

Bend, Pendleton favored in IC games

Tonight's Intermountain games:
Bend at Hermiston
Prineville at Baker
Redmond at Pendleton
The Dalles at La Grande

Unbeaten Bend and Bend are favored to keep their records clean tonight, but if they are looking too much towards next week's "big game" here they could be surprised.

Pendleton hosts Redmond, and the Panthers — except for one loss to Baker — have been extra tough

this season in wins over La Grande, The Dalles, Parkrose and Madras.

As usual, a check of common opponents can give you two varied pictures.

Redmond barely got past La Grande 14-12, while Pendleton whopped the Tigers 40-0 last week. On the other hand, Redmond whipped The Dalles 34-14 — only one point less than Pendleton's 21-0 victory over the Indians.

Pendleton has been sailing along with about equal success on both

the ground and in the air.

Redmond, which couldn't cope with Baker's passing, should be a lot stronger in the pass defense department. If the Panthers are, they could give Pendleton's offense a lot of trouble.

But the Panthers will also have to solve the riddle of how to cross the Pendleton goal line — something which no team has managed this season.

Bend isn't expected to have any trouble at all with Hermiston, clobbered 32-6 by Baker last week.

The Bruins, on the other hand, dumped Baker 20-0. But Bend, should it be looking past Hermiston toward's the October 21 game here with Pendleton, might be in for some trouble anyway.

Bend lost two key backs for the season in practice this week — Bill Tye with a broken collarbone and Mike Genna with a ruptured kidney.

Genna was a first - string line-backer and reserve fullback, while Tye was a valuable reserve back

on both offense and defense.

Both Bend (3-0) and Redmond (2-1) are still very much in the league race with Pendleton (3-0) and Baker (2-1). But Prineville, with two losses and a tie in three games, is out of it.

The Pokes can get back in the race for an upper-division berth with a win tonight at Baker, but the task is a formidable one.

Baker has won its last two games by big scores, upsetting Redmond 34-6 and drubbing Prineville 32-6. And on their home field,

the Bulldogs have always been tough.

Another battle of the oft-beaten tonight has The Dalles (1-2) at La Grande (0-2-1).

If Pendleton and Bend come through as expected, things will be ripe for what should be the best game of the season here Saturday, October 21.

For that's when Pendleton and Bend tangle for what could be the league championship.

Providing they keep on the win path tonight.

Glass paces OCC rushers

In passing Doug Olsen of Southern Oregon continues to hold the lead with 41 completions in 83 attempts for 418 yards and five touchdowns.

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Colorado rated even with Miami in game tonight

Unbeaten Colorado meets the Miami Hurricanes at the Orange Bowl tonight — and an impressive victory could lead the Buffaloes back in the Sunshine State for the post-season classic.

Colorado, however, still must win the Big Eight title to qualify for the Orange Bowl bid.

Sonny Grandelius' squad has won its first two games, blanking Oklahoma State and squeezing by Kansas last week, and is rated even with the Hurricanes, who possess a 2-2 record.

Miami, seeking to rebound after last week's upset loss to Navy, will be without the services of star quarterback George Mira and a number of regular line-backers.

In other Friday night games, Kicking off the big college football weekend, winless Tulane (0-3) takes on Virginia Tech (1-1) and Detroit (2-0) plays host to Boston College, which has failed to score in its first three starts.

Michigan Over MSU

Main interest around the nation on Saturday will be centered on the traditional match between second-ranked Michigan and sixth-ranked Michigan State at Ann Arbor. The odds-makers have made Michigan a one-point favorite over the Spartans.

The game will be televised over the ABC network, starting at 2:15 p.m., EDT.

The top - ranked Mississippi Rebels, with Doug Elmore filling in nicely for the departed Jake Gibbs, is a 20-point choice as they play host to Houston.

Texas, ranked No. 3, carries a devastating ground and passing attack against one-time powerful Oklahoma this week. The Longhorns are a 14-point choice.

Iowa Over Indiana

Fourth-ranked Alabama (3-0) is a 16-point pick to hold off North Carolina State and its passing ace Roman Gabriel. Iowa, which dropped to No. 5 after edging Southern California last week, is a heavy favorite over Big Ten rival Indiana.

Notre Dame, rated No. 7 and on the way back as a gridiron power, plays Southern California, a 13-point underdog, at South bend. Eighth - ranked Ohio State is a big favorite over Illinois.

Baylor, tied for 10th with Maryland, meets a tough conference opponent, Arkansas, with the Bears a six-point favorite. Maryland is picked by 10 over North Carolina.

Huskies To Beat California

In the West Coast's top game, the Washington Huskies, in pursuit of a third straight Rose Bowl trip, are a strong choice over lowly California.

Other top games pit Penn State against Army; Pittsburgh against West Virginia, and Navy versus Cornell in the East. Down South, Georgia Tech takes on undefeated Duke, Louisiana State engages South Carolina and Clemson meets Wake Forest.

In the Midwest, Northwestern clashes with Minnesota, Wisconsin plays Oregon State, Syracuse meets Nebraska, and Kansas engages Iowa State.

