**Italian champ beats Canadian**

MILAN, Italy (UPI)—Canadian welterweight champion Gale Kerwin said he wasn't impressed by world junior welterweight champion Dulio Loi's record before he met him in the ring — but he must be now.

Loi, working methodically, floored Kerwin three times Wednesday night en route to a seventh-round technical knockout in their scheduled 10-round non-title fight at the Sports Palace.

Loi, in scoring his 29th knockout and 113th victory in 119 fights, weighed 142 pounds to Kerwin's 145. It was Gale's 13th defeat against 35 victories and two draws.

In a supporting fight, Giordano Campari, lightweight champion of Italy, won a 10-round decision over Tommy Tibbs of Boston, Mass. Campari weighed 136½ pounds while Tibbs scaled 133.

**Chiloquin gains berth in tourney**

MADRAS — The Chiloquin Thunderbirds emerged victorious in last Saturday's eliminations for the All-Indian Holiday Basketball Tournament and earned the eighth berth in the end-of-the-year classic.

In their first elimination game the Thunderbirds defeated the Warm Springs Cougars 95-82. In their second and deciding game the Chiloquin squad picked off the Pendleton Indians with an 89-69 final score.

Seven other teams will join the Thunderbirds for the opening tip off in the third annual All Indian Tournament.

The tournament, sponsored by the Warm Springs Basketball Association, gets underway on the Madras Union High School court December 28 and lasts till the championship game Saturday night, December 30.

There will be "double headers" each day and evening during the tournament. Games will be at 1:30, 3:00, 7:00 and 8:00 p.m. The Friday night games, December 29, will begin at 5:30 p.m. to accommodate the Queen's ball, held in connection with the tournament.

The Chiloquin Thunderbirds will open the tournament against the Wapato Hawks, Thursday, December 28, at 1:30 p.m. Their game will be followed by a 3 p.m. match between the Toppenish Papposes, tournament champs for two years, and the Seattle Thunderbirds.

Thursday evening the Warm Springs Mappies will go against the highly rated Fort Peck Warriors from Wolf Point, Montana, at 7 p.m. The night cap, to begin about 8:30, will pit the Portland Red Hawks against the Nez Perce Nation of Lapwai, Idaho.

The tournament will draw about 88 Indian ball players, many who had experience on various college fives in the west.

For some, like fourth-ranked Providence and seventh-ranked Arizona State University this has been a week of nightmares.

And it hasn't been joyous either for second-ranked Cincinnati or sixth-ranked West Virginia, both of whom suffered their first losses on Monday.

Providence and Arizona State also took their initial tumbles on Monday and as if things weren't bad enough, each performed an encore Wednesday night.

Underdog Xavier of Ohio handed Providence its second straight setback, 67-53, at Cincinnati, and Minnesota bowled over Arizona State, 70-68, at Minneapolis.
