. A penalty, however, moved it back to the 25. Kroker twisted to the 22 and it was third and 19 yards to go.

Gettmann made a quick handoff to Wade who gained to the Sweet Home 17. At this point, the final gun sounded and the Bears had their 12-7 win.

Coach Winbigler, reviewing the contest this morning, said that his defensive unit played outstanding ball "from the first gun on through."

## Bruins Clip Air Force, 47-0, Friday

LOS ANGELES (UP) — UCLA Coach Henry (Red) Sanders today was "pleased" but not impressed about the performance of his Bruins in clipping the wings of the Air Force Academy, 47-0, before more than 33,000 fans at Memorial Coliseum.

The Air Force Academy bit off more than it could chew last night in filling in as a replacement for the University of Florida which was forced to bow out two weeks ago because of a flu epidemic. The fly-boys from Denver had jumped at the chance to replace Florida and take on their first major opponent.

However, the academy proved it wasn't ready for the collegiate big time. It took the Bruins only six minutes of the first quarter to find the scoring range. Kirk Wilson's 11 yard pass to quarterback Steve Getzmann got the Bruins into the scoring column and from then on out UCLA had its run of the field—almost scoring at will.

Sanders gave every one on the bench a chance to play. He pulled the first string after the first half, 25-0 for UCLA, and turned the under-studies loose in the second half.

## Cowboys Topple Lebanon, 32-6, in District 8-A-1 Tilt

LEBANON — Prineville's comeback Cowboys swamped a willing but outclassed Lebanon eleven, Friday evening, 32-6, to give the "Pokes a 1-1 District 8-A-1 record.

Last week, the Crook County High School team fell to South Salem, 20-6, in the season-starting encounter.

Bustin' Bill Parrish, Cowboy quarterback, personally scored two of the touchdowns, threw a pass for the third, and passed for an extra point.

Prineville, struck in recent days by the flu, was expected to be weak for the contest with the Warriors, but such wasn't the case. The Cowboys continue conference competition next Friday, hosting Corvallis.

Attacks Mixed  
Coach Dwayne Lambert's crew mixed ground and air attacks in posting the lopsided victory. Lebanon relied mainly on running plays.

Prineville kicked off to start the contest, Lebanon, in trouble, attempted a punt which was blocked and covered by CCHS on the Lebanon 8-yard-line.

Parrish, a few plays later, kept the ball on a quarterback sneak and went over from two yards out. Gary Owens, left half, ran the conversion, to give the "Pokes a 7-0 first-quarter lead.

Starting the big second period, Parrish repeated the sneak, making it from one yard out. The run attempt by Owens was nullified by a penalty.

Pass Connects  
Not long after, Parrish threw a 19-yard pass to Wayne Kee which was good for a TD. Owens again tried the run and didn't make it.

Then, Mike Boyer, employing a wedge, crashed through to score from one yard out. The extra point try, a pass from Parrish to Larry Works, end, was good. Half-time score was 26-0.

Possession shuttled back and forth in the third stanza and although Lebanon got to Prineville's nine once, neither squad managed to score.

Early in the fourth period, Ray Gillette, halfback, dashed seven yards to score. Bob Wainwright tried the extra point conversion with a run, but it failed.

The lone Warrior tally, later that period, was made when Gary Brown, halfback, ran 14 yards to paydirt. The extra-point attempt was no good, and it was 32-6.

## Oregon State Opens Campaign Against SC

PORTLAND (UP) — Oregon State opens defense of its Pacific Coast Conference football title here tonight against Southern California and its new "go go" attack in the West's top college football game of the weekend.

Game time is 8 p.m.

Southern California, under new Coach Don Clark, faces a tough hurdle in Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers who are one-touchdown favorites.

Oregon State will field an all-veteran club which, although outweighed by nearly 15 pounds per man, is determined to win from the only PCC club to defeat the Beavers last season. But if the Trojan offense clicks the Beavers might have trouble with the speed-up style of play introduced by Clark.

Prothro will stick to the single wing attack which carried Oregon State to the Rose Bowl last season. And in veteran halfback Joe Francis and speedster Earnel Durden he has two of the finest backs on the Coast.

Despite losses by graduation and ineligibility the Trojans are rated one of the top teams in the PCC this fall and the game has drawn widespread interest.

Oregon State officials said it was possible the crowd might pass 35,000. The all-time record for Multnomah stadium is 35,266 set in 1930 at a game between Oregon and Washington.