Deer hunting outlook good

Deer hunting prospects in the Deschutes forest have improved considerably with a fair amount of moisture, the Oregon Game Commission said this week.

Medium and high elevations will be damp, with resultant improvement in hunting conditions.

The same thing has occurred in the Ochoco forest area, with rain dampening the forest areas including the fringes.

This is expected to improve hunting conditions, with some downward movement of deer expected to occur from some of the highest elevations of Central Oregon.

They should show up by this weekend.

Pheasant populations are light in Deschutes County and fair in Crook County. Quail hunting is expected to be fairly good in most of Central Oregon.

Fair chukar populations are present in the canyon areas of Crooked River.

Chukars are also found in fair numbers along the Deschutes Canyon and lower Squaw Creek, with numbers increasing as the canyon narrows northward.

Oregon and Oregon State football teams try to even up their season's record Saturday against tough opposition. Both teams have one victory and two defeats so far.

Oregon State was to fly to Madison, Wis., today where the Beavers battle Wisconsin of the Big 10 Saturday afternoon.

Oregon plays host to Arizona at Multnomah Stadium in Portland Saturday night. Arizona has gone unbeaten in its last nine games, with only a tie by Nebraska marring the record.

Oregon State, with fullback Tom Gates ready for action again after being on the injured list, may have found itself in waxing Idaho 44-6 last Saturday. Bruce Williams, who got OSU's attack going with his line plunging, also will see action at fullback.

Wisconsin this season has won two and lost one. It defeated Utah 7-0 and Indiana 6-3, losing to Michigan State 20-0.

A damp field is possible in Portland although the forecast today called for fair skies.

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NCAA program to fight spread of bribery cases

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association today recommended a 16-point program aimed at combating "the criminal conspiracy of bribery" in college sports.

The program was drafted by the NCAA after months of study and review of information and suggestions obtained from a variety of college agencies, the New York County district's attorney's office, and the permanent subcommittee in investigations of the House of Representatives.

The report, issued by NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers, urged passage of federal anti-gambling and anti - bribery laws. It also encouraged state legislatures to enact anti-bribery laws.

Blame Organized Gambling

"The cancerous core from which much of this evil spreads is organized gambling," the report added, "and both recent legislation and proposed laws pending

before Congress can do much to strike against this recognized evil."

Several gamblers have been indicted by the New York County grand jury on bribery charges involving basketball games. The jury granted immunity to the players involved for testifying. In North Carolina, other players have been indicted in connection with a bribery scandal there.

The NCAA report said colleges themselves must take the offensive in the fight against bribery "by pursuing their own self-improvement program."

Improve Basic Procedures

Ten of the 16 recommendations were directed toward improving basic procedures in college athletic administration. They would be implemented by NCAA, conference or institutional action.

Five of the proposals were aimed explicitly at the problem of organized gambling and the final one suggests that regional accrediting associations strengthen general academic requirements to "avoid admitting students who are not qualified to realize the moral and intellectual goals of the institution."

Italy's Davis Cup team, thoroughly humiliated in the Italian press, faced with determined confidence its opening two singles matches against Italy today in the inter-zone finals.

Husky Jon Douglas, a 25-year-old recently discharged Marine corporal from Santa Monica, Calif., drew the opening assignment against temperamental Faust to Gardini.

Whitney Reed, America's eighth-ranked amateur and its most experienced player here, met Italian ace Nicola Pietrangeli in the second match.

The local press has accused the U.S. of taking the Davis Cup competition too lightly and of leaving its best players home. The Italians, who are treating the current matches in a carnival atmosphere feel they are being shortchanged by the absences of Chuck McKinley, Bernard (Tut) Bartenz and Dennis Ralston, all of whom rank higher than any member of the present U.S. squad.

As a result of the admittedly sub-standard U.S. team, the Italians would like nothing better than to pin a 5-0 defeat on the Yanks.

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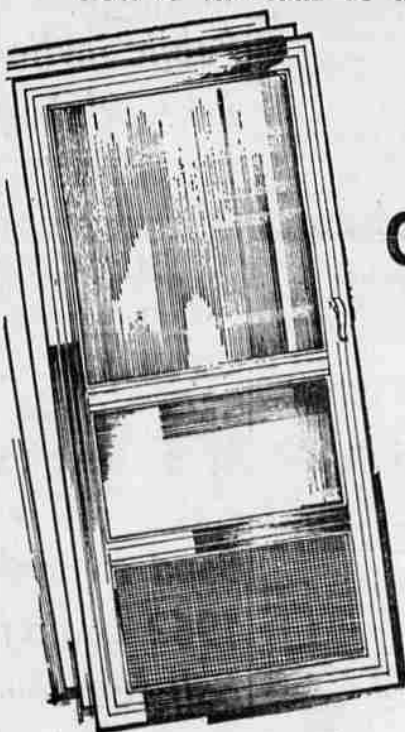
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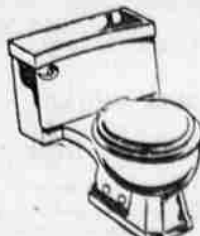
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
