Wanted: A defense to stop high-scoring Klamath Falls High stars Gary Patzke and Kent Hunsaker. If you have such information, please contact Bend High Coach Chuck Hudson at gym immediately.

The above want ad is pure fiction, but it's the straight scoop that Hudson and his boys could face heavy trouble from Klamath Falls here Friday night unless they find a "stopper" for this twin scoring threat.

So far, it's been an impossible task at Klamath Falls, defending state A-1 champion, has rolled to five straight victories, including a 67-50 win over Bend at Klamath Falls last Friday night.

Patzke Impressive

Patzke, who dropped in 25 points in about three quarters of action against Bend last week, has a season's total of 86. Hunsaker, with 21 against Bend, has 70 for the season.

Between them, they have accounted for 156 of Klamath's 325-point total.

Hudson figures his Bruins will

be a lot better prepared than they were last week against the Pels.

"We've been emphasizing defense," Hudson said. "I hope we're farther along, and I think we'll be a lot tougher on our home court."

Hudson was hoping that Klamath might experience the kind of cold scoring night that Pendleton suffered in a game last week with La Grande.

Pendleton, loaded with returning lettermen and a big favorite to wrap up the Intermountain Conference this season, was belted 54-32 by an underdog La Grande team that, just prior to the Pendleton game, had been humiliated by Baker 44-27.

Ash Due Back

But the chances are that Klamath Falls might even be tough-

er for the Bend game Friday. For due to return is 6-3 forward Dana Ash, who had scored 24 points for Klamath in the first three games of the season.

Ash injured his ankle in the opening minutes of the second Springfield contest and did not see action against Bend.

The Pelicans, who blasted Springfield in one game 71-39 and shot .619 from the field, may be due to cool off. They hit on more than 50 per cent of their field shots in the first game against Bend, and that's a tough pace to keep up.

Kelley Tallest

Tallest player on the squad is 6-4 Fred Kelley, who's managed only 13 points in five games. The Pels are tough, but they'll miss the scoring and rebounding of left-handed hook-shooting 6 - 8

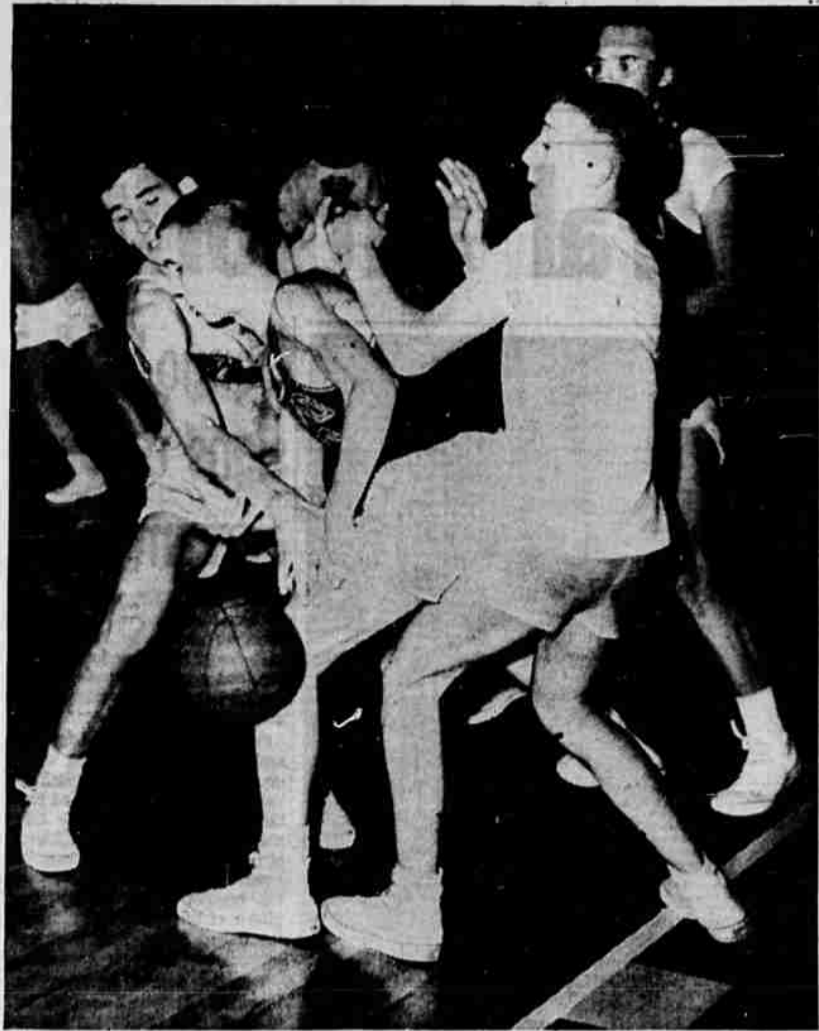
whiz Bruce Brickner, now a freshman at the University of Washington.

