Varsity spots wide open on Bend High cage squad

Varsity spots on the 1961-62 Bend High basketball team are "wide open" to the 30 squad members, new coach Chuck Hudson indicated today.

In a break from the traditional varsity-junior varsity approach, Hudson will keep his entire 30-man outfit together throughout the season.

If a player shows enough talent and determination in weekday practice, he may be able to "unseat" one of the previous week's varsity players.

In other words, there will be no sharp break between a junior varsity and varsity performer.

Chambers Only Starter Back

Hudson, who led lone to a runner-up spot in the 1961 B Basketball Tournament here last March, has only one letterman, 6-5 senior center Rex Chambers, back from the Intermountain Conference champion club of last season that posted an 18-6 record.

And eight of the first nine players from that championship squad will also be missing.

Three reserve lettermen, all seniors, are back. They include 6-2 forwards Jan Bowlus and Lloyd Grant, and 6-4 center Jack Allison.

And while there are no returning letterman guards, Hudson has a three-year veteran in Pat Hendricks, a 5-10 senior transfer from Holbrook, Ariz.

Chambers, a two-year letterman, looks like a sure starter. He'll be backed up by 6-3 junior Clint Brumitt, up from the jayvees, and 6-4 Allison.

Top Prospects Listed

Challenging Bowlus and Grant for starting forward spots are 6-2 junior Gary McKinney, 5-10 senior Andy Olson, 6-2 junior Ted Peterson and 6-0 junior Dave Shelton. All have had jayvee experience.

Other guard prospects besides Hendricks are 5-9 junior Larry Gelbrich, 6-0 junior Scott Jaynes, 5-10 junior Randy Slate and 5-7 senior Don Underwood. All saw jayvee action last season.

Three other seniors are also shooting for varsity spots. They are 5-9 Dave Fletcher, a speedster who played basketball as a sophomore at LaPine, 5-11 Dennis Kerr and 5-11 Ross Cady.

The remaining 13 boys are expected to see most of the action in jayvee games throughout the season, but Hudson repeated his statement that some may see varsity action.

The nine sophomores in this

group include 5-9 Jerry Wede, 5-6 John Welborn, 5-10 Bill Ruble, 5-11 Warren Choop, 5-10 Mike Clark, 5-8 Herb Hickman, 6-1 Alan McKinney, 5-7 Chuck Ridderbusch and 6-2 Tom Randolph.

Four juniors are 6-3 Jim deSulay, 6-1 John McKay, 6-1 Weldon Oatman and 6-1 Rich Gunderson. Assisting Hudson will be another newcomer, head baseball coach Bill Bauer, a graduate of Linfield College.

A 20-game schedule has been set up, including six pre-season contests and a 14-game double round-robin conference schedule.

First action will see Bend playing Lakeview in the opening game of the Central Oregon basketball tournament December 1 at Prineville.

Traditional rivals Prineville and Redmond will battle in the second game that night, with the four teams switching to Bend for two games Saturday, December 2.

The finals will pit the losers in the opener, with winners meeting in the following game.

Portland Schools Scheduled

Bend will travel to the Portland area for two games the following weekend. On Friday, December 8, Bend will play at Parkrose. The following night the Bruins will be at Reynolds.

Friday, December 15, Bend will play defending state champion Klamath Falls on the Pelicans' home court.

A return engagement between the two longtime rivals is set for Friday, December 22, at the Bend High gym.

The Bruins open their conference schedule at home January 5 against Baker, hosting La Grande the following night.

Junior varsity home games will start at 6:30 p.m., with varsity action getting underway at 8:15.

Michael Rockefeller had been told to end quest for native trophies

AMSTERDAM, Holland (UPI) - Dutch officials warned Michael Rockefeller to stop seeking headhunter trophies because he was "creating a demand which could not be met without bloodshed," a Dutch official said Monday.

Dr. J. Boendermaker, deputy governor general of Dutch New Guinea who is back in Holland on a short visit, said he was well acquainted with the 23-year-old son of the governor of New York.

"I knew Rockefeller well since he arrived as a member of the Harvard Peabody Museum expedition to study the headhunter tribes in central New Guinea," said Boendermaker. "He was going after headhunter relics along the coast of the Asmat Territory."

"Michael wanted to buy carved shields, totem poles and human heads from the local population. He planned to go down the island's river and cross the sea to Agats village where 2,000 recently pacified members of a headhunter tribe live.

Two killed as plane plummets

KAILUA, Hawaii (UPI) - A Marine pilot and an 8-year-old boy were killed Monday night when a jet bomber collided with another plane, narrowly missed a school where a PTA meeting was in progress, and smashed into two homes.

The dead boy was identified as Stephen Schmitz, son of Coast Guard Cmdr. Frank C. Schmitz, whose home was demolished in the fiery crash.

The identity of the pilot was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

A Marine spokesman said the two planes, A4D "Skyhawk" attack bombers, collided on an approach to the Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station.

Andre freed from jail

NEW YORK (UPI) - Ex-chauffeur Andre Forumbeanu was released Monday night from the jail cell he had been put into for eloping with heiress Gamble Benedict in defiance of a court order.

Forumbeanu was freed on \$10,000 bail pending an appeal of his 30-day sentence for contempt imposed last Friday by Magistrate Peter Horn in Brooklyn. Horn had issued an order in February, 1960, directing Forumbeanu to stay away from the then-teen-age heiress to the Remington typewriter fortune.

Forumbeanu and Gamble eloped in April 1960, and now have a son. He had not returned openly to New York until his attempt last Friday to clear away his legal troubles. His appeal probably will be heard in January.

Gamble, who stayed on the French Riviera, has reported to friends that she lost their expected second child by a miscarriage while Forumbeanu was in jail here.

John Jr. looks like his mother

WASHINGTON (UPI) - John F. Kennedy Jr., who will be a year old Saturday, bears a strong resemblance to his mother.

The President's son's resemblance to the First Lady was demonstrated Monday in an official photograph released by the White House.

It shows John Jr. smiling broadly from his mother's arms, with his own little arms around her neck. He is wearing a white suit.

Another photograph, in color, shows him sitting on the floor holding a colorful toy rooster on a stick, a gift from Madame Charles de Gaulle.

Klein resigns post with NSA

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The personnel director of the super-secret National Security Agency (NSA) has resigned at the insistence of the Pentagon House investigators who urged that he be charged with perjury.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities announced Monday that Maurice H. Klein resigned 10 days ago. A Justice Department spokesman said it was studying the case.

The committee said Klein told congressional investigators that he made false statements about his personal history on official documents. The committee also said its investigation indicated that a personnel form in Klein's file was not the original document he made out in 1942, although Klein claimed it was.

The committee said a Defense Department official advised it that the FBI had confirmed its suspicions about Klein's personnel form.

Klein admitted making several misstatements in a 19-year-old job application form, but said they were the result of "pure carelessness."

AGAINST SHOOTING

DETROIT (UPI) - For the record, it's official government policy to freeze on shooting your neighbor at the fallout shelter door in the event of a nuclear attack.

John E. Cosgrove, new assistant director of the Office of Emergency Planning for the federal government, said, "The federal government does not favor shooting one's neighbor."

Cosgrove made the statement at a White House regional conference here Wednesday.
