

Wheat farmers vote Thursday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wheat farmers in 39 states will vote Thursday in a national referendum to determine whether their 1950 crop will be grown under the rigid government marketing controls that have been in effect for several years.

Under the existing program, wheat surpluses have grown until there is enough wheat on hand to meet all domestic and foreign requirements for more than two years.

Few persons like the existing program, but it probably will get the necessary two-thirds majority because growers regard it as better than nothing.

The program provides for planting allotments totaling 55 million acres, marketing quotas based on the allotments, and price supports at the present minimum level of 75 per cent of parity or not less than \$1.77 per bushel.

The program has received much criticism — from President Eisenhower, Congress, the Agriculture Department, and growers — mainly because it has failed to prevent overproduction.

If the existing controls are approved, producers will get a price support guarantee of not less than \$1.77 per bushel. If controls are not approved, growers will get price supports of 50 per cent of parity, or about \$1.18 per bushel. The American Farm Bureau Federation said "it is a foregone conclusion that farmers will vote for \$1.77 instead of \$1.18."

Accident kills Portland man

PORTLAND (UPI) — Leo W. Facey, 76, Portland, was killed and his wife was injured Tuesday evening when they were struck by a car while crossing a southwest Portland intersection, (Jefferson at 13th).

Facey was pronounced dead on arrival at Good Samaritan Hospital. Mrs. Nellie Facey, 63, suffered a broken leg. Hospital attendants reported her condition as "satisfactory."

Portland police said the driver of the car, Harriet P. Lehman, 47, of Portland told them she was driving into the sun and did not see the couple.

"SECESSION" BILL ADOPTED

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — The Alabama senate Tuesday adopted a bill which would permit schools to "secede" from the state public school system if faced with integration. The measure provides that any school threatened with a racial crisis may withdraw from the school system and set up its own system to be financed with local funds.

Charges denied by committee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Democratic National Committee has denied that it deleted praise for party congressional leaders from a statement made by California Gov. Edmund G. Brown when he accepted a seat on the Democratic Advisory Council last week.

A committee spokesman said Tuesday that the "full text" of Brown's statement was included in a news release circulated by the committee for July 16 newspapers.

Brown has been reported piqued, claiming that Committee Chairman Paul Butler omitted portions of his statement in praise of Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson and Speaker Sam Rayburn.

Butler has been feuding with congressional leaders over their approach to legislation. He has accused them of not pushing hard enough for bills to carry out pledges of the Democratic platform and of giving in too easily to veto threats from President Eisenhower.

Negro students begin sign-up at Central High

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — Pre-registration of white and Negro students at Little Rock's four high schools entered its second day today with five Negro students already registered at Central High School.

Central High was the site of the 101st Airborne Division's 1957 "invasion" which allowed nine Negro students to attend classes. Four of the original nine have registered this week with a fifth Negro girl.

Junior students line up today to apply for admission to the four schools. The final decision on who goes to school where under the Arkansas student placement law will come later.

A girl crippled by tuberculosis of the spine at birth was the only Negro student to register in person. She gave her name to reporters as Gloria Gant.

The parents of Elizabeth Eckford, Thelma Mothershead, Melba Pattilo and Jefferson Thomas registered for them. All four students were veterans of the 1957 school opening which put pictures of riots and bayonets on front pages of the nation's newspapers.

The milling throngs of September, 1957, did not show up Tuesday, and the only incident marking the serenity of the scene was a small clash between newsmen and police.

The newsmen were ordered off the campus of Hall High School shortly after registration began. A few minutes later, reporters were ejected from the Central High campus.

Vandals damage phone booths

Vandals damaged two telephone booths in front of the Telephone Office on Bond Street sometime Tuesday, according to Bend Police.

They tore the transmitters and receivers from the phones and took one transmitter. They also tore the stripping which holds the window glass.

Missile put through paces

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — An Army Redstone missile went through its paces Tuesday night at the missile range here.

The veteran 250-mile range Redstone, a pioneer in the U.S. missile program, rose from its pad with a roar and was visible nearly three minutes as it ascended into the clear night sky.

The launching was the first Redstone fired here since last November when the missile was graduated from experimental status to become "fully operational." The reliable missile has been in the hands of troops in this country and Europe for more than a year.

Informed sources said the latest shoot was part of an evaluation program for a new production batch of Redstones.

Log accident takes man's life

CANNON BEACH (UPI) — A Cannon Beach logger, 62-year-old John C. Patrick, was killed Tuesday when a chain snapped and a log fell on him during a truck-loading operation east of Arch Cape.

He was employed by Van Vleet Logging Company here.

Three companions escaped injury. They were Oscar Campbell and Don Carpenter, both of Seaside, and Stanley McVey of Cannon Beach.

DOZING TROOPER ROBBED
CHARLOTTE, N. C. (UPI) — State police reported with some embarrassment Tuesday the theft of \$12 in coins from a vending machine in the barracks of the state highway patrol. The only patrolman in the barracks slept peacefully through the robbery, sometime Monday night.

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