Also missing from last year's championship team is a great floor leader, Wally Palmberg, who also graduated.

Hudson plans to start the same five as last week against Klamath. That would be 5-10 Pat Hendricks at 3-9 Larry Gelbrich at guards, 6-5 Rex Chambers at center and 6-2 Lloyd Grant and 6-2 Jan Bowlius at forwards.

Chambers was Bend's top scorer last week against the Pels, contributing 17 points.

Prineville has wound up its pre-season slate, while Redmond has a final pre-conference game with Madras at Redmond Saturday evening.

West coach hits 'cloak-dagger' tactics of pros

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Professional football scouts have been asked to avoid cloak-and-dagger tactics in attempting to sign football players here for the East-West game.

"Professional scouts and owners seem to think the game is played for their benefit," said West Head Coach Jim Owens of Washington. "There have been a lot of unpleasant incidents in the past. In recent years players have been pestered to death."

Owens said he planned to get together with East mentor Joe Kuharich of Notre Dame to establish visiting hours for pro scouts.

The battle for players hit fever pitch last year when the American Football League popped up to fight with the older National Football League for players.

Coaches reported that certain scouts called athletes at all hours of the night, badgered the gridlers before, after and during practice, and even contacted them while they were at the training tables.

Among the players here for the Shrine Game who have not signed with any pro club are a such men as Heisman Trophy winner Ernie Davis of Syracuse, Utah State's big tackle Merlin Olsen, San Jose State flanker Mack Burton and many others.

Team player deluxe

Bruins' center on 'small side' but still tough

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Ron Hull, captain of UCLA's Rose Bowl football team, isn't big for a lineman but he is one of a long list of outstanding centers who have played for the Bruins through the years.

From the days of Bill Spaulding in the late '20s, UCLA has come up with centers who made their marks both in West Coast competition and nationally.

And followers of the Bruins who recall such famed centers as Homer Oliver, Lee Coats, Johnny Ryland, Leon McLaughlin, Don Paul, and Donn Moomaw can look forward to the New Year's Day game with the feeling that at center UCLA will be well represented.

This year Hull's work has been recognized by numerous honors including selection on the All-Coast team and on All America

squads. But the round faced, chunky senior is above all a team player. Playing left linebacker on defense, Hull has developed an uncanny knack of knowing where plays are going and being there in time to stop them.

Hull played perhaps his greatest game against University of Southern California when the Bruins needed to win if they were to get the Rose Bowl bid. He roamed all over the field, backing up every defensive play when it was not his to make.

And Coach Bill Barnes showed his confidence in Hull by using him as the starter in every game this season and when the regular schedule had ended he had 350 minutes of playing time to his credit.

It took hard work for Hull to become a top center. Three years ago he was so discouraged he almost quit football. He had fallen behind in his studies and as a result he failed to make progress on the practice field that he felt he should show.

But even as a sophomore he got in 117 minutes of playing time. As a junior he actually saw more action than Harry Baldwin, the team's captain who was an All-Coast selection.

Hull received advice, coaching and inspiration from center coach Dan Peterson who in his UCLA playing days was listed at 163 pounds but really weighed less than 150.

"No player ever worked harder to become a top man than Hull," Peterson says. "He made up with quickness and smart play for what he lacked in size. He can make defensive corrections on the field as the situation changes during a game."

Twelve-year pro George Blanda said AFL's best

NEW YORK (UPI)—George Blanda of the Houston Oilers, who has experienced his share of frustration and discouragement during a 12-year pro football career, today was chosen the 1961 American Football League "Player of the Year" by United Press International.

The 33-year-old placekicking quarterback star won the honor by a wide margin, attracting 17 of the 24 votes cast in the annual UPI poll of three regular AFL writers from each league city.

