Kansas Area Bracing for Flash Floods

Flash floods were expected in eastern Kansas early today as showers continued to nourish a 3-inch rain which fell in the past 24 hours.

Numerous thunderstorms cracked over Northern Missouri, Eastern Kansas, and as far south as Central Oklahoma Friday night in some places depositing one-and-a-half inches during a 6-hour period.

More severe thunderstorms pelted the Oklahoma-Texas border with hailstones as large as three-quarters of an inch. Winds whipped along at 54 miles per hour at Fort Hill, Oklahoma.

The chain of thunderstorm activity down the nation's midsection marked two distinct types of weather. Fair skies prevailed over most of the nation west of the thunderstorm area, while clouds shrouded most of the area eastward.

Widely scattered showers continued to wet down the region west of the Mississippi river during the night. Warm air generally prevailed in that area. Although the mercury was climbing slowly in most of the country, it continued low over the Great Lakes Region. Snow flurries mingled with showers at high points in the North and Central Rockies.

The two-tone forecast holds again for today. Most of the western half of the nation will enjoy sunny skies, except for occasional showers in the Rockies.

Finland Mourns Sibelius Death

HELSINKI (UP)—Finland mourned today the death of composer Jean Sibelius whose stirring music helped inspire the nation in its struggle for freedom from Russia more than 60 years ago.

Sibelius, who would have been 92 on Dec. 8, died of a brain hemorrhage at his country home Friday night after a long illness. He was buried in the Sibelius cemetery in Helsinki.

Flags fluttered at half staff today throughout Finland and a state funeral was planned for the man who was revered as the country's leading citizen as well as one of the great composers of all time. Telegrams of condolence poured in from throughout the world.

One Time Sea Captain Burns To Death in Cabin Blaze

FORT ROCK — The life of George Clemens, 76, one time sea captain who took up a desert homestead and left behind all reminders of the sea, ended when fire destroyed his cabin 40 miles east of here. His charred body was found in the ruins this week.

Soon after retiring from the sea in 1927 he moved onto a homestead in the Christmas Lake valley which he acquired about 1932. Through most of the 30's he raised chickens and sold eggs. During recent years his health had failed but he continued to live alone in his small cabin.

Hank McCall, who tends the string of ZX Company stock water wells, made periodic calls at the Clemens homestead and occasionally took him to Silver Lake for supplies. McCall discovered the burned cabin and an investigation by Lake County Sheriff Tom Elliott and Deputy Sheriff Lynn

Jones revealed the charred body. It was thought the fire might have occurred Sunday night.

Born in Germany November 11, 1880, Clemens went to sea in 1894 and served aboard sailing vessels. Only this summer he recalled for visitors delivering a load of wood how he sailed the south seas in a schooner he owned in partnership with another. A violent storm hit suddenly and the crew went aloft to take in sail. Before they succeeded the jib boom to which they were clinging was carried away. Clemens and a companion clung to a spar all the through the night. When daylight came they found they had drifted near an island. Standing on the beach, spears in hand, were four black natives. Clemens remarked to his companion, "Here's where we end up in a stew pot." Soon the natives came for them in a canoe and hauled them in but proved to be Christians. The two were marooned on the small island, one of the New Hebrides chain for 18 months before a passing ship picked them up.

Those acquainted with this World War — German submarine crewman knew him as an avid reader and well informed.

Funeral services were held Friday. There are no known survivors.

Yes Sir, Town Has Changed

A visitor to Bend today agreed that the town has changed considerably since he first came here.

He is Harry Manion of St. Marys, Ohio, and he arrived here in "railroad year", 1911. That was the year the first trains pulled in from the north, over the Deschutes gorge route.

While in Bend in early years, Manion was with the A. L. French clothing store. He left in 1920, and has not been back since.

Today, Manion was "seeing the town" with a well-qualified guide and old-time friend, Lloyd Magill. "Has the town changed?" Manion was asked this question.

His answer was that he recognized nothing but the streets. The buildings, he said, were all unfamiliar.

Even the Pilot Butte Inn has added a wing since he left here 37 years ago, Manion noted.

'Battle Lines' Of East-West Conflict Eyed

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UP)

—Delegates to the General Assembly took advantage of a week-end lull today to survey the "battle lines" of East-West conflict drawn during the first week of the assembly's 12th session.

No formal U. N. activity was scheduled today except a closed meeting of the advisory committee on the emergency force that is patrolling the troubled borders of the Middle East. A report on the current status of UNEF is expected early next week.

Monday morning's assembly session will be devoted to policy speeches by Peru, Canada, Colombia and New Zealand—all nations friendly to the West.

East and West will not come to grips again until Monday afternoon, when the General Assembly decides whether to include two controversial items—Hungary and Red China's right to a U.N. seat—in its agenda.

The world body is expected to approve discussion of Hungary and to ban consideration this year of the perennial issue of China.

This week, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles on Thursday and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko on Friday laid down the lines of conflict which are expected to dominate much of the assembly's coming debate.

Each blamed the other for the current troubles of the Middle East, and each urged the assembly to adopt the proposals for disarmament advanced by his side in the deeply-divided world.

Irish Foreign Minister Frank Aiken injected an unexpected note into the debate Friday by proposing that all of the Big Four powers "draw back" from the diplomatic competition there and elsewhere which might touch off World War III.

Spokesmen for the United Nations' 82 member nations were busy studying the U.S. and Russian texts today and conferring among themselves behind the scenes, trying to estimate the prospects for progress on major issues confronting the assembly.

Missile Plans In Development Stage by U. S.

WASHINGTON (UP)—A Defense Department spokesman said today work on a guided missile designed to knock down 15,000-mile-an-hour intercontinental ballistic missiles has progressed from the research to the development stage.

The spokesman said that means anti-missile "hardware" is now becoming available in "test quantities."

The disclosure followed the Air Force announcement Friday that radar has now been developed with "eyes" which can penetrate for 3,000 miles to detect an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM).

The Pentagon appears to have decided to relax slightly its tight secrecy on missile and missile-defense developments to counteract the flood of claims from Moscow about Soviet progress in the field.

The Russians claim their own tests show ballistic missiles can be fired anywhere in the world with a flight time measured in minutes.

Russian claims at first implied there was no defense against an ICBM but have lately come around to the long-standing American military view that the ICBM is not "an ultimate weapon" at all.

Americans readily concede, however, that it will be several years before a defense can be mounted. The key element of the defense is the new radar which Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Thomas D. White said will be ready "for operational employment in the near future."

The radar would provide about 15 minutes warning time which military men believe would be enough to get off anti-missiles against aggressor targets. Therefore, it is hoped that the warning radar will deter attack.

PIECK REPORTED DYING

FRANKFURT, Germany (UP)—The Frankfurt newspaper Abendpost said today that East German President Wilhelm Pieck is dying at his home in suburban Berlin. The West German newspaper said the 81-year-old Communist President has been attended since Wednesday by doctors who "are certain he cannot be saved." Top East German government and party leaders have been called back from vacation because of Pieck's condition, the paper said. The report could not be confirmed officially.

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
