Rules committee members named

The appointment of Dennis Marvin, Bend; Joseph Larkin and George F. Rakestraw, Redmond, and James F. Bodie, Prineville, to the committee on rules of the regular division of the Oregon Tax Court was announced in Salem today by Tax Court Judge Peter Gunnar.

As members of the committee, the four men will receive the first draft of the proposed rules for study and will suggest to the committee changes or additions based upon their experience in the practice of law in Central Oregon.

The committee on rules, headed by Ralph R. Bailey, Portland, chairman, and Charles P. Duffy, Portland, vice-chairman, is engaged in advising the tax court on the rules soon to be promulgated for the court.

The first draft is being prepared by a drafting sub-committee of Portland attorneys and will be submitted for comments and suggestions to the entire committee, composed of lawyers throughout the state.

Improvement of COI's main intake under consideration

Major reconstruction or possibly replacement of the Central Oregon Irrigation District's main intake on the Deschutes River some four miles south of Bend is under consideration.

E. G. Mansfield, COI district manager, said studies of the proposed flume project are now being made by a Portland engineering firm, M. W. Hanner and Associates.

The main flume is 6,100 feet long and consists of a half stave structure 12 feet in diameter. This flume diverts water from the Deschutes on the east side, carries it around a lava and pumice cliff and releases it into the main canal.

Through the years, the flume area has been the scene of several major breaks during the irrigation season. Damage has also been suffered from rocks rolling from overhanging formations.

The flume was built in 1923 and restored in 1930. In 1955 and 1961, major rock removal projects were undertaken, to protect the structure from overhanging boulders.

Maintenance costs have averaged around \$5,000 a year. The heavy maintenance several years ago resulted in COI directors setting aside funds annually toward a major reconstruction or relocation job on the big flume.

Alternatives facing engineers in their study appear to be as follows:

1. Replace flume with cross-tied wood or a square sided concrete bench flume on the east bank of the Deschutes.
2. Build entirely new siphon on west bank.
3. Build a diversion flume near Bend and construct new headgates and fish screen.

Another possibility is that a three-fourths of a mile long concrete by-pass channel from Benham Falls to the intake can be constructed. Feasibility of such a by-pass, to save water losses in

High Mass to be offered on anniversary of school

Bishop Francis P. Leipzig will offer pontifical high Mass at St. Francis of Assisi Church in Bend on Tuesday, September 26, in celebration of the 25th anniversary of the founding of St. Francis School here.

The mass will be at 5:30 p.m. Five sisters of the Holy Names Society from Marylhurst opened the school in 1936. At present there are eight sisters and two lay teachers on the staff instructing 340 pupils.

When St. Francis School opened for its first classes on September 21, 1936, there were 136 children registered.

As early as 1915, it is recalled, the late Father Luke Sheehan, long pastor of the Bend Catholic Church, tried to secure sisters to open a school in Bend, but was not successful at that time.

Sister Catherine Mary was the first principal of the school. Sister Josephine Mary is the present principal.

When the first five teaching sisters reached Bend in the fall of 1936, they were given a temporary home with the Sisters of St. Joseph at St. Charles Hospital.

A new convent for the teaching sisters was constructed in 1940 and dedicated on December 6 of that year by Bishop Leipzig.

Officers of the Mass to be offered on September 26, the anniversary date, will be Bishop Leipzig, celebrant; Father William Stone, Madras, deacon; Father John Baumgartner, Nyssa, subdeacon; the Very Rev. Patrick Gaier, Prineville, and Father Francis McCormack, Redmond, deacons of honor; Father George Murphy, Klamath Falls, assistant priest; Father Robert Simard, Chiloquin and Father Antonine Keating, Bend, masters of ceremonies.

Father William Coughlan will deliver the sermon.

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Interest high in search rescue unit

Twenty-five boys, aged 15 to 18, showed up at the First Methodist Church Tuesday night to participate in the forming of a new Mountain Search and Rescue Unit by Explorer Post 21, BSA.

District Scout executive, Boyd Karrer, outlined the problems of organizing such a unit and the qualifications needed by the unit for getting calls to participate in search and rescue.

Scoutmaster C. E. Hein, Troop 21, discussed the character building and citizenship development requirements needed in such a program. After discussing the training program, it was found that one boy was a licensed radio ham, and that three others were studying for their examination. Communications in search and rescue is a vital part in organized units, it was stressed. Others in the group were interested in automotive mechanics. The group plans to form a transportation core to help make the unit self-sustaining.

Boys passing the first 8-week training section will be required to pass a 13-week first aid course to be presented by Explorer Advisor Kenneth Dykeman. Those passing this will go on to rescue techniques and mountain climbing, which will be handled by committee men - field operations, John Barton.

The first training meeting will begin next Wednesday night at 7:30 p.m. when Committee Chairman Bill Sager, will start the introduction to search and rescue work. All boys wishing to join the unit will feel welcome to come, Karrer stressed.

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
