TV channel sale authorized

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Communications Commission Thursday authorized George Haggarty of Detroit to sell Portland, Ore., Channel 12 TV station KPTV to the NAFI Corp. of Oakland, Calif. for \$3,761,864.

The NAFI Corp. was formerly known as National Automotives Fibers, Inc.

The purchasing company has named crooner Bing Crosby as chairman of the new TV station and Kenyon Brown, part owner of the Detroit Tigers Baseball Club, as president of the Portland TV outlet.

Crosby and Brown are stockholders in NAFI. They also have broadcast interests in California, Missouri and Oklahoma.

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Business program planned by Central Oregon College

The vocational-technical school of Central Oregon College announces a new program of studies in the field of business. The full two-year curriculum leads to the associate in applied science degree in business management.

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TO FINANCE TOURIST PLAN
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States plans to finance a tourism promotion project which Israel has promoted for two years, it was revealed today. Albert E. Farwell, chief of the Near East division of the International Cooperation Administration, told the House Appropriations Committee that \$30,000 from a technical aid fund of \$1,600,000 was earmarked for the Tourist Corp. of Israel to help develop the Israeli tourist industry.



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
