

Russia's Latest Moves Fail To End Deadlock

WASHINGTON (UP)—Russia's latest disarmament moves failed to break the East-West deadlock on arms controls, officials said today.

They said Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko's speech to the U.N. General Assembly adds up to a minor disarmament concession. But they said it avoids key issues that have stalled disarmament agreements for 11 years.

Officials said he did not give a "real inch."

Some official interest was shown in Gromyko's proposal Friday to drop Russia's long-standing ban on use of atomic and hydrogen weapons in warfare in favor of a limited five-year ban. This softened the Soviet-negotiated position at the recent London disarmament talks and was described in official quarters as a concession.

But the general opinion was the United States would oppose a five-year ban on use of such weapons as it has opposed an indefinite ban in the past. The United States believes the Soviets are trying to maneuver the United States into a position where it could not use nuclear weapons leaving Russia free to use its preponderant manpower with conventional weapons in any showdown struggle.

Officials noted Gromyko made another new proposal in suggesting a date of Jan. 1, 1958 to halt nuclear tests. But they said this only set a date on a previous Soviet position that had been proposed in general terms.

Moreover, they said Gromyko had not moved to meet American demands that any cessation of nuclear tests be linked with agreement to suspend production of fissionable materials for weapons—a major point in the American-allied negotiating position.

Officials said that in effect the Russians have thrown out bait to woo the Afro-Asian bloc for the Soviet disarmament position.

Dollar Volume Of Building Again Increases

PORTLAND (UP)—Dollar volume of building increased again during August in the 64 largest cities in the Pacific Northwest, according to a report by Equitable Savings and Loan association. Total building in the cities, compared with July, was up four per cent, and dwelling construction was up eight per cent.

By area, dollar comparisons between August and July show that dwelling volume in Oregon increased 15 per cent, Washington 1.5 per cent, Idaho seven per cent, and British Columbia 22 per cent.

In total construction volume, Oregon was one per cent higher in August than in July.

After Year, Girl Comes Out of Coma

NEW ORLEANS (UP)—A 20-year old girl came out of a year-long coma Friday and spoke to her mother for the first time since she was accidentally shot by her sweetheart.

Carolyn Chetta, who was wounded Sept. 10, 1956, talked to her mother who has kept up a long bedside vigil at her daughter's bedside.

"I talked to her and she answered me," the girl's mother said. "I was so thrilled I could hardly speak."

Mrs. Chetta did not reveal Carolyn's first words but she said after she heard her daughter mumble she rushed to get the supervisor at the Catholic Charity Hospital, Sister Lorenza.

"We had often prayed together that Carolyn would get well. When sister asked: 'How are you doing, Carolyn?' she said 'Okay,'" Mrs. Chetta said.

Carolyn was wounded on the eve of her wedding to her policeman fiancé. She and patrolman Joe Bergeron had gone to inspect an apartment they planned to occupy after the marriage.

Bergeron told officers he had been practicing drawing his unloaded, police pistol for Carolyn. He loaded the gun later and while playing with it the weapon went off, striking his fiancé in the head.

For months Bergeron took turns with the Chetta family at Carolyn's bedside before he became sick from the strain and worry over the shooting. An attempted murder charge against him was dismissed and he resigned from the force.

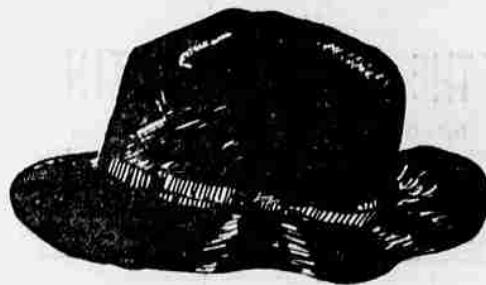
