FINANCIAL STOCKS

Stocks extend Tuesday losses

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stocks extended Tuesday's losses on increased volume today.

Industrialists made their lowest prices around noon when DuPont was selling at a loss of nearly 7 points. That issue came back substantially and others regained small amounts.

Electronics and other stocks having a connection with defense work were harder hit than the main list. Electronics were hammered down 1 to more than 4 points and their recovery from the lows was small. Aircraft's registered losses running to more than a point.

Steel issues generally were lower although the leading issues—U.S. Steel and Bethlehem—only gave up fractions. Chemicals were lower as a group. Ford firmed but other motors registered small declines. Metals eased. Oils went back on average.

Tire shares were down more than a point on average. American Home Products lost 2 in the drugs. Owens Corning fell more than 3 in the glass group and Polaroid was down a similar amount in the cameras. Commonwealth Edison was a firm spot in the utilities.

New ambulance makes 34 runs during July

The new Bend area ambulance made 34 trips during July, according to Bend Police Chief John Truett.

Of the 34 calls, 12 were inside the city and 22 within the county. The ambulance transported 21 medical patients, 14 injured in auto accidents and five other injured persons.

Truett said the department issued 93 warnings during July.

Six were for violations of the basic rule, eight for traffic signals, seven stop sign violations, and six other driving violations. Thirty-five warnings were given on defective lights, three on expired drivers' licenses, five on expired vehicle registrations, two on other equipment, two on jay-walking and 19 on irrigation violations.

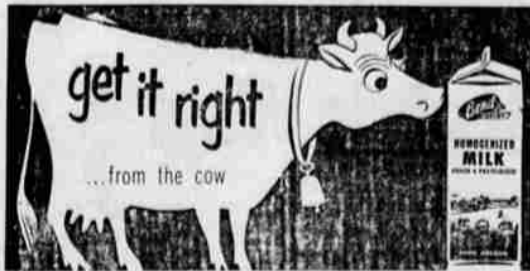
