Culver crushes Cascade Locks, 71 to 9 Friday

CULVER — In eight-man football, the Culver Bulldogs crushed visiting Cascade Locks here Friday night 71-9.

The victory moved Culver into a tie with Sisters for first place in the district. The two clubs will meet next Saturday at 2 p.m. at Sisters and play for the title.

Culver defeated the Outlaws last year in a similar playoff.

Star quarterback Bob MacRostie paved the way for the lapsided Culver victory. He scored five straight touchdowns and led his mates to a 39-7 halftime margin.

The going was downhill for Culver after that.

Cascade Locks scored twice in the second half but couldn't solve the deceptive running of MacRostie.

2 records set by Chamberlain

 It wasn't necessary to ask Eugene Denny Meyer of Portland, Ore., tonight in their TV fight at Madison Square Garden.

A crowd of 10,000 and a gate of \$20,000 are expected for the 10-rounder, which will be televised nationally by ABC at 10 p.m., EDT.

For the once-great Robinson, who held the middleweight title five times and the welterweight championship once, this is the second fight of his latest comeback.

On Sept. 25 Sugar Ray had to climb off the floor in Detroit to win a split decision over unranked Willie Greaves. Nevertheless, he is favored over contender Meyer because his punch, experience and aggressiveness are expected to nullify Denny's advantages of youth and speed.

Twenty-two-year-old Meyer, ranked ninth among contenders by the Ring Magazine and 10th by the National Boxing Association, is a comparatively light hitter. He registered only eight knockouts while winning 30 of his 35 fights.

Bears to test 49er 'shotgun'

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago Bears, who contributed to the evolution of football when they switched to the T-formation more than 20 years ago, face the San Francisco Forty Niners and their spectacular new shotgun formation Sunday.

There is a growing chorus of experts who have suggested that coach Red Hickey's ingenious offense may be replacing — or at least augmenting — the T-formation, since pro defenses have pretty well contained the T in recent seasons.

A packed house of 45,000 is a certainty at Wrigley Field to see the shotgun and T collide in an interesting and acid test.

Veteran Bear coach George Halas, aided by his brilliant assistant Clark Shaughnessy, has reportedly been drilling his squad against shotgun patterns all week.

The odds-makers have made the Forty Niners the shaky two-point favorite. The Bears, after a poor start, now have a 3-2 record. San Francisco has won four out of five.

San Francisco is in good shape for the contest with only end Clyde Conner out of action. He suffered a mild concussion last week at Minneapolis.

Hickey has not said for sure, but he is expected to again go with his troika system which finds John Brodie, Billy Kilmer and Bobby Waters taking turns in the key tailback slot.

If the shotgun is ready to oust the T among football offenses, it is fitting that Halas and Shaughnessy, the two men most responsible for the T, should be around to see it happen.
