Yankees May Spring Trap On Chicago White Sox Today

The mighty New York Yankees may spring the trap on the Chicago White Sox by sundown today but it appears it'll be a case of slow strangulation before the Milwaukee Braves choke off the St. Louis Cardinals' last hopes.

The stage was set for the final act of the American League pennant race Friday night when the Yankees downed the Boston Red Sox, 7-4, and went seven games in front as a result of the Cleveland Indians' 3-2 triumph over the White Sox. That reduced the Yankees' magic number to two—and it will come up today if the Yankees beat the Red Sox again and the White Sox lose one game of their double-header with the Indians.

The Braves set the Cardinals up for the kill with a 9-3 romp over the Chicago Cubs in an afternoon game but the Redbirds refused to become dead birds by rallying to beat the Cincinnati Redlegs, 7-5, in a 10-inning night game decided by Joe Cunningham's two-run homer. That left the Braves' lead at four games and their magic number at five—with eight games left for each team.

Williams Pinch-Homers

Casey Stengel drew closer to his eighth pennant in nine years when the Yankees built up an early 7-0 lead and then staved off a four-run ninth-inning rally marked by a tremendous pinch-hit homer by Ted Williams. The Red Sox added three runs and kayoed Whitey Ford before Bob Grim came out of the bullpen to restore order.

Ford pitched two-hit ball and struck out eight through the first eight innings. Yogi Berra hammered a three-run homer for the big blow in the Yankees' nine-hit attack which brought Ford his 11th victory compared to four defeats.

The White Sox' loss was a heart-breaker. Dick Donovan carried a 2-1 lead into the ninth as a result of his own homer and one by batterymate Earl Battey only to have the Indians rally for two runs.

The Braves unleashed a 14-hit attack that enabled Warren Spahn to become the majors' first 20-game winner of the year although he needed relief aid from Don McMahon, the fireballing rookie relief specialist.

Cards Need Rally

Cunningham, a deadly pinch-hitter all season, entered the St. Louis lineup as an unsuccessful pinch-swinger in the eighth and remained in the game to deliver the homer that kept the Cards alive. The blow, which followed a walk to Wally Moon, came after the Cardinals rallied from an early 4-1 deficit to tie the score with single runs in the seventh and ninth innings. Stan Musial singled home the seventh-inning run and 42-year-old Walker Cooper singled home the tying tally in the ninth.

LONDON (UPI)—American film director Burt Balaban narrowly escaped falling to his death from a 33,000-foot peak in the Swiss Alps Friday, a spokesman for his company reported today.

Balaban, son of Paramount Pictures President Barney Balaban, was in Switzerland shooting a picture called "High Hell."

The spokesman said Balaban slipped from the face of a glacier while experimenting with a camera angle. A guide grabbed a rope around his waist and held him dangling until further help came, according to the report.

Two crew members and one of the film's stars, Actor John Derek, helped pull Balaban to safety.

Many a fisherman, sitting hot and uneatable, north broiling sun, in a boat or perched on a rock near the water has dreamed of scooping out dozens of succulent trout with no fuss and no muss.

For the approximately 50 persons traveling to Mud Lake in the Cascades on Thursday, this dream came true.

They took out as many Eastern brook trout as they wanted. Gunny-sacks and dishpans were, in some cases, filled by the eager fish lovers who took hundreds and hundreds of fish from the pretty, tree-fringed lake.

This wasn't a holiday from state fish and game regulations. Rather,

Pacific Coast Football Play Underway Today

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Another football season opened along the Pacific Coast today with California meeting Southern Methodist in an intercollegiate game that was expected to draw 40,000 fans at Berkeley.

The Bears were tabbed as seven-point favorites over the Mustangs in a contest which marked the debut of two coaches — Pete Elliott of California and Bill Meek of SMU.

Darrell Roberts, who had been expected to start at left half for the Bears, was listed as doubtful because of the flu. Oran Franklin stood by to replace him.

Oregon State, generally favored to win its second straight Pacific Coast Conference title, was scheduled to meet Southern California at Portland tonight with 32,000 looking on. The Beavers also held a 7-point edge.

Washington was an eight-point favorite over Colorado for their opener before about 33,000 at the Huskies' stadium.

Oregon also was the choice to knock off Idaho as the Ducks, reported to be loaded, meet the Vandals before approximately 12,000 in Moscow.

Stanford and San Jose State tangled before about 20,000 in the Indians' stadium for their backyard scuffle which opened the season for both teams. The Indians were at least two-touchdown choices.

Another intercollegiate was on tap with Washington State invading Lincoln, Neb., to play the Nebraska Cornhuskers in a game rated a tossup.

It was a seldom given opportunity, brought about by the decision of the Oregon state game commission to remove present denizens.

Thursday morning game commission crews, totaling some 20 persons, used rotenone on the lake, with great success. The chemical, officials have explained, does no damage to the flesh.

Rather, it affects the nervous system of the fish and, in effect, strangles them.

It is a commission policy to allow all interested to pick up whatever fish they wish when the work is completed. This was the case on Tuesday at South Twin Lake and Thursday at Mud Lake.

Commission crews were under direction of R. L. Korovicka, coordinating fishery biologist, Portland, and M. L. Montgomery, district fishery agent, Bend.

Part of the lake was sprayed with rotenone from an airplane piloted by Sam Whitney of Newberg. When he finished his work, crews in boats finished up the job.

This reporter was one of those who made the trip, to look around and pick up some fish which were there in plenty although a little difficult to get.

Varied were the advance predictions on what would be found. Carp and trout, both of magnificent size, were predicted, with some roach and catfish expected.

I talked to many people and looked over hundreds and hundreds of fish. They were all trout and carp. The carp were gigantic, running, in some instances, almost to three feet in length. All were fat and healthy.

The trout, contrary to expectations, were small. Most of those brought in were in the 7-10 inch class. I saw just two 14-inchers, with everything else smaller.

Carp, giving up hard, kept going long after it seemed they should be dead. The big fish would come to the surface, then, pushed by the wind, float to shore.

They would appear to be dead, but a push or shove would send them wiggling frantically out into deeper water.

Trout, when affected by the chemical, went to the bottom while carp came to the top. Trout fanciers brought in their "catch" by walking along the bank. A strip of white on the bottom signified a belly-up fish.

Bill Bebout, a member of my party, made a diving expedition of it, walking into deeper and deeper water and finally reaching way down to pick up his quarry. He then threw the fish ashore so I can truly say that I "caught" lots of fish on Thursday.

What happened to the big trout? Best game commission guess is that they went down in the deep water, too far out to pick up by normal means.
