Meet delayed by wet course

BATON ROUGE, La. (UPI)—

Santmy Snead, Arnold Palmer and about 150 more professional golfers entered in the \$20,000 Baton Rouge Open tournament headed for the practice links today, waiting for the tournament course to dry out.

PGA officials postponed the first round of the 72-hole tournament until Friday, scheduling 18 holes then and 18 on Saturday, and 36 holes Sunday.

Snead, whose 375 eight years ago still stands as the tournament record, joined the PGA winter tour for a try for a second title here, and for the \$50,000 Greater Baton Rouge Open next week.

Palmer, defending champion here and many other places along the PGA circuit, was trapped in Miami by the airline strike, and resorted to a private plane to reach Baton Rouge in time for tournament play.

More than 10 inches of rain fell on the Sherwood Forest Country Club's 6,700-yard course the past week, cancelling a pro-am warm-up tournament and qualifying rounds for rank-and-file pros.

'New' Senators worse than old

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI) — Baseball men are as notoriously optimistic in the spring as an early-rising robin and there is no more classic example available today than the new Washington Senators.

These are not the old Washington Senators. And if you think the old ones were slightly less than sensational, wait until you get a load of the new ones.

The latter compose the team which took over the threadbare Capitol title when the old ones were moved to Minneapolis-St. Paul, and take no stock in the rumor that they were run out of town.

The new ones will may be, as only time and the first week of the season will demonstrate. But you can't blame a bunch of guys for trying, particularly at this stage of the pennant race.

For this is a time when every first division manager envisions a pennant and every second division pilot talks glowingly of the first division and the prospects of "going all the way." All the way where has never been decided.

Time Of Promise

It is, as they go into spring training, a period of plush promise in which 200 hitters talk 300, guys who couldn't bash a ball out of a closet speak of increasing their home run production and any pitcher worth his salt guarantees, privately and quite often publicly, that this year he is a gold-plated cinch to win at least 20 games. The fact that come June he may be so deep in the bushes he'll need a machete to find the mound doesn't mean a thing.

One thing certain, you've got to give the "new" Senators a big fat "A" for optimistic effort. Whether they prove more or not, they are big leaguers to the corps in this respect.

Hawk-faced Mickey Vernon, who handles the managerial portfolio, admits that while he has relief pitchers by the "barrelful" the ratchers pressing matter of "finding

some starters" is his major problem. He may be reduced, eventually, to starting some of those he considers as potential firemen.

Rattling around brightly in camp are fellows like Ray Sempach, who had a 4.00 earned run average in the Pacific Coast League, a dubious start up the long road toward Cooperstown, and Dick Donovan, who previously toiled for the White Sox.

Donovan, used sparingly last season because of a bad arm, still managed to scramble to a 6-1 record. He insists that his arm is all right and, if it isn't the usual spring malarky, he could be the greatest attraction to hit Washington since the cherry trees.

Enthusiasm Abounds

Naturally, with a team starting from scratch, there are many fellows getting the double-oh whose names aren't engraved on major league stationery. But each and every one is coveting back and forth with the undeniable purpose and enthusiasm which stamps every ballplayer worth his salt at this time of the year.

"This is really a great opportunity," enthused John Gabler, a pitcher who had a 3-3 record with the Yankees after being summoned from the minors. "I sure do look forward to pitching with the Senators."

Eagerness gleams in the eyes of Joe McClain, whose chief recommendation is that he won 11 games at Charleston.

"After three straight years of Triple A pitching it sure feels great to be working with a major league club," he grins.

This, it might be added, is a designation, not an accepted fact. But Vernon summed it up most succinctly when he said:

"Everyone seems to realize we have a big job to do."

Not even the new Senators can underestimate this assertion, which probably will become known as one of the major understatements of the year. Yet such are the ways of baseball in the spring, it didn't even provoke a chuckle.

Smooth play, fights spark NBA action

There's no doubt National Basketball Association fans are getting their money's worth this season — plenty of slick ballplaying in between the fist fights.

Another poor imitation of a championship fight took place Wednesday night in the Detroit-New York game when Bob Ferry of the Pistons and Richie Guerin of the Knickerbockers squared off. Ferry was floored twice but remained in the game.

The battle, which emptied both benches, was just one of many this season in the volatile NBA. Ray Felix of Los Angeles has had it out with Walter Dukes of Detroit and Mike Farmer of Cincinnati and George Lee of Detroit broke the jaw of Knick Kenny Sears.

The Pistons broke out of a seven-game losing streak by edging New York, 123-117, in the nightcap of a Detroit doubleheader after Philadelphia squeaked past Cincinnati, 132-131.

Cincinnati got good scoring from Oscar Robertson (39), Jack Twyman (34) and Wayne Embry (22), but Philadelphia still has Wilt Chamberlain, and the "Big Dipper" hit 41 points, Paul Arizin added 33 for the narrow victory.

The Flyers, also committed to the New York tournament, boosted their record to 17-6 with the victory.

Lambert named fifth grid coach

PRINEVILLE — A fifth football coach was added to the Crook county high school coaching staff by the school board at a special meeting Monday night, with the approval of Duane Lambert as a member of the coaching staff.

Lambert is physical education director at the high school. Coach Tom Van Eiten told the board that a large turnout was expected for football next fall, as a bumper crop of eager fresh arrived. He stated that a turnout of 90 or more could be anticipated.

The approval of Lambert to the coaching staff will bring an increase of \$400 in his salary. He will continue with his six-class load in physical education. All coaches teach a regular load of classroom subjects, it was pointed out.

The new coaching staff, as tentatively organized, will consist of Van Eiten as head coach, Lambert as assistant coach, and Lambert will be a Jayvee coach and two freshman coaches.

Don Paulsen, junior high school football coach, told the school board that more money should be budgeted for equipment for the junior high school. In former years, old high school equipment has been handed down, but this is no longer practicable, it was stated.

Van Eiten gave support to Paulsen's request. The school board agreed to take the matter under advisement.