Blanda, once called a "major league misfit," recovered from a shaky start this season, regained all his passing and kicking fitness, and guided the Oilers to the Eastern Division championship of the AFL. Houston closed out the season with nine straight victories and qualified to meet the San Diego Chargers for the league championship next Sunday.

This was Blanda's outstanding season in a pro career that began back in 1949 with the Chicago Bears. He set AFL records by passing for 36 touchdowns and a total of 3,340 yards. He also kicked 16 field goals and a record 64 extra points. In all, he completed 187 of 362 passes for a 51.7 per cent.

He was voted all-league quarterback by a wide margin earlier this week.

In the balloting for Player of the Year, halfback Paul Lowe of the Chargers received two votes, while halfback Billy Cannon and flanker Charlie Hennigan of the Oilers, linebacker Sherrill Heardrick of the Dallas Texans and quarterback Jack Kemp of the Chargers each had one vote.

Frank Jones MSU assistant

STARKVILLE, Miss. (UPI)—Mississippi State University head football coach Paul Davis has named Frank Jones, head coach at Presbyterian College, his chief assistant.

Athletic director Wade Walker announced that Jones was hired on recommendation of Davis.

Jones, 39, will serve as offensive backfield coach in charge of overall offense, the same post Davis held before being elevated to the head coaching job earlier this month. Davis succeeded Walker.

Rose Bowl teams meet at Disneyland

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—UCLA's Bruins were scheduled to meet their Rose Bowl opponents for the first time today—but only on the rides at Disneyland.

Following a morning workout, UCLA will motor to Anaheim from its campus training site for the yearly merriment at the famous amusement park and then a big banquet with Minnesota. It will be one of the few extracurricular activities allowed by either Bruin Coach Bill Barnes or his Minnesota counterpart, Murray Warmath.

The Bruins Wednesday were kept a few minutes extra by Barnes and drilled more than 2 hours and 15 minutes. At the close of the workout he said the team looked "much improved" over its Tuesday showing which he had called "our worst since practice started."

Tailback Bobby Smith did an excellent job passing Wednesday and his sophomore sub, Mike Haffner, the team's leading rusher, looked strong on several running plays.

GETS COACHING JOB

ABILENE, Tex. (UPI)—Lester Wheeler has been named to succeed Nick Nicholson as head football coach at Abilene Christian College. Wheeler had been an assistant football coach at the school.

Tulane coach to put stress on recruiting

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Tommy O'Boyle, newly elevated to head football coach at Tulane, said today his major objective lay in recruiting—no easy assignment with Tulane's academic standards.

He was named unanimously Wednesday by a five-man Tulane committee to replace Andy Pilney, who resigned Nov. 22 just after finishing his fifth consecutive losing season. Tulane gave him a five-year contract.

O'Boyle, 44, was All-America while playing guard for Tulane in 1940 and 1941, his junior and senior years. He returned to Tulane last spring as line coach and Pilney's chief assistant, and has been acting head coach since Pilney's resignation.

Pilney resigned with an alumni group calling for his scalp. He had been on the staff for 16 years. In eight years as head coach, he had only two winning seasons. This year's 2-5 record ended with a 62-0 rout by traditional rival Louisiana State.

The alumni group also called for overhauling athletic policy at Tulane. But university president Herbert Longenecker said there would be little change in it. Several of the Green Wave's best players have flunked out because of unrelenting adherence to academic standards.

O'Boyle previously served as line coach at Duke, Miami and Kansas State. He also was athletic director and head coach at Southwest Missouri State.

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Warriors take fourth in row

Although Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain is averaging more than a point a minute, the Philadelphia Warriors aren't picking up much ground on the Boston Celtics in the National Basketball Association's Eastern Division race.

Chamberlain tossed in 35 points in leading the Warriors to a 117-102 victory over the Detroit Pistons Wednesday night in the feature game of an NBA twinbill at Detroit. The Los Angeles Lakers downed the Chicago Packers, 102-98, in the opener.

The Warriors' victory was their fourth straight and their seventh in their last nine games. However, they still rest 5½ games back of the Celtics, who have lost only four of their first 27 outings.

Chamberlain's latest burst gave him 1,553 points for the season. The Warriors have now played 32 games or a total of 1,536 minutes, so nobody can say Wilt isn't earning his paycheck.

There were no other games scheduled in the NBA Wednesday night.
